A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STATE PLANNING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1		PART I
2	SECTI	ON 1. The purpose of this part is to:
3	(1)	Update the duties and responsibilities of the office
4		of planning in managing and coordinating a statewide
5		geospatial information and data integration program;
6	(2)	Stress the importance of data sharing among government
7		agencies to maintain a comprehensive data resource
8		that can be drawn upon for decision-making related to
9		such essential public policy issues as land use
10		planning, resource management, homeland security, and
11		the overall health, safety, and well-being of Hawaii's
12		residents;
13	(3)	Appropriate funds to implement a geographic
14		information system enterprise license agreement; and
15	(4)	Establish a special fund to help support the operation
16		and maintenance of the program and to enable the
17		office of planning to collect moneys to facilitate
18		operational aspects of the statewide geographic

1		information system and to charge fees for spatial		
2		analysis services.		
3	SECTION 2. Chapter 225M, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
4	amended b	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
5	and to re	ad as follows:		
6	" <u>§22</u>	5M- Statewide geospatial information and data		
7	integrati	on special fund. (a) There is established in the		
8	state tre	asury the statewide geospatial information and data		
9	integrati	on special fund, into which shall be deposited:		
10	<u>(1)</u>	Moneys directed, allocated, or disbursed to the		
11		statewide geospatial information and data integration		
12	•	program from other government agencies or private		
13		sources to help support the acquisition of hardware,		
14		software, applications, and databases;		
15	(2)	Moneys directed, allocated, or disbursed to the		
16		statewide geospatial technologies program from non-		
17		state sources, including but not limited to grants,		
18		awards, and donations;		
19	(3)	Moneys collected as fees for geographic information		
20		system services rendered; and		
21	(4)	Investment earnings credited to the assets of the fund		
22		and all interest on special fund balances.		



1	<u>(b)</u>	The statewide geospatial information and data
2	integrati	on special fund shall be used to help defray the cost
3	of includ	ing but not limited to the following:
4	(1)	Programs and activities to implement this chapter,
5		including the provision of state funds to match
6		federal funds from the United States Geological Survey
7		or other federal departments; and
8	(2)	Operating costs of the statewide geographic
9		information system, including acquisition and
10		maintenance of hardware or software necessary to
11		implement this chapter, acquisition and maintenance of
12		geospatial and other data, application development,
13		training, and other products or services of general
14		benefit to the statewide geospatial information and
15		data integration program and its stakeholders."
16	SECT	ION 3. Section 225M-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended b	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
18	"(b)	The office of planning shall gather, analyze, and
19	provide i	nformation to the governor to assist in the overall
20	analysis	and formulation of state policies and strategies to
21	provide c	entral direction and cohesion in the allocation of
22	resources	and effectuation of state activities and programs and
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1	effectively address current or emerging issues and				
2	opportuni	ties.	More specifically, the office shall engage in

13			basic research [in order], conversions, and
14			integration to provide a common data base for

16			by state agencies;
17		(B)	Planning, [developing, implementing, and]
18			coordinating, and maintaining a comprehensive,
19			shared statewide planning and geographic
20			information system[+] and associated geospatial
21			database. The office shall be the lead agency

1	[establishment] maintenance of [a] the multi-
2	agency, statewide geographic information system
3	and [the development of planning] coordinating,
4	collecting, integrating, and disseminating
5	geospatial data sets that are used to support a
6	variety of state agency applications[, including]
7	and other spatial data analyses to enhance
8	decision making[+]. The office shall promote and
9	encourage free and open data sharing among and
10	between all government agencies. To ensure the
11	maintenance of a comprehensive, accurate, up-to-
12	date geospatial data resource that can be drawn
13	upon for decision-making related to essential
14	public policy issues such as land use planning,
15	resource management, homeland security, and the
16	overall health, safety, and well-being of
17	Hawaii's citizens, and to avoid redundant data
18	development efforts, state agencies shall provide
19	to the shared system either their respective
20	geospatial databases or, at a minimum, especially
21	in cases of secure or confidential data sets that
22	cannot be shared or must be restricted, metadata

1		describing existing geospacial data. In cases
2		where agencies provide restricted data, the
3		office of planning shall ensure the security of
4		that data; and
5		(C) Maintaining a centralized depository of state and
6		national planning references;
7	(5)	Land use planning. Developing and presenting the
8		position of the State in all boundary change petitions
9		and proceedings before the land use commission,
10		assisting state agencies in the development and
11		submittal of petitions for land use district boundary
12		amendments, and conducting periodic reviews of the
13		classification and districting of all lands in the
14		State, as specified in chapter 205;
15	(6)	Coastal and ocean policy management. Carrying out the
16		lead agency responsibilities for the Hawaii coastal
17		zone management program, as specified in chapter 205A.
18		Also, developing and maintaining an ocean and coastal
19		resources information, planning, and management system
20		further developing and coordinating implementation of
21		the ocean resources management plan, and formulating

	ocean policies with respect to the exclusive economic
	zone, coral reefs, and national marine sanctuaries;
(7)	Regional planning and studies. Conducting plans and
	studies to determine:
	(A) The capability of various regions within the

	(B) The potential physical, social, economic, and
	environmental impact on these regions resulting
	from increases in both resident populations and
	visitors;
	(C) The maximum annual visitor carrying capacity for
	the State by region, county, and island; and
	(D) The appropriate guidance and management of
	selected regions and areas of statewide critical
	concern.
	The studies in subparagraphs (A) to (C) shall be
	conducted at appropriate intervals, but not less than
	once every five years; and
(8)	Regional, national, and international planning.
	Participating in and ensuring that state plans,
	policies, and objectives are consistent, to the extent

2	international planning efforts."
3	SECTION 4. Section 225M-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended to read as follows:
5	"§225M-6 Fees for statewide geographic information system
6	services[-] and products. The office of planning may charge
7	fees for statewide geographic information system services and
8	products. All fees collected for geographic information system
9	analyses and other related services shall be deposited into the
10	statewide geospatial information and data integration special
11	fund for the sole purpose of supporting the statewide planning
12	and geographic information system. The office shall adopt rules
13	setting fees for geographic information system services and
14	products."
15	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
16	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
17	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 to
18	carry out the purposes of this part, including the execution of
19	a state geographic information system software enterprise
20	license agreement.

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- 1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of 2 planning of the department of business, economic development, 3 and tourism for the purposes of this part. SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general 4 5 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ for fiscal year 2007-2008 to be deposited into the statewide 6 geospatial information and data integration special fund. 7 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the statewide 8 9 geospatial information and data integration special fund the sum 10 of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 to support state planning programs and activities 11 12 and the operations of the statewide planning and geographic 13 information system. 14 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of

and tourism for the purposes of this part.

SECTION 8. During the 2005 special session, the
legislature adopted Act 8, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005,
which created the Hawaii 2050 sustainability task force to
review the Hawaii state plan and the State's planning process,
and required the office of the auditor to prepare and submit to

planning of the department of business, economic development,

- 1 the legislature the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan. In 2006,
- 2 the legislature adopted Act 210, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006,
- 3 which extended the life of the task force after the members
- 4 recommended in their report before the 2006 regular session that
- 5 more time was required to perform necessary research and
- 6 community outreach to create the Hawaii 2050 sustainability
- 7 plan.
- 8 The task force continued to hold several meetings
- 9 throughout the 2006 legislative interim and launched a
- 10 successful sustainability kick-off event in August, 2006, that
- 11 was attended by several sectors of the community statewide. The
- 12 Hawaii 2050 sustainability kick-off event launched community
- 13 engagement and public education activities throughout the State
- 14 during the fall of 2006.
- 15 The purpose of this part is to appropriate moneys to
- 16 provide additional funding for the Hawaii 2050 sustainability
- 17 task force to develop the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan.
- 18 SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the general
- 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and
- 21 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- year 2008-2009 to provide additional funding for the Hawaii 2050



- 1 sustainability task force to develop a Hawaii 2050
- 2 sustainability plan to be submitted to the legislature before
- 3 the convening of the 2008 regular session.
- 4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of
- 5 the auditor for the purposes of this part.
- 6 PART III
- 7 SECTION 10. During the 2005 special session of the
- 8 legislature, the legislature passed Act 12, Special Session Laws
- 9 of Hawaii 2005, which clarified that the department of business,
- 10 economic development, and tourism has sole jurisdiction over
- 11 land and state planning functions, and directed the office of
- 12 planning to report only to the department of business, economic
- 13 development, and tourism. Section 225M-2(a), Hawaii Revised
- 14 Statutes, was amended to emphasize the importance of the office
- 15 of planning and accordingly required that its director be
- 16 nominated by the governor, by and with the advice and consent of
- 17 the senate, and appointed by the governor without regard to
- 18 chapter 76, Hawaii Revised Statutes. It was the intent of the
- 19 legislature when enacting Act 12 that the position of director
- 20 of the office of planning be given a high level status within
- 21 the executive branch and that its term of office coincide with
- 22 the governor's term of office, in a similar manner as the single



- 1 executive of a principal department of the State, beginning
- 2 after the general election of 2006.
- 3 The purpose of this part is to clarify the legislative
- 4 intent and application of Act 12, Special Session Laws of Hawaii
- 5 2005, so that the director of the office of planning, on the day
- 6 after the 2006 general election, and any director thereafter to
- 7 serve in that capacity, submit to the advice and consent of the
- 8 senate.
- 9 SECTION 11. Section 225M-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- "(a) There is established within the department of
- 12 business, economic development, and tourism an office of
- 13 planning. The head of the office shall be known as the director
- 14 of the office of planning, referred to in this chapter as
- 15 director. The director shall have: training in the field of
- 16 urban or regional planning, public administration, or other
- 17 related fields; experience in programs or services related to
- 18 governmental planning; and experience in a supervisory,
- 19 consultative, or administrative capacity. The director shall be
- 20 nominated by the governor and, by and with the advice and
- 21 consent of the senate, appointed by the governor without regard
- 22 to chapter 76, and shall be compensated at a salary level set by



- 1 the governor. The director shall hold office for a term to
- 2 expire at the end of the term for which the governor was
- 3 elected, unless removed sooner by the governor. The director
- 4 shall be included in any benefit program generally applicable to
- 5 the officers and employees of the State. The director shall
- 6 retain such staff as may be necessary for the purposes of this
- 7 chapter, in conformity with chapter 76. The director shall
- 8 report to the director of business, economic development, and
- 9 tourism and shall not be required to report directly to any
- 10 other principal executive department."
- 11 SECTION 12. Act 12, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005,
- 12 is amended by amending section 5 to read as follows:
- "SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its
- 14 approval[-]; provided that any person serving as the director of
- 15 the office of planning on the day after the 2006 general
- 16 election and any director thereafter shall be subject to advice
- 17 and consent by the senate."

- 19 SECTION 13. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 20 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 21 SECTION 14. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Report Title:

Geographic Information System; Hawaii 2050 Sustainability Task Force; Appropriation; Office of Planning; Director; Advice and Consent

Description:

Clarifies the office of planning's role in maintaining and coordinating a statewide enterprise geographic information system (GIS). Appropriates funds to support the implementation of a GIS software enterprise license agreement. Establishes a special fund to help support the operation and maintenance of the statewide planning and geographic information system. Appropriates funds for the development of the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan. Clarifies the advice and consent process for the director of office of planning to submit to the advice and consent of the senate. (SD2)
