A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

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1	SECTION 1. Chapter 201B, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	" <u>§201B-A</u> Tourism emergencies. (a) If the board
5	determines that the occurrence of world conflict, a terrorist
6	threat, a natural disaster, or the outbreak of disease,
7	regardless of when or where occurring, adversely affects
8	Hawaii's tourism industry by resulting in a substantial
9	interruption in commerce of the State and adversely affecting
10	the welfare of its people, the board shall submit a request to
11	the governor to declare that a tourism emergency exists.
12	(b) Upon declaration by the governor that a statewide
13	emergency exists triggering a tourism emergency pursuant to
14	subsection (a), the authority may develop and implement measures
15	to respond to the tourism emergency, including providing
16	assistance to tourist visitors during the emergency; provided
17	that any tourism emergency response measure implemented pursuant
18	to this subsection shall not include any provision that would



- 1 adversely affect the organized labor force in tourism-related
- 2 industries.
- 3 §201B-B Tourism emergency trust fund. (a) There is
- 4 established outside the state treasury a tourism emergency trust
- 5 fund to be administered by the board as trustee, into which
- 6 shall be deposited the revenues prescribed by section
- 7 237D-6.5(b). All investment earnings from moneys in the trust
- 8 fund shall be credited to the tourism special fund.
- 9 (b) Moneys in the trust fund shall be used exclusively to
- 10 provide for the development and implementation of emergency
- 11 measures to respond to any adverse effects on the tourism
- 12 industry, including providing emergency assistance to tourist
- 13 visitors during the emergency, resulting from world conflicts,
- 14 terrorist threats, natural disasters, or the outbreak of disease
- 15 that result in a substantial interruption of commerce of the
- 16 State and adversely affect the welfare of its people, pursuant
- 17 to section 201B-A.
- 18 (c) Use of the trust fund, consistent with subsection (b),
- 19 shall be provided for in articles, bylaws, resolutions, or other
- 20 instruments executed by the board as trustee for the trust
- 21 fund."



1	SECT	ION 2. Section 201B-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
3	"(a)	Except as otherwise limited by this chapter, the
4	authority	may:
5	(1)	Sue and be sued;
6	(2)	Have a seal and alter the same at pleasure;
7	(3)	Make and execute contracts and all other instruments
8		necessary or convenient for the exercise of its powers
9		and functions under this chapter; provided that the
10		authority may enter into contracts and agreements for
11		a period of up to five years, subject to the
12		availability of funds; and provided further that the
13		authority may enter into agreements for the use of the
14		convention center facility for a period of up to ten
15		years;
16	(4)	Make and alter bylaws for its organization and
17		internal management;
18	(5)	Unless otherwise provided in this chapter, adopt rules
19		in accordance with chapter 91 with respect to its
20		projects, operations, properties, and facilities;

1	(6)	Through its executive director represent the authority
2		in communications with the governor and with the
3		legislature;
4	(7)	Through its executive director, provide for the
5		appointment of officers, agents, and employees,
6		subject to the approval of the board, prescribing
7		their duties and qualifications, and fixing their
8		salaries, without regard to chapters 76 and 78 if
9		there is no anticipated revenue shortfall in the
10		tourism special fund and funds have been appropriated
11		by the legislature and allotted as provided by law;
12	(8)	Through its executive director purchase supplies,
13		equipment, or furniture;
14	(9)	Through its executive director allocate the space or
15		spaces which are to be occupied by the authority and
16		appropriate staff;
17	(10)	Engage the services of qualified persons to implement
18		the State's tourism marketing plan or portions thereof
19		as determined by the authority;
20	(11)	Engage the services of consultants on a contractual

basis for rendering professional and technical

assistance and advice;

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1	(12)	Procure insurance against any loss in connection with
2		its property and other assets and operations in such
3		amounts and from such insurers as it deems desirable;
4	(13)	Contract for or accept revenues, compensation,
5		proceeds, and gifts or grants in any form from any
6		public agency or any other source, including any
7		revenues or proceeds arising from the operation or use
8		of the convention center;
9	(14)	Develop, coordinate, and implement state policies and
10		directions for tourism and related activities taking
11		into account the economic, social, and physical
12		impacts of tourism on the State and its natural
13		resources infrastructure; provided that the authority
14		shall support the efforts of other state and county
15		departments or agencies to manage, improve, and
16		protect Hawaii's natural environment and areas
17		frequented by visitors;
18	(15)	Have a permanent, strong focus on marketing and
19		promotion;
20	(16)	Conduct market development-related research as
21		necessary;

1	(17)	Coordinate all agencies and advise the private sector
2		in the development of tourism-related activities and
3		resources;
4	(18)	Work to eliminate or reduce barriers to travel in
5		order to provide a positive and competitive business
6		environment, including coordinating with the
7		department of transportation on issues affecting
8		airlines and air route development;
9	(19)	Market and promote sports-related activities and
10		events;
11	(20)	Coordinate the development of new products with the
12		counties and other public sectors and private sectors,
13		including the development of sports, culture, health
14		and wellness, education, technology, agriculture, and
15		nature tourism;
16	(21)	Establish a public information and educational program
17		to inform the public of tourism and tourism-related
18		problems;
19	(22)	Encourage the development of tourism educational,
20		training, and career counseling programs;
21	(23)	Establish a program to monitor, investigate, and
22		respond to complaints about problems resulting

1		directly or indirectly from the tourism industry and
2		taking appropriate action as necessary;
3	(24)	Develop and implement emergency measures to respond to
4		any adverse effects on the tourism industry, pursuant
5		to section 201B-A;
6	[(24)]	(25) Set and collect rents, fees, charges, or other
7		payments for the lease, use, occupancy, or disposition
8		of the convention center facility without regard to
9		chapter 91;
10	[(25)]	(26) Notwithstanding the [provisions of] chapter 171,
11		acquire, lease as lessee or lessor, own, rent, hold,
12		and dispose of the convention center facility in the
13		exercise of its powers and the performance of its
14		duties under this chapter; and
15	[(26)]	(27) Acquire by purchase, lease, or otherwise, and
16		develop, construct, operate, own, manage, repair,
17		reconstruct, enlarge, or otherwise effectuate, either
18		directly or through developers, a convention center
19		facility."
20	SECT	ION 3. Section 237D-6.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21	amended b	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

1	"(b) Revenues collected under this chapter shall be
2	distributed as follows, with the excess revenues to be deposited
3	into the general fund:
4	(1) 17.3 per cent of the revenues collected under this
5	chapter shall be deposited into the convention center
6	enterprise special fund established under section
7	201B-8; provided that beginning January 1, 2002, if
8	the amount of the revenue collected under this
9	paragraph exceeds \$33,000,000 in any calendar year,
10	revenues collected in excess of \$33,000,000 shall be
11	deposited into the general fund;
12	(2) 34.2 per cent of the revenues collected under this
13	chapter shall be deposited into the tourism special
14	fund established under section 201B-11 for tourism
15	promotion and visitor industry research; provided that
16	beginning on July 1, 2002[+],
17	$[\frac{(A)-Of}{Of}]$ of the first \$1,000,000 in revenues
18	deposited:
19	[(i)] (A) Ninety per cent shall be deposited into the
20	state parks special fund established in section
21	184-3.4; and

1	((11)) (B) Ten per cent shall be deposited into the
2	special land and development fund established in
3	section 171-19 for the Hawaii statewide trail and
4	access program;
5	provided that of the 34.2 per cent, 0.5 per cent shall
6	be transferred to a sub-account in the tourism special
7	fund to provide funding for a safety and security
8	budget, in accordance with the Hawaii tourism
9	strategic plan 2005-2015; provided further that of the
10	revenues remaining in the tourism special fund after
11	revenues have been deposited as provided in this
12	paragraph and except for any sum authorized by the
13	legislature for expenditure from revenues subject to
14	this paragraph, beginning July 1, 2007, funds shall be
15	deposited into the tourism emergency trust fund,
16	established in section 201B-B, sufficient to maintain
17	a fund balance of \$5,000,000; and
18	(3) 44.8 per cent of the revenues collected under this
19	chapter shall be transferred as follows: Kauai county
20	shall receive 14.5 per cent, Hawaii county shall
21	receive 18.6 per cent, city and county of Honolulu

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1 shall receive 44.1 per cent, and Maui county shall receive 22.8 per cent. 2 All transient accommodations taxes shall be paid into the 3 state treasury each month within ten days after collection and 4 shall be kept by the state director of finance in special 5 6 accounts for distribution as provided in this subsection." SECTION 4. In codifying the new sections added by section 7 1 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute 8 9 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating 10 the new sections in this Act. SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 11 12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Description:

Allows the Hawaii tourism authority to request that the governor declare that a tourism emergency exists. Authorizes the tourism authority to implement emergency measures to respond to an emergency. Establishes the Hawaii tourism emergency trust fund. (SD2)
