A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The cost of feed for livestock production in 1 Hawaii can comprise up to seventy per cent of total production 2 costs versus close to fifty per cent for mainland producers. 3 There are currently five dairies and six egg farms of 4 significant size, with combined gross annual revenues of 5 \$26,400,000. Within the past year, two egg farms and one dairy 6 farm have gone out of business due to production cost increases, 7 8 largely attributed to the rising cost of feed for livestock animals. Currently, another dairy farm and another egg farm are 9 threatened by closure. Such closures increase the State's 10 dependence on imported foods and threaten the State's food 11 12 security and ability to achieve levels of agricultural selfsufficiency. Self-sufficiency is critical to the State's 13 ability to respond effectively in the event of natural disasters 14 or disruptions in transportation. 15

16 Closure of local dairies and poultry farms also means that 17 children and adults throughout the State will no longer have the 18 option of selecting fresh, locally produced milk, fresh HB1221 SD2 LRB 07-4048.doc

chickens, and eggs. The public throughout the State has often
 expressed interest in obtaining locally produced milk, but
 unfortunately, the dairies do not produce enough to meet the
 public demand. The public has expressed similar interest for
 island fresh beef, pork, chicken, and eggs.

Fresh beef, milk, pork, chickens, and eggs provide
essential nutritional needs to consumers. Because these food
products are perishable, there is a constant risk of food
spoilage caused by long transports that, in turn, can cause
food-borne illnesses to consumers.

Without these local industries, all beef, milk, pork, chicken, and eggs would have to be imported into the State, incurring up to ten days of shipping before being offered to the consumers. Increased shipping time especially decreases the expected shelf life of fresh milk and eggs.

16 The purpose of this Act is to create a livestock 17 revitalization and food security program to administer and 18 disburse funds to qualified cattle, dairy, hog, and poultry 19 farms that apply for and receive, if properly documented, a 20 reimbursement for up to fifty per cent of each farm's feed 21 expenses. With financial support, the livestock industry will 22 be able to make investments in modern equipment, expand and



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1	improve their herds and flocks, and develop new markets and		
2	products. This financial support will serve a public purpose by		
3	enabling the livestock industries to stabilize their operations,		
4	thus, contributing to food security, and make them more		
5	competitive with mainland suppliers in the future.		
6	SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by		
7	adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read		
8	as follows:		
9	"CHAPTER		
10	LIVESTOCK REVITALIZATION PROGRAM		
11	§ -1 Definitions. As used in this chapter:		
12	"Administrative costs" means costs associated with		
13	reviewing, approving, and recording expenditures and completing		
14	any reporting requirements associated with the grant program.		
15	"Department" means the department of agriculture.		
16	"Milk" means the lacteal secretion, practically free from		
17	colostrums, obtained by the milking of healthy cows normally		
18	produced or marketed through the channels of the fluid milk		
19	trade.		
20	"Poultry products" means chicken eggs, uncooked in shell,		
21	egg laying chicks, meat bird chicks, pullets, broilers, fryers,		
22	and laying chicken hens.		
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1	"Qualified producer" means any person that at the time of		
2	application for and disbursement of funds under this chapter is		
3	in the business of producing:		
4	(1) Milk from a herd, located in Hawaii, of not less than		
5	three hundred fifty cows;		
6	(2) Poultry products from a flock, located in Hawaii, of		
7	not less than three thousand birds;		
8	(3) Pork from a herd, located in Hawaii, of ten sows or		
9	one hundred fifty pigs; or		
10	(4) Beef from a herd, located in Hawaii, of not less		
11	than head of cattle		
12	§ -2 Grants. A qualified producer may receive a		
13	reimbursement for up to fifty per cent of each farm's feed		
14	expenses, if the qualified producer has properly applied for a		
15	grant under this chapter. The amount of reimbursement to each		
16	qualified producer shall be calculated under a formula		
17	established and adopted by the department.		
18	§ -3 Grants; conditions and qualifications. (a)		
19	Applications for grants by qualified producers shall be		
20	submitted on a form furnished by the department and shall be		
21	filed with accompanying documentation of animal feed costs;		
22	provided that:		
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1	(1)	The applicant shall comply with applicable federal and
2		state laws prohibiting discrimination against any
3		person on the basis of race, color, national origin,
4		religion, creed, sex, age, sexual orientation, or
5		disability;
6	(2)	The applicant shall have applied for or received all
7		applicable licenses or permits;
8	(3)	The applicant shall indemnify and hold harmless the
9		State and its officers, agents, and employees from all
10		claims arising out of or resulting from the feed
11		purchased;
12	(4)	The subsidy shall not be allowed within a fiscal
13		quarter if the flock or herd size falls per
14		cent or more below the required minimum three thousand
15		birds, minimum three hundred fifty cows, minimum ten
16		sows or one hundred fifty pigs, or minimum head of
17		cattle in any two months of the applicable fiscal
18		quarter; and
19	(5)	The department may request an applicant to provide
20		necessary information for the purposes of verifying
21		flock or herd size and feed purchases.

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1 Documentation of animal feed costs, as requested by (b) 2 the department, shall be filed for feed purchased within the 3 immediate preceding fiscal quarter of filing and shall be 4 effective for feed costs incurred after July 1, 2007. 5 (c) Funds shall be disbursed upon approval by the 6 department and limited to only the feed fed to the qualifying 7 flock or herd, and not applicable to feed purchases for resale or gift. 8 9 -4 Exemption from chapter 42F. Chapter 42F shall not 5 10 apply to the grants made pursuant to this chapter, but all reimbursements shall be made only in accordance with the 11 standards and conditions specified in section 12 -3." 13 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 14 , or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and 15 16 the same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009, for the market development division of the 17 18 department of agriculture to disburse funds to qualified 19 producers of milk, pork, and poultry for the cost of feed for 20 beef cattle, dairy cows, hogs, or poultry and to provide for the administrative costs of the livestock revitalization program. 21

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The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act.

3 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
4 provided that section 3 of this Act shall take effect on July 1,
5 2007.
