A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Section 302A-1103, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended to read as follows:
3	"§302A-1103 Principal; authority and responsibility. The
4	role of the principal shall include but not be limited to
5	overseeing the day-to-day management of the school, the primary
6	function of which is to develop and deliver instructional
7	services to students in accordance with statewide educational
8	policy and to enable students to meet or exceed statewide
9	academic standards. The principal shall:
10	(1) Ensure that the curriculum facilitates the achievement
11	of the statewide student performance standards adopted
12	for the public school system;
13	(2) [Develop and present to the school community council
14	for its review and approval, academic and financial
15	plans relating to the school; With the school's
16	faculty, shall collaboratively develop the academic
17	and financial plan along with input from the school
18	community council. The principal shall present to the

1		school community council for its review and approval,
2		the final academic and financial plans relating to the
3		school;
4	(3)	[Exercise authority over the implementation of the
5		budget, policies, and operations of the school; and]
6		In accordance with the approved academic and financial
7		plans, relevant board of education and department of
8		education rules, policies, regulations, and
9		procedures, shall exercise authority over the
10		implementation of the budget, policies, and operations
11		of the school; and
12	(4)	Collaborate with other principals in the principal's
13		school complex to ensure that:
14		(A) Logical, sequential curricula are adopted within
15		the school complex;
16		(B) Best practices are shared among and implemented
17		by schools within the school complex;
18		(C) The goals and objectives of the school complex
19		are being met;
20		(D) The use of school complex-based personnel and
21		contractors who divide their time between more

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1	than c	one school in a school complex is
2	coordi	nated to maximize efficiency; and
3	(E) The pa	ssage of students through the continuum of
4	grades	is coordinated in a manner consistent with
5	section	on 302A-1004."
6	SECTION 2. Sect	ion 302A-1124, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended by amending s	subsection (e) to read as follows:
8	"(e) Unless oth	erwise specified, each school community
9	council shall establi	sh policies governing the council's
10	composition, election	, staggered terms of office for members,
11	operation, and vacano	eies; provided that:
12	(1) The number	of school personnel [on] any school
13	community o	ouncil shall be equal to the number of
14	primary sta	keholders on the school community council;
15	(2) At the elem	mentary and middle school levels, each
16	school comm	nunity council shall be composed of the
17	principal a	and at least one member representing each of
18	the follows	ng groups:
19	(A) Parent	s elected by ballots distributed among and
20	collec	eted from the parents of the school's
21	studer	nts;

1		(B)	Teachers elected by ballots (distributed among
2			and collected from teachers of the school;
3			through a process determined by the exclusive
4			representative;
5		(C)	Noncertificated school personnel elected by
6			ballots distributed among and collected from
7			noncertificated personnel of the school;
8		(D)	Community representatives elected by ballots
9			distributed among and collected from parents of
10			the school's students; and
11		(E)	Student representatives selected by the student
12			council of the school; and
13	(3)	At t	he high school level, each school community
14		council shall be composed of the principal and at	
15		least one member representing each of the following	
16		groups:	
17		(A)	Parents elected by ballots distributed among and
18			collected from parents of the school's students;
19		(B)	Teachers elected by ballots [distributed among
20			and collected from teachers of the school;
21			through a process determined by the exclusive
22			representative;

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1	(C)	Noncertificated school personnel elected by
2		ballots distributed among and collected from
3		noncertificated personnel of the school;
4	(D)	Community representatives elected by ballots
5		distributed among and collected from the parents
6		of the school's students; and
7	(E)	Student representatives selected by the student
8		council of the school.
9	For the p	urposes of this subsection, "primary stakeholders"
10	means students	, parents, and community members."
11	SECTION 3	. Act 51, Session Laws of Hawaii 2004, is amended
12	by amending se	ction 34 to read as follows:
13	"SECTION	34. Ultimately all education reform must be
14	driven by the	needs of students. Students are the primary
15	clients served	by the public education system and they must be
16	served well by	providing them with access to the tools they need
17	to succeed, a	nurturing environment conducive to learning, and
18	supplementary	opportunities for growth that facilitate their
19	development.	
20	The legis	lature finds that much of an individual's
21	cognitive, emo	tional, and social development takes place in
22	their earliest	years of life. To a significant extent,
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- 1 opportunities during this age set the parameters for an 2 individual's development throughout the rest of the individual's 3 life. The legislature further finds that grade three is a pivotal year in preparation for the No Child Left Behind Act's 4 5 assessment plans. For this reason, children in the preceding 6 grades should be provided with the instructional support needed 7 to ensure superior performance in assessment instruments 8 mandated by the No Child Left Behind Act. 9 For these reasons, the Legislature finds that a class size of not more than twenty-five students per teacher [to-be 10 11 advisable] in kindergarten, grade one, and grade two classrooms. 12 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funding to: 13 (1)Provide mathematics textbooks and other mathematics 14 learning materials: 15 (2) Reduce class size in kindergarten, grade one, and 16 grade two; 17 (3) Provide for full-time, year-round, high school student
- 19 (4) Programs that support parents in working with students
 20 who need additional help to succeed in school provided
 21 the programs have measurable outcomes."

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1	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or
3	so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008,
4	to reduce kindergarten class size.
5	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
6	education for the purposes of this Act.
7	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
8	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so
9	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, for
10	establishing new teacher advisors/peer assistance mentors on a
11	ratio of fifteen new teachers to one new teacher advisor/peer
12	assistance mentor.
13	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
14	education for the purposes of this Act.
15	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
17	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
