A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. (a) The legislature finds that smaller school
- 2 environments are of great advantage to teachers, students, and
- 3 parents. Hawaii has explored smaller learning communities in
- 4 the past by considering various reforms, including "turning
- 5 points" in 1989, "breaking ranks" in 1996, and approaching
- 6 interested foundations such as the Annenberg Foundation and the
- 7 Gates Foundation. However, Hawaii has not been able to
- 8 implement a system-wide smaller learning community initiative.
- **9** (b) The legislature also finds that research and
- 10 experience indicate that smaller schools enable teachers to
- 11 create more personalized relationships with students, leading to
- 12 learning opportunities based upon students' needs and interests.
- 13 Smaller schools provide an ideal environment for project-based
- 14 and place-based learning, ranging from class-based, teacher-
- 15 designed projects to whole school design.
- 16 Project-based learning is distinct from the typical
- 17 classroom experience in that it is holistic in scope and depth

- 2 developed projects or student-derived projects. Project-based
- 3 learning and place-based learning is distinguishable from the
- 4 typical classroom experience in the following ways:
- 5 (1) They are holistic in scope and depth: students see a
 6 project from start to finish in both a linear and
 7 cyclical process;
- 8 (2) They offer students a choice in learning in both
 9 teacher-developed projects and student-derived
 10 projects;
 - (3) Place-based learning typically incorporates elements of service learning and environmental education with a project-based structure. Problem-based education, modeled after the medical profession, emphasizes skill building through real-world challenges;
 - (4) Project-based learning is a natural way to do cross-disciplinary work within the classroom or school, as students are encouraged to look at learning in a new way, and incorporates state and national standards seamlessly by pulling standards out of the project, not the project out of the standards; and

1	(5)	Project-based learning builds trust between staff and					
2		students because students are given a voice, and					
3		teachers are put in a place of learning right					
4		alongside students. Students utilize their personal					
5		knowledge, express their culture, build on their					
6		strengths, and validate their passions. Learning					
7		becomes more enjoyable.					
8	(c)	The legislature further finds that the department of					
9	education	, facilitated by various grants, has explored schools-					
10	within-sch	nools, but it has not created a major smaller learning					
11	community	initiative. In addition, Act 298, Session Laws of					
12	Hawaii 200	06, enacted the public charter schools law, codified as					
13	chapter 30	02B, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which does not provide					
14	for smalle	er learning communities.					
15	The c	department of education is considering the potential					
16	cost savings of consolidating smaller schools. Cost savings						
17	appear to be a higher priority than the research-documented						
18	benefits of smaller learning communities. The legislature find						
19	that the	cost savings approach to school consolidation is					
20	irrational	l in the face of overwhelming evidence that small					
21	schools an	re beneficial to students. Various authoritative					
22	educationa	al studies have found that students in smaller schools:					
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Are more academically successful than those in larger 1 (1)schools; 2 (2) Have higher graduation rates; 3 4 (3) Are more likely to take advanced-level courses, and to participate in extracurricular activities. 5 The purpose of this Act is to establish the framework for 6 the department of education to implement smaller learning 8 communities. SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and 10 to read as follows: 11 . SMALLER LEARNING COMMUNITIES 12 "PART \$302A-Purpose. The purpose of this part is to 13 establish smaller learning communities consisting of smaller 14 schools. Smaller learning communities greatly enhance the 15 achievement of students, including but not limited to, higher 16 grades, test scores, and college admissions, and better prepares 17 students for the workplace. 18 Establishment of policy. It shall be the policy 19

of the department to provide for the establishment of smaller

learning communities within existing schools or school

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1 districts, which shall have priority over the cost savings of 2 consolidating or closing schools. §302A-Guidelines. The following guidelines shall apply 3 4 to achieve the establishment of smaller learning communities 5 through smaller schools: Cost savings or enrollment shall not be the priority 6 (1)in closing or consolidating school facilities; Prior to closing or consolidating school facilities, (2) 8 the department shall determine if there is a private 9 provider willing to build early childhood education 10 facilities, as provided in section 302A-1506.5; 11 (3) Prior to the sale of school lands, as provided under 12 section 302A-1151, the department shall determine if 13 the school land or building is suitable for other 14 educational purposes, including but not limited to, 15 establishment of a smaller learning community or an 16 early childhood education facility operated by a 17 private provider; 18 (4) Prior to closing a smaller school, the department 19

shall assist that school to become a conversion

charter school, as defined in section 302B-1;

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1	(5)	The department shall explore alternate methods of
2		realizing cost savings, in lieu of closing or
3		consolidating school facilities, including sharing of
4		administrative support and specialized teachers among
5		schools within the same district; and
6	(6)	Prior to consolidation of school facilities, the
7		department shall obtain input of the parents and
8		faculty of an affected school.
9	§3022	A- Creation of smaller learning communities in
10	existing a	schools. No later than January 1, 2009, the department
11	shall deve	elop a plan for each middle, intermediate, and high
12	school ha	ving an enrollment of more than 1,500 students, to
13	create sma	aller learning communities within the school.
14	§3022	A- Creation of e-learning. Each school district
15	shall deve	elop a plan to utilize e-learning, encompassing
16	computer-	enhanced learning, web-based teaching materials, and
17	virtual le	earning, to enhance and create more personalized
18	learning e	environments.
19	As us	sed in this section, "virtual learning" means a managed
20	learning (environment in which all aspects of a course are
21	handled th	rough a consistent user interface standard throughout
22	the grade	level."

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SECTION 3. Section 302A-1151, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 1 amended to read as follows: 2 "[+] §302A-1151[+] Sale of school lands unnecessary for 3 4 school purposes. The chairperson of the board of land and natural resources [is hereby requested], upon the recommendation 5 and approval of the superintendent, [to] shall sell any state 6 lands, including the buildings thereon, once used but no longer 7 8 necessary for school purposes [-] and without the potential of being used for other educational purposes." 9 SECTION 4. Section 302A-1506.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 10 is amended to read as follows: 11 "[+]§302A-1506.5[+] Early childhood education facilities; 12 identifying sites[-]; closing or consolidation. (a) 13 department of education shall identify unused public school 14 facilities for use by early childhood education programs. 15 Suitable empty classrooms, as determined by the department, 16 shall be inventoried for potential use in early childhood 17 education programs. Priority shall be given to facilities on 18

sites with sufficient space for three or more classrooms to be

renovated or constructed.

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1 (b)	The	department	shall	assist	in	the	identification	of
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- 2 possible construction sites for private providers to build early
- 3 childhood education facilities.
- 4 (c) The department shall give priority to the application
- 5 of this section as a condition precedent to the closing or
- 6 consolidation of unused or underutilized school facilities."
- 7 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 8 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 9 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Report Title:

Education; Smaller Learning Communities

Description:

Provides for smaller learning communities in public schools. Prohibits the selling of school lands and buildings without consideration of using the land and buildings for small learning communities. Requires the department of education to give priority to establishing early learning facilities over closing or consolidating school facilities.
