### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO INCARCERATED PARENTS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that during the 1990s, the number of incarcerated parents in the United States grew by 2 approximately fifty-nine per cent. The legislature further 3 finds that currently there is no means of determining the exact 4 number of incarcerated individuals with minor children in Hawaii 5 as no procedure is in place for collecting such data. However, 6 it is estimated that there are approximately three thousand, one 7 hundred and sixty-three parents of six thousand, six hundred and 8 sixty-five children in Hawaii's prison system. An increased 9 10 focus needs to be placed on the children of incarcerated 11 individuals in order to maintain the parent-child bond.

12 Studies indicate that the children of incarcerated 13 individuals suffer from a multitude of negative consequences, 14 including possible displacement from their home and separation 15 from their primary or secondary caregiver. As a result, these 16 children experience strong emotional reactions to the 17 incarceration and disruption in their home life, leading to a



1 significant increase, up to six times more likely, of becoming 2 involved in the criminal justice system themselves. State 3 policies contribute to the breakdown of the family by failing to 4 facilitate the continued relationship between incarcerated 5 individuals and their children, when the relationship is in the best interest of the child. Denial of visitation is a means of 6 punishment or discipline of the incarcerated individuals, but 7 those who truly suffer are the children. However, strengthening 8 9 family relationships has a positive effect on preventing recidivism as studies have shown it can lessen the possibility 10 11 • of future incarceration after an inmate's release from a 12 correctional facility. Studies have also shown that therapeutic 13 involvement with families during incarceration builds better and 14 stronger relationships between the incarcerated parent's 15 children and the incarcerated parent once the parent is 16 released.

A successful model has already been developed and
implemented in the State. The supporting keiki of incarcerated
parents (SKIP) project aims to strengthen families, decrease
abuse and neglect of children of incarcerated parents, and
decrease the occurrence of repeat incarceration. The SKIP
program works with incarcerated fathers at Waiawa correctional



1 facility, and has been a model for projects in correctional facilities for both men and women inmates, such as No Na Kamalii 2 3 and Ohana Strengthening at the Maui community correctional center and for Makua Keiki at the Kauai community correctional 4 5 center. A partnership is also currently underway to replicate 6 the program in the Hawaii community correctional center. All of the related SKIP programs have formed a coalition known as the 7 8 SKIP Partnership. In addition to an educational playgroup, the 9 program also enrolls inmate parents in parenting programs such 10 as Kamalama classes based on traditional Hawaiian values, and 11 the First Teachers Nurturing Fathers program which helps them to 12 nurture themselves and others and to develop good parenting 13 skills. The combination of education, play and learn groups, 14 and support groups is aimed at increasing an incarcerated parent's ability to provide a safe and nurturing environment for 15 16 young children.

17 Therefore, the legislature determines that the State should 18 take an active role in aiding these families through the 19 provision of parent-child interaction programs such as the SKIP 20 program, to ensure that these children can build and maintain 21 strong relationships with incarcerated parents and grow into 22 well-adjusted, contributing members of the community, breaking

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1 generational cycles of abuse, neglect, violence, and crime that
2 lead to incarceration.

3 The purpose of this Act is to support the expansion of
4 parent-child interaction programs such as the SKIP program, at
5 other state correctional facilities to facilitate appropriate
6 child visitation of incarcerated parents.

7 SECTION 2. Parent-child interaction. (a) Within the department of public safety, programs, such as the supporting 8 9 keiki of incarcerated parents program, shall be developed for 10 and implemented in both male and female state correctional facilities. Funding provided by this Act shall be used for: 11 12 (1)The development and implementation of parent-child 13 interaction programs that meet security requirements, such as the supporting keiki of incarcerated parents 14 15 program, throughout the state correctional system, including: 16

17 (A) Training of public safety personnel on the merits18 of the program; and

19 (B) Hiring of additional public safety personnel to
20 facilitate the implementation of the programs.
21 (2) The collection of accurate demographic data on the
22 children of incarcerated parents, including the number



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of children each incarcerated parent has, the 1 children's ages, resident addresses and schools, 2 3 custody and caregiving arrangements, and necessary 4 services; and (3) An independent review of the programs using 5 6 researchers such as the University of Hawaii at Manoa 7 public policy center. 8 (b) The department of public safety shall submit the 9 independent review, including any recommendations and proposed legislation to the legislature no later than twenty days prior 10 to the convening of the 2009 regular session. 11 12 (C) The department of public safety shall contract with nonprofit health and human service agencies, communities of 13 14 faith, and other relevant agencies or organizations to establish 15 and implement parent-child interaction programs under this Act. 16 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 17 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and 18 19 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 20 year 2008-2009 for parent-child interaction programs at state 21 correctional facilities.



1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department

2 of public safety for the purposes of this Act.

3 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
