A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO VOTING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the citizens of
 Hawaii do not have an absolute constitutional right to vote.
 The state constitution allows a citizen to vote if that citizen
 is a voter registered as provided by law. In the United States,
 voting is a privilege granted to citizens through the enactment
 of laws.

7 The legislature further finds that citizens have an 8 inherent right to vote as part of their responsibility as 9 citizens of the State and this right should not be hindered 10 without just cause. The right to vote is necessary to enable 11 citizens to govern through a representative form of government. 12 Therefore, the legislature finds that barriers to the exercise 13 of this right should be removed and citizens should be 14 encouraged to exercise this right. One of the barriers to 15 voting is the thirty-day voter registration requirement. Voter-16 friendly initiatives, such as same-day voter registration, 17 should be implemented. Same-day voter registration permits



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eligible voters to register on primary and general election days
 and vote.

3 Same-day voter registration has been adopted in at least
4 six states, including Idaho, Maine, Minnesota, New Hampshire,
5 Wisconsin, and Wyoming. Analysis of same-day voter registration
6 program data indicates that:

7 The six states with same-day voter registration (1) 8 procedures consistently lead the nation in voter 9 turnout. In 2004, an average of seventy-four per cent of eligible voters turned out to vote in states with 10 11 same-day voter registration compared to sixty per cent in states without same-day voter registration; and 12 In Minnesota, seventy-seven per cent of eligible 13 (2) voters voted in the 2004 presidential election. 14 15 Wisconsin and Maine, which also have same-day voter 16 registration programs, finished second and third, 17 respectively, in voter turnout.

18 A 2000 survey among non-voters ranked same-day voter 19 registration as the most popular voter reform that would make 20 voters more likely to vote.

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1	The purpose of this Act is to allow same-day voter	
2	registration on the date of an election and to change the voter	
3	registration cut-off date to fifteen days prior to an election.	
4	SECTION 2. Chapter 11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended	
5	by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to	
6	read as follows:	
7	" <u>§11-</u> Same-day voter registration. (a) Notwithstanding	
8	any law to the contrary, an individual who is eligible to vote	
9	may register on election day by:	
10	(1)	Appearing in person at the polling place for the
11		precinct in which the voter maintains a residency;
12	(2)	Completing a voter registration application;
13	(3)	Making an oath on a form prescribed by the chief
14		election officer; and
15	(4)	Providing proof of residency.
16	<u>(b)</u>	An individual may prove residency for purposes of this
17	section by presenting:	
18	(1)	<u>A valid Hawaii driver's license or state</u>
19		identification card; or
20	(2)	Any documentation approved by the chief election
21		officer.

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1 (c) No precinct official shall receive the vote of any 2 individual who is not registered pursuant to subsection (a) or 3 section 11-15. 4 (d) The chief election officer or a designee of the chief election officer shall maintain a record of the number of 5 6 individuals who attempted to register on election day, but who 7 were unable to provide proof of residency pursuant to subsection 8 (b). The record shall be included with the election returns for 9 each precinct. 10 (e) The chief election officer shall establish rules and 11 procedures pursuant to chapter 91, as necessary to carry out 12 this section." 13 SECTION 3. Section 11-24, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 14 amended by amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows: 15 "(a) At 4:30 p.m. on the [thirtieth] fifteenth day prior 16 to each primary, special primary, or special election (but if the day is a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday then at 4:30 p.m. on 17 18 the first working day immediately thereafter), the general 19 county register shall be closed to registration for persons 20 seeking to vote at the primary, special primary, or special election and remain closed to registration until after the 21

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election, subject to change only as provided in sections 11-1 21(c), 11-22, 11-25, 11-26, 11- , and this section. 2 3 (b) Notwithstanding the closing of the register for 4 registration to vote at the primary or special primary election, 5 the register shall remain open for the registration of persons 6 seeking to vote at the general or special general election, 7 until 4:30 p.m. on the [thirtieth] fifteenth day prior to the 8 general or special general election (but if the day is a 9 Saturday, Sunday, or holiday then at 4:30 p.m. on the first 10 working day immediately thereafter), at the end of which period 11 the general county register shall be closed to registration and 12 remain closed until after the general or special general 13 election next following, subject to change only as provided in 14 sections 11-21(c), 11-22, 11-25, [and] 11-26[-], and 11- ." 15 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 16 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 17 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval. 18
