A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CIVIL DEFENSE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

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PART I

2 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii is vulnerable 3 to a tsunami or hurricane disaster and recognizes the importance 4 of remaining vigilant in protecting its residents and guests 5 from these disasters. In view of lessons learned from the 2004 6 tsunami in South East Asia and Hurricane Katrina in Florida in 7 2005, and because these natural disasters pose a great potential 8 to cause vast devastation to Hawaii, the legislature deems it 9 vitally important to ensure that the State is adequately 10 prepared to deal with these disasters. While state and private 11 agencies have made great strides in becoming capable of 12 responding to a tsunami or hurricane disaster, more resources are needed to upgrade and decrease coverage gaps in the existing 13 14 warning systems.

15 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds to address16 disaster preparedness and recovery.

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1 SECTION 2. The director of finance is authorized to issue 2 general obligation bonds in the sum of \$, or so much 3 thereof as may be necessary, in each year of fiscal biennium 4 2007-2009, and the same sums, or so much thereof as may be 5 necessary, are appropriated for fiscal biennium 2007-2009, for 6 the purpose of installing additional sirens to the state civil 7 defense warning systems. 8 SECTION 3. The appropriation made for the capital 9 improvement project authorized by this Act shall not lapse at 10 the end of the fiscal biennium for which the appropriation is 11 made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation 12 unencumbered as of June 30, 2010, shall lapse as of that date. 13 SECTION 4. The sums appropriated in section 2 of this Act 14 shall be expended by the department of defense for the purposes 15 of that section. 16 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so 18 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and 19 the same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 20 year 2008-2009, for emergency supply caches to support disaster 21 victims and communities that may become isolated due to natural 22 disasters.

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1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 2 of defense for the purposes of this section. 3 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so 5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and the same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 6 7 year 2008-2009, for the state civil defense major disaster fund 8 established pursuant to section 127-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes. 9 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 10 for the purposes of this section. 11 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 12 , or so 13 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and 14 the same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 15 year 2008-2009, for the continued funding of non-declared 16 disaster activation and response. 17 The sums appropriated by this section shall be expended by 18 the department of defense for the purposes of this section. 19 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general 20 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and 21 22 the same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 2007-2080 SB796 SD2 SMA-1.doc

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year 2008-2009, for the state civil defense emergency supply 1 2 program to effectively equip emergency shelters in order to support special needs populations and to maintain the 3 4 development of the emergency supply program. 5 The sums appropriated by this section shall be expended by 6 the department of defense for the purposes of this section. 7 PART II 8 SECTION 9. Residents and businesses of the State are often 9 twice victimized when natural disasters strike. First, the 10 damage caused by a natural disaster is often extensive and 11 repair or replacement costs are prohibitive. Second, the 12 emergency relief from governmental agencies to meet the immediate needs of victims is often delayed or unavailable for 13 14 extended periods. For some victims of natural disasters, the 15 delay in receiving emergency assistance can mean a total loss of 16 their homes or businesses. The legislature finds that there is 17 an urgent need to provide victims with prompt emergency relief 18 during or immediately after a natural disaster. 19 The purpose of this part is to allow the governor, upon the declaration of an emergency, to release up to ten per cent of 20 the interest earned on the principal of the moneys in the 21 22 emergency and budget reserve fund to provide assistance to 2007-2080 SB796 SD2 SMA-1.doc

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1	residents and businesses that have sustained damage during or
2	immediately after a natural disaster.
3	SECTION 10. Chapter 128, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
5	and to read as follows:
6	" <u>§128-</u> Emergency and budget reserve fund expenditures.
7	Upon the declaration by the governor of an emergency due to a
8	natural disaster, the governor, by executive order, may
9	authorize the release and expenditure of moneys from the
10	emergency and budget reserve fund to provide grants of emergency
11	assistance up to \$, to residents or businesses of the
12	State for per cent of uninsured damages sustained from a
13	natural disaster, during or immediately after the natural
14	disaster, pursuant to section 328L-3(e). The office of civil
15	defense shall adopt rules specifying the form and documents
16	required for receipt of a grant."
17	SECTION 11. Section 328L-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	amended to read as follows:
19	"§328L-3 Emergency and budget reserve fund. (a) There is
20	established in the state treasury the emergency and budget
21	reserve fund, which shall be a special fund administered by the
22	director of finance, into which shall be deposited:
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1 (1) Twenty-four and one-half per cent of the moneys 2 received from the tobacco settlement moneys under 3 section 328L-2(b)(1); and 4 (2)Appropriations made by the legislature to the fund. 5 (b) All interest earned from moneys in the emergency and 6 budget reserve fund shall be credited to the general fund [-]7 except for moneys released pursuant to subsection (e)(1). 8 (c) Expenditures from the emergency and budget reserve fund shall be a temporary supplemental source of funding for the 9 10 State during times of emergency, economic downturn, or 11 unforeseen reduction in revenues. No expenditures shall be made 12 from the emergency and budget reserve fund except pursuant to 13 appropriations [-] or as provided in subsection (e). The general 14 appropriations bill or the supplemental appropriations bill, as 15 defined in section 9 of article VII of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, shall not be used to appropriate moneys from 16 17 the emergency and budget reserve fund. The governor, through an appropriations bill, may recommend expenditures from the 18 19 emergency and budget reserve fund by setting forth the purposes 20 of the expenditures consistent with subsection (d), the amounts, 21 and the reasons justifying the necessity for the appropriations.

1 (d) The legislature may make appropriations from the fund 2 for the following purposes: 3 To maintain levels of programs determined to be (1)4 essential to public health, safety, welfare, and 5 education; (2)To provide for counter cyclical economic and 6 7 employment programs in periods of economic downturn; 8 (3)To restore facilities destroyed or damaged or services 9 disrupted by disaster in any county; and 10 (4) To meet other emergencies when declared by the 11 governor or determined to be urgent by the 12 legislature. 13 Any act making appropriations from the emergency and budget 14 reserve fund shall include a declaration of findings and 15 purposes setting forth the purposes, the amounts, and the 16 reasons why the appropriations are necessary and shall require a 17 two-thirds majority vote of each house of the legislature. 18 Upon the declaration by the governor of an emergency (e) 19 due to a natural disaster, the governor, by executive order, may 20 authorize the release and expenditure of moneys from the fund to 21 provide grants of emergency assistance up to \$, to 22 residents or businesses of the State for per cent of 2007-2080 SB796 SD2 SMA-1.doc

4	(1)	The governor shall determine the amount of moneys to
5		be released based upon the recommendations of state
6		and county civil defense agencies; provided that the
7		amount expended shall not exceed ten per cent of the
8		interest earned on principal from moneys in the fund
9		at the time of the expenditure;
10	(2)	Within seventy-two hours after issuing the executive
11		order, the governor shall provide written notice to
12		the president of the senate and the speaker of the
13		house of representatives describing the intended use
14		of the moneys; and
15	(3)	The governor shall submit a report to the legislature
16		not later than twenty days prior to the convening of
17		the regular session or any special session immediately
18		following the occurrence of the natural disaster,
19		regarding the release and expenditure of moneys from
20		the fund under this subsection; provided that if the
21		natural disaster occurs in the period between thirty
22		days prior to the convening of a regular session or
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1		the closing of the regular session, the governor shall
2		submit the report not later than thirty days after
3		issuing the executive order. At a minimum, the report
4		shall:
5		(A) State the amounts released;
6		(B) Describe the purposes under subsection (d) for
7		which the funds were released;
8		(C) Explain the factors that necessitated the use of
9		moneys in the fund; and
10		(D) Provide recommendations for replacing the
11		expended moneys from the fund.
12	[-(e) -]	(f) Appropriations for the following purposes from
13	the emerge	ency and budget reserve fund are specifically
14	prohibited	1:
15	(1)	To meet expenses of the legislature;
16	(2)	To provide for salary adjustments for officials
17		appointed pursuant to article V, section $6_{,}$ or article
18		VI, section 3 <u>,</u> of the Constitution of the State of
19		Hawaii and for others whose salaries are directly
20		related to salaries of these officials; and
21	(3)	To fund cost items in any collective bargaining
22		contract."

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1	PART III
2	SECTION 12. The legislature finds that the October 2006,
3	6.7 magnitude earthquake in Hawaii illuminated the strengths, as
4	well as the areas needing improvement, in Hawaii's civil defense
5	network. Hawaii's diverse ethnic population is an additional
6	component that needs to be addressed in the civil defense system
7	during disasters and emergency.
8	In addition to ensuring statewide dissemination of
9	information in a timely manner, it is also imperative that the
10	information be provided in a format that is accessible and
11	understandable by everyone. A review in the aftermath of the
12	October 2006, earthquake and subsequent statewide power outage
13	brought forth many recommendations, including recommendation
14	number eleven of the final report of the governor's
15	comprehensive communications review committee that states:
16	"Work with the Hawaii consular corps so they can inform foreign
17	citizens about the nature of the emergency. KZOO (Japanese) and
18	KNDI (all other foreign languages) will broadcast the emergency
19	messages to non-English speaking residents and visitors in the
20	State. KZOO and KNDI will be assisted in their efforts to
21	establish backup power generators." This recommendation
22	supports the need for infrastructure improvements to further
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support the State's civil defense system in the event of an
 emergency.

3 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds to the
4 Ethnic Education Foundation of Hawaii to assist in disseminating
5 information to a broader range of the State's population in the
6 event of a disaster or emergency.

SECTION 13. There is appropriated out of the general
revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so
much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, to
the Ethnic Education Foundation of Hawaii, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit
organization, for generators to meet power capacity needs to
ensure service in emergency situations.

13 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of14 defense for the purposes of this section.

15 SECTION 14. There is appropriated out of the general 16 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so 17 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, to 18 the Ethnic Education Foundation of Hawaii, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit 19 organization, for other infrastructure improvements and 20 educational programs administered by the Hawaii state civil 21 defense to promote awareness of emergency procedures and

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contacts to non-English speaking and English-as-a-second language populations in the State.
 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
 defense for the purposes of this section.
 SECTION 15. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
 SECTION 16. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.

Report Title: Civil Defense; Appropriations

Description:

Authorizes general obligations bonds to fund the installation of additional sirens to the state civil defense warning system and allows the governor to order the release of up to ten per cent of moneys appropriated from interest earnings in the emergency and budget reserve fund to provide grants of emergency assistance for uninsured damages after a natural disaster. Appropriates funds for emergency supply caches, the state civil defense major disaster fund, the non-declared disaster activation and response, the state civil defense emergency supply program, and funds for the Ethnic Education Foundation of Hawaii to assist them in disseminating information in the event of a disaster.
