SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING FEDERAL, STATE, AND COUNTY AGENCIES TO IMPLEMENT THE 2006 OCEAN RESOURCES MANAGEMENT PLAN.

1 WHEREAS, section 205A-62, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires the Office of Planning, the agency responsible for the Coastal 2 Zone Management Program, to periodically update and coordinate 3 the implementation of the Ocean Resources Management Plan; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Office of Planning undertook extensive public 6 outreach and agency coordination to update the Ocean Resources 7 Management Plan, and in December 2006, the Office submitted an 8 updated Ocean Resources Management Plan to the Legislature; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the revised Ocean Resources Management Plan 11 12 distinguishes itself from previous efforts and plans in that it: 13 Adopts an integrated approach rather than a sector-14 (1)based approach; 15 16 Promotes an adaptive, learning approach with projects (2) 17 and implementation phases that are coupled with 18 opportunities to share experiences and lessons 19 20 learned; 21 22 (3) Relies on community and private sector initiatives as 23 well as government actions; and 24 Identifies responsibilities and a schedule for plan 25 (4)26 implementation that emphasizes interagency collaboration and public-private partnerships; and 27 28 WHEREAS, throughout 2004 and 2005, the Office of Planning 29 sought input from the Hawaii Ocean and Coastal Council, the 30 Marine and Coastal Zone Advisory Council, the Office of Hawaiian 31 Affairs, the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, various 32 community groups, ocean users, environmental nonprofits, and 33

1 members of the general public, and held a workshop that focused 2 on the issues, priorities, and any recommendations that should be included in the updated Ocean Resources Management Plan; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Ocean and Coastal Council held monthly meetings between May and October 2005, and produced long-term 6 goals and prioritized tiers of short- to mid-term goals; and 7 8 WHEREAS, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs held a series of 9 meetings called "Community Conversations" on each island to 10 allow the Native Hawaiian community to share their concerns and 11 knowledge about ocean and coastal issues for inclusion into the 12 13 Ocean Resources Management Plan; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs gave approximately seventeen informational presentations to various 16 17 public and private agencies on the ahupua'a concept, the need for ecosystem management, the negative impacts of overlapping 18 jurisdictions, and the need for public involvement in the 19 planning process; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, the Office of Planning held meetings with a 23 variety of ocean and coastal organizations regarding the Ocean 24 Resources Management Plan; and 25 WHEREAS, on October 26, 2005, the Office of Planning 26 27 conducted the Hawaii Ocean Resources Management Plan Workshop in partnership with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and the 28 29 Department of Land and Natural Resources to bring together a 30 wide base of stakeholders from government agencies, nonprofit organizations, community groups, small and large businesses, and 31 32 community members; and 33 34 WHEREAS, these meetings and workshops fostered a genuine 35 appreciation from all the organizations, agencies, and groups 36 for being included in the planning process and generated wide public support and interest in seeing the updated Ocean 37 Resources Management Plan implemented; and 38 39 WHEREAS, the Ocean Resources Management Plan Implementation 40 Working Group was created and consisted of business 41 representatives, the Department of Agriculture, the Department 42 of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, the Office of 43

Hawaiian Affairs, the Department of Land and Natural Resources, 1 2 the Department of Health, the Department of Transportation, and the four county planning agencies to meet and discuss the 3 framework, identify priorities, and review drafts of the Ocean 4 Resources Management Plan; and 5 6 WHEREAS, in September and October 2006, the Office of 7 Planning held a series of public meetings throughout the State 8 9 to gather input and comments on the final draft of the Ocean Resources Management Plan, and the draft was generally well 10 received by the public; and 11 12 13 WHEREAS, the updated Ocean Resources Management Plan is

 built upon a framework of three perspectives with the purpose of
 achieving management goals and strategic actions in five-year
 implementation phases over the next thirty years:

- 18 (1) Perspective One: Connecting Land and Sea, which
 19 reflects the traditional Native Hawaiian concept of
 20 ahupua'a management and recognizes the
 21 interconnectedness of the land and sea;
- (2) Perspective Two: Preserving Our Ocean Heritage, which
 reflects the traditional Native Hawaiian management of
 fisheries and coastal resources as well as a deep
 understanding and care for the marine environment; and
 - (3) Perspective Three: Promoting Collaboration and Stewardship, which reflects the need for a holistic approach to natural resource management; and

32 WHEREAS, the updated Ocean Resources Management Plan 33 provides a guide and integrated approach toward the management 34 of Hawaii's ocean and coastal resources; and 35

36 WHEREAS, the need to implement the updated Ocean Resources 37 Management Plan is imperative as the State faces significant 38 changes over the next twenty years, including increased 39 urbanization, tourism, recreational and commercial ocean uses, 40 sea level rise and other natural hazards, marine debris, and 41 invasive species; and

WHEREAS, the updated Ocean Resources Management Plan 1 establishes a proactive planning process that can assist in 2 mitigating the significant impacts to Hawaii's environment; now, 3 therefore, 4 5 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 6 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, the 7 House of Representatives concurring, that federal, state, and 8 county agencies are requested to implement the goals and 9 10 strategic actions in the 2006 Ocean Resources Management Plan; and 11 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature endorses the 14 2006 Ocean Resources Management Plan because the Plan establishes a framework for making informed decisions about the 15 use and management of the State's ocean and coastal resources 16 that are widely supported by the public; and 17 18 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all affected federal, state, and county departments or agencies receiving a certified copy of 20 21 this Concurrent Resolution submit a written report to the 22 Legislature of: 23 24 (1) The current status of the department or agency implementing the goals and strategic actions in the 25 2006 Ocean Resources Management Plan; 26 27 Any accomplished goals or benchmarks and any factors (2) 28 attributing to these accomplishments; and 29 30 (3) Any reasons for the department's or agency's failure 31 to meet these goals or benchmarks, or failure of 32 action; 33 34 35 no later than twenty days prior to the 2008 Regular Session, and then no later than twenty days prior to every Regular Session 36 37 thereafter with a final written report submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the 2012 Regular 38 Session; and 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 41 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor; the 42 Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism; the 43 Comptroller; the Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture; the 44 2007-2752 SCR107 SD1 SMA-2.doc
