A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE DEPOSIT BEVERAGE CONTAINER PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:


- 1 SECTION 1. In 2002, the legislature recognized that
- 2 community participation is crucial to environmental protection
- 3 and litter reduction. Thus, Act 176, Session Laws of Hawaii
- 4 2002, was enacted to establish the deposit beverage container
- 5 program for the purpose of increasing community participation in
- 6 the recycling program by raising recycling rates for deposit
- 7 beverage containers.
- 8 In February 2006, the department of health issued a report
- 9 to the legislature on the activities of the deposit beverage
- 10 container program. The report states that the program is well
- 11 on its way to reaching its eighty per cent goal of redemption of
- 12 deposit containers, which is an indicator of the program's
- 13 success. However, the primary complaint received by the
- 14 department as the program has evolved has been from consumers
- 15 who redeem large quantities of recyclables.
- 16 The department implemented segregated rates, weighing rates
- 17 for separate types of containers, which allow redemption centers



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- 1 to weigh large quantities of recyclables as opposed to counting.
- The current law, section 342G-117(c), Hawaii Revised Statutes, 2
- 3 enables the department to choose to pay the redemption centers
- 4 the handling fee and refund value on the basis of weight.
- 5 does not state that the redemption centers may pay redeemers the
- 6 refund value on the basis of weight. This method of segregated
- 7 rates has caused consumers to receive reduced refunds which has
- 8 created the unintended consequence of discouraging community
- 9 participation in the recycling program.
- 10 Since the deposit beverage container program was
- 11 established, schools, businesses, and nonprofit organizations
- 12 have begun picking-up containers from public parks, beaches, and
- 13 streets, collecting these recyclables for fundraisers.
- 14 activities need to be encouraged by paying redeemers the full
- 15 refund value for all beverage containers.
- The purpose of this Act is to encourage community 16
- 17 participation in the deposit beverage recycling program by
- 18 requiring redemption centers to count a minimum of two hundred
- 19 deposit beverage containers, per redeemer, at redeemer's
- 20 request.
- 21 SECTION 2. Section 342G-114, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 22 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:



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1	" (d)	Redemption centers shall:
2	(1)	Accept all types of empty deposit beverage containers
3		for which a deposit has been paid;
4	(2)	Verify that all containers to be redeemed bear a valid
5		Hawaii refund value;
6	(3)	[Pay] Compute the refund value payment per deposit
7		beverage container at the redeemer's request for up to
8		two hundred containers, per redeemer, and pay to the
9		redeemer the full refund value in either cash or a
10		redeemable voucher for all deposit beverage
11		containers, except as provided in section 342G-116;
12	(4)	Ensure each deposit beverage container collected is
13		recycled through a contractual agreement with an out-
14		of-state recycler or an in-state recycling facility
15		permitted by the department; provided that this
16		paragraph shall not apply if the redemption center is
17		operated by a recycler permitted by the department;
18		and
19	(5)	Forward the documentation necessary to support claims
20		for payment as stated in section 342G-119."

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1 SECTION	3.	Within	thirty	days	of	the	effective	date	of
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- 2 this Act, the department shall adopt rules to implement this
- 3 Act.

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- 4 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 5 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 6 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
