SENATE RESOLUTION

ESTABLISHING A SPECIAL MENTAL HEALTH TASK FORCE TO STUDY WHETHER HAWAII SHOULD PROVIDE A CONTINUUM OF MENTAL HEALTH CARE FOR INCARCERATED PERSONS.

WHEREAS, chapter 334, part VIII, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 1 relating to involuntary outpatient mental health treatment, 2 provides procedures and criteria for the involuntary outpatient 3 treatment for persons in need of mental health services; and 4 5

WHEREAS, the existing law on involuntary outpatient mental 6 health treatment was originally enacted by Act 251, Session Laws 7 of Hawaii 1984, and remains today in substantially the same 8 language; and 9

WHEREAS, the involuntary outpatient treatment law provides 11 for a maximum outpatient treatment period of not more than one 12 hundred eighty days or six months; and 13

WHEREAS, existing law does not provide for follow-up mental 15 health treatment after the expiration of six months, which in 16 many instances is sorely needed for the benefit of the patient 17 and the safety of society; and 18

WHEREAS, in Hawaii, a white paper submitted to the 2002 20 National Conference on Mental Health Statistics, by a professor 21 at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, Department of Psychology, 22 and the Adult Mental Health Division of the Hawaii Department of 23 Health, estimates that the population with severe and persistent 24 mental illness is 2.6 per cent of adults, or approximately 25 24,000 people; and 26

WHEREAS, the white paper found that 4,500 adults were 28 served by the Adult Mental Health Division, leaving a 29 discrepancy of nearly 20,000 adults who may not have received 30 needed mental health services, correcting for such variables as 31 insurance coverage and Medicaid; and 32

34 WHEREAS, persons who have been discharged from further treatment after a maximum period of six months have a high 35

probability of needing continuous mental health care, but in all 1 likelihood do not receive such care because of a lack of further 2 3 professional attention and care; and 4 5 WHEREAS, discharged persons may go on to become involved in the criminal justice system; and 6 7 WHEREAS, The Honolulu Advertiser, on January 14, 2007, 8 reported on its investigation that found that the care of 9 mentally ill inmates in Hawaii's prison system is so deficient 10 that many fail to get treatment and are subjected to conditions 11 considered harmful and likely to worsen their symptoms; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the prison mental health services are one 14 15 component of the total mental health care system in Hawaii in which the entry point for mental health services is assisted 16 outpatient treatment; and 17 18 WHEREAS, a special mental health task force would be able 19 to expertly assess whether Hawaii should provide some form of 20 post-involuntary outpatient mental health care, and assess the 21 quality and effectiveness of mental health services provided to 22 incarcerated persons; now, therefore, 23 24 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 25 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, 26 that the Department of Health is requested to establish a 27 special mental health task force and provide administrative 28 support thereto; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the special mental health task 31 force be chaired by the Director of Health, or designee; the 32 Chief of the Adult Mental Health Division, or designee, of the 33 Department of Health; the Chief of the Alcohol and Drug Abuse 34 Division, or designee, of the Department of Health; the Chief 35 Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, or designee; the Director 36 of Public Safety, or representative; a representative of the 37 Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation, selected by 38 the corporation; the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County 39 of Honolulu, or designee; the Public Defender or designee; a 40 representative of the Mental Health Association in Hawaii, to be 41 42 selected by that organization; a representative of the Hawaii Medical Psychiatric Association, to be selected by that 43 organization; a representative of the Hawaii Psychological 44 2007-1273 SR SMA-1.doc

Association, to be selected by that organization; a 1 representative of the Community Alliance on Prisons, to be 2 selected by that organization; a representative of the American 3 Civil Liberties Union, to be selected by that organization; and 4 the Legal Aid Society, to be selected by that organization; and 5 6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the special mental health task 7 force select a chair; and 8 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the special mental health task 10 force is requested to conduct a study to assess whether Hawaii 11 should provide some form of post-involuntary outpatient mental 12 health care, and assess the quality and effectiveness of mental 13 health services provided to incarcerated persons; and 14 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the special mental health task 16 force is requested to report its findings and recommendations, 17 including proposed legislation, to this body no later than 18 thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 19 2008; and 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 22 Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health the Chief of 23 the Adult Mental Health Division, the Chief of the Alcohol and 24 Drug Abuse Division, the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme 25 Court, the Director of Public Safety, the Executive Director of 26 the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation, the 27 Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu, the 28 Public Defender, the Mental Health Association in Hawaii, the 29 Hawaii Medical Psychiatric Association, the Hawaii Psychological 30 Association, the Community Alliance on Prisons, the American 31 Civil Liberties Union, and the Legal Aid Society. 32 33 34
