A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that steel plates placed 2 in the roadway during construction or repairs can pose a threat 3 to motorists and their vehicles. Steel plates can be hazardous 4 because of the raised edge presented to oncoming traffic. They 5 can be dangerous for motorcyclists even in the best weather and 6 are especially hazardous for motorcyclists in wet conditions.

7 The legislature also finds that the State lacks a uniform 8 policy to warn motorists of the presence of steel plates in the 9 roadway during construction or repairs. While the state 10 department of transportation adheres to the standards of the 11 Manual on Uniform Traffic Devices, these standards do not address the use of steel plates. Instead, the department avoids 12 13 using steel plates on roadways where the speed limit is thirty-14 five miles per hour or more because of the difficulty of braking on the steel surface. 15

16 The legislature further finds that the county of Maui has 17 recently adopted a policy requiring the use of signs to warn 18 motorists whenever steel plates are used. However, the county SB LRB 07-0516.doc

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1 of Hawaii has no policy requiring placement of warning signage, the county of Kauai believes that existing road construction 2 3 signage is sufficient, and the city and county of Honolulu 4 allows contractors to determine what signage is necessary. 5 The purpose of this Act is to enhance traffic safety 6 statewide by requiring that, whenever construction or repair 7 work is performed on a public highway by the State, a political 8 subdivision, or a private contractor, motorists be warned with 9 appropriate signage of the presence of steel plates in the 10 roadway. 11 SECTION 2. Chapter 264, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 12 13 and to read as follows: 14 "§264- Use of steel plates during public highway construction or repair. (a) Whenever the State, a political 15 16 subdivision thereof, or a private contractor performing construction work or repairs on a public highway places steel 17 18 plates in the roadway to conceal holes or otherwise make the 19 roadway passable to vehicular traffic, signs or other 20 appropriate devices specifically warning of the presence of steel plates shall be posted in a manner so as to warn oncoming 21 22 vehicles.



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
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1	(b) The director of transportation shall adopt rules
2	pursuant to chapter 91 establishing standards for the type and
3	placement of devices required by subsection (a).
4	(c) Noncompliance with this section or with rules adopted
5	hereunder shall be considered a violation and subject to the
6	penalties imposed in section 706-640."
7	SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
8	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
