## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that medicaid is the
- 2 cornerstone of health care for our most needy population.
- 3 Further, the legislature has previously recognized that it is in
- 4 the public interest to ensure that health care payments made
- 5 with state funds or controlled by the State are sufficient to
- 6 cover the actual costs of care. However, inadequate payment and
- 7 reimbursement from medicaid have compromised access to medical
- 8 care not only for the uninsured and those covered by medicaid
- 9 but also for those individuals who have private employer-based
- 10 health insurance.
- 11 Although our community health care centers provide
- 12 excellent primary care and outreach, they do not cover specialty
- 13 and hospital care. Patients who cannot obtain access to the
- 14 health care they need are more likely to seek care in the more
- 15 expensive emergency room setting. As documented in numerous
- 16 media reports, emergency room access to specialty care coverage
- 17 has reached crisis proportions.

1 Hawaii's hospitals in particular have been detrimentally 2 affected by the inadequacy of medicaid reimbursements and 3 payments. Hawaii's hospitals have annually lost millions of 4 dollars because government reimbursement is far below the cost 5 of providing medical care. Between 2003 and 2005, medicaid 6 payments to hospitals covered only seventy-three to seventyeight per cent of total medicaid costs, creating a strain on the 7 8 hospitals' financial stability. 9 Currently, the administrative rules of the department of 10 human services governing fee-for-service medicaid reimbursement 11 provide only for hospital inpatient and long-term care nursing 12 rates to be adjusted annually for inflation. Reimbursement 13 rates for other services have gone years without a rate 14 adjustment for inflation despite the rising cost of providing 15 these services. Additionally, hospital outpatient services 16 rates have not been increased for many years, while hospital 17 labor and other costs have increased dramatically over the years. Consequently, hospitals have suffered financially and 18 19 have had to use prior years' reserves and other funds to make up 20 the shortfall from medicaid services.

1	The purpose of this Act is to meet rising health care costs			
2	and ensure that Hawaii's residents have continued access to			
3	quality health care by:			
4	(1)	Esta	olishing a process by which medicaid fee-for-	
5		serv	ice individual provider reimbursement rates are	
6		incr	eased annually for inflation;	
7	(2)	Retr	pactively adjusting for inflation, payments made	
8		to p	roviders of hospital outpatient services and other	
9		indi	vidual providers to account for the lack of a rate	
10		incr	ease for the past five years; and	
11	(3)	Appr	opriating funds:	
12		(A)	To increase the medicaid fee schedule to one	
13			hundred per cent of the medicare fee schedule for	
14			the current year;	
15		(B)	To adjust for inflation payments made to medicaid	
16			fee-for-service hospitals during fiscal biennium	
17			2005-2007; and	
18		(C)	For the State's portion of the federal	
19			disproportionate share hospital allowance.	
20	SECT	ION 2	. Section 346-59, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
21	amended b	y ame	nding subsection (b) to read as follows:	

1	"(b) Rates of payment for outpatient hospital services,			
2	except for emergency room services, and to providers of medical			
3	care who are individual practitioners, including doctors of			
4	medicine, dentists, podiatrists, psychologists, osteopaths,			
5	optometrists, and other individuals providing services, shall be			
6	based upon the Hawaii medicaid fee schedule. The amounts paid			
7	shall [not exceed the maximum permitted to be paid individual			
8	practitioners or other individuals under federal law and			
9	regulation, be one hundred per cent of the medicare fee			
10	schedule for the current year[, the state limits as provided in			
11	the appropriation act, or the provider's billed amount.			
12	The appropriation act shall indicate the percentage of the			
13	medicare fee schedule for the year 2000 to be used as the basis			
14	for establishing the Hawaii medicaid fee schedule. For any			
15	subsequent adjustments to the fee schedule, the legislature			
16	shall specify the extent of the adjustment in the appropriation			
17	act].			
18	Rates under the medicaid fee schedule shall be adjusted			
19	each year for inflation by multiplying the rates in effect on			
20	June 30 of each year by the sum of one plus the inflation factor			
21	for the prior fiscal year. The inflation factor shall be based			
22	on the latest available actual, or estimated if actual is not			
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- 1 available, national index for providers of medical care. This
- 2 subsection shall not apply to QUEST medical plans."
- 3 SECTION 3. The department of human services shall adjust
- 4 payments made for noninstitutional items and services provided
- 5 by medicaid fee-for-service providers during fiscal biennium
- 6 2005-2007, for inflation by multiplying those payments by the
- 7 sum of one plus the inflation factor for the prior fiscal year,
- 8 based on the latest available actual, or estimated if actual is
- 9 not available, national index for providers of medical care.
- 10 The department of human services shall reimburse providers for
- 11 the difference between actual payments and adjusted payment
- 12 amounts; provided that the amounts paid shall not exceed the
- 13 maximum permitted to be paid individual practitioners or other
- 14 providers under federal law and regulation, and the medicare fee
- 15 schedule for the current year.
- 16 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$9,800,000 or so much
- 18 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 to adjust
- 19 for inflation payments made to medicaid fee-for-service
- 20 hospitals during fiscal biennium 2005-2007.
- 21 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 22 human services for the purposes of this Act.



- 1 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$8,800,000 or so much
- 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and the
- 4 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 5 2008-2009 to increase the medicaid fee schedule pursuant to
- 6 section 346-59(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 7 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 8 of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 9 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$8,000,000 or so much
- 11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 for the
- 12 State's portion of the federal disproportionate share hospital
- 13 allowance.
- 14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the human
- 15 services for the purposes of this Act.
- 16 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 17 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 18 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.

## Report Title:

Medicaid Fee Schedule Rate Increase; Annual Inflation Adjustment
