A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR HANA HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Act 263, Session 1 Laws of Hawaii 1996, authorized the transfer of the Hana medical 2 3 center to Hana Health (formerly known as Hana Community Health Center) in 1997, with a quarantee to continue providing needed 5 financial support for its essential medical programs. The Hana community would not have accepted this transfer without the 6 commitment to ensure the center's continued viability. 7 The legislature further finds that Hana, Maui is one of the 8 most isolated areas in the State. During the rainy season from 9 10 October to March, the frequent storms often wash out the roadways and disrupt electricity and telephone services. 11 town is fifty-seven miles from Wailuku. The trip takes 12 approximately two hours along a single lane road with six 13 14 hundred seventeen turns and fifty-six one-lane bridges. district is made up of small, isolated settlements scattered 15 over two hundred thirty-three square miles. Many of the 16 villages are located a minimum of forty-five minutes from the 17 main town of Hana. A number of homes in the district do not 18



- 1 have basic infrastructure such as electricity, telephones, or
- 2 running water.
- 3 Hana Health provides a hybrid of services due to Hana's
- 4 relative isolation. Unlike most primary care clinics, Hana
- 5 Health must also coordinate activities with the ambulance
- 6 service and provide assistance in stabilizing patients with life
- 7 threatening illness or traumatic injury. These services are
- 8 required twenty-four hours a day because the center is the only
- 9 full service health care provider in the district. The
- 10 coordination of emergency services and provision of life support
- 11 care is absolutely essential to the residents of Hana and the
- 12 six hundred thousand tourists who visit annually.
- Hana also has some of the worst health and socioeconomic
- 14 indicators in the State. Native Hawaiians account for sixty-
- 15 five per cent of Hana Health's patients. Hana is federally
- 16 designated as a medically underserved population, mental health
- 17 underserved population, dental underserved population, and as a
- 18 health professional shortage area. Hana Health provides
- 19 prevention-oriented health care, acute and chronic care, urgent
- 20 care, waived laboratory testing under the Clinical Laboratory
- 21 Improvement Amendments of 1988 (Public Law 100-578), and
- 22 prepackaged medications in lieu of a full service pharmacy. A



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- 1 limited level of home health care is also provided, and seniors
- 2 and those with mobility problems have benefited from this
- 3 program.
- 4 In fiscal year 2005-2006, Hana Health provided medical care
- 5 to 1,681 patients, who made 6,466 visits to the health center.
- 6 This was an increase of sixteen per cent from the previous
- 7 fiscal year. Visitors accounted for twenty per cent of the
- 8 patients, all of whom required urgent or emergency care. There
- 9 were two hundred fifty-eight urgent and emergency visits, one
- 10 hundred forty-one of which took place after regular operating
- 11 hours. Ninety-one of these patients (an average of two per
- 12 week) were treated, stabilized, and transported to Maui Memorial
- 13 Medical Center by ground or air ambulance.
- 14 Hana Health provided dental services to six hundred forty-
- 15 four patients, who made 1,428 visits to the dentist. Almost
- 16 half of all dental patients were either uninsured or insured
- 17 through a medicaid dental plan.
- 18 "Mai E Ai" is a meal program for seniors age sixty or
- 19 older. The program was started with a small federal grant and
- 20 now serves more than eleven thousand meals to ninety-two kupuna
- 21 living in the Hana district. Based on the traditional Hawaiian
- 22 diet and "local style" cooking, the program uses fresh fruits



- 1 and vegetables grown on the health center campus. The Hana
- 2 Fresh organic farm provides employment for twelve Hana
- 3 residents, several of whom are recovering from drug addiction
- 4 substance abuse problems.
- 5 In addition to the senior meal program, Hana Health
- 6 provides a series of wellness initiatives. Hana Health's
- 7 fitness program provides Hana residents with an opportunity to
- 8 modify their lifestyles through exercise and the development of
- 9 healthy eating habits. Several classes, which accommodate all
- 10 fitness levels, are held throughout the day, and each concludes
- 11 with a light, healthy meal. Approximately thirty-five
- 12 individuals regularly participate in these classes, and
- 13 approximately seven thousand meals are provided annually. The
- 14 Nutrition Based Diabetes Management Program is a pilot project
- 15 that incorporates nutrition education and the delivery of
- 16 healthy meals to fifteen diabetic patients. More than one
- 17 thousand three hundred healthy meals were served in a five-month
- 18 period with noted improvement in thirteen of sixteen key
- 19 measures for the management of this chronic health condition.
- 20 The project will be expanded over the next twelve months to
- 21 include additional diabetic patients, as well as those with
- 22 hypertension, heart disease, and weight management problems.



- Hana Health prepares and delivers healthy snacks approximately 1 three thousand six hundred - to an estimated sixty school-aged 2 children who participate in the county of Maui summer pals 3 program. Hana Health also sponsors a weekly salad bar for four 4 hundred Hana school students in an effort to improve the 5 consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables and prevent the onset 6 7 of chronic health conditions. Hana Health prepares the meals and snacks for its wellness 8 initiatives using its own Hana fresh farm produce. 9 healthy meals and snacks are currently prepared in a tiny, 10 substandard one hundred square foot kitchen that is more than 11 seventy-five years old and in desperate need of replacement. 12 When Hana Health operated as the Hana medical center as 13 part of the State's community hospitals system, it required a 14 subsidy of approximately \$1,500,000 annually, not including the 15 administrative functions provided by the Maui Memorial Hospital. 16 Immediately upon transfer to the private, not-for-profit Hana 17 Health in 1997-1998, the legislature reduced its appropriation 18 for the center's operation to \$1,064,000. This was a thirty per 19 cent reduction in funding in Hana Health's first year of 20
- 22 appropriated \$800,000 for the operation of the center. This was

operation. In fiscal year 1998-1999, the legislature



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- \$264,000 less than the amount appropriated the year before, or a 1 second reduction of twenty-five per cent in the center's second 2 year of operation. In the following two years, the legislature 3 appropriated \$750,000 for operations, a further reduction of six 4 per cent during the center's third year of operation. In fiscal 5 year 2003-2004, the legislature reduced the appropriation to 6 7 \$700,000, but increased it back to \$750,000 for fiscal year 8 2004-2005. Finally, in fiscal years 2005-2006 and 2006-2007, the legislature increased the appropriation to \$1,000,000. This 9 is still thirty per cent less than the \$1,500,000 provided to 10 11 the original Hana medical center, and does not account for costof-living increases that have taken place over the past nine 12 13 years. Hana Health has demonstrated its commitment to the people 14 of the Hana district and its ability to generate funds from a 15 variety of funding sources to start up new and innovative 16 programs. Despite this, Hana Health will always need state 17 support to fund core medical services. This is a fact that has 18 been recognized by the administration and the legislature prior 19
- The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds to Hana
 Health to allow it to continue its current level of operations
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to privatization.

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- 1 and to further develop its capacity to meet the on going needs
- 2 of this isolated community.
- 3 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$2,200,000, or so
- 5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and
- 6 the same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 7 year 2008-2009, for the following at Hana Health:
- **8** (1) Operational expenses

\$1,200,000

- 9 (2) Commercial kitchen equipment/installation \$1,000,000
- 10 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 11 of health for the purposes of this Act.
- 12 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
