SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE JUDICIARY TO MONITOR THE COLLECTION OF CRIME VICTIM COMPENSATION FEES.

1 2 3 4	WHEREAS, the Crime Victim Compensation Commission was established in 1967 to provide compensation to Hawaii's victims of violent crime; and
5	WHEREAS, the Legislature, in Act 206, Session Laws of
6	Hawaii 1998, established the mandatory crime victim compensation
7	fee to enable the Crime Victim Compensation Commission to become
8	fiscally self-sufficient and to eliminate the need for general
9	fund appropriations; and
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11	WHEREAS, many victims experience financial hardship and
12	cannot afford to pay for medical treatment, mental health
13	treatment, or other services they need in order to recover from
14	the harmful effects of violent crime, and, therefore, they must
15	seek compensation from the Crime Victim Compensation Commission;
16	and
17	WHEREAS, victims and their surviving family members will be
18 19	further traumatized if the Crime Victim Compensation Commission
19 20	lacks sufficient funding to provide them with compensation for
20	medical, mental health, funeral, and other expenses; and
22	mearcar, menear nearbar, randrary and obior emponded, and
23	WHEREAS, chapter 351, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires
24	judges to assess the mandatory crime victim compensation fee
25	against every defendant who has the ability to pay and who
26	enters a deferred plea or who is convicted of a petty
27	misdemeanor, misdemeanor, or felony; and
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29	WHEREAS, the Judiciary's collection of compensation fees is
30	less than their estimated revenue from compensation fee
31	collections; and
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WHEREAS, the Crime Victim Compensation Commission's surveys 1 of compensation fee assessments found that judges did not order 2 defendants to pay the compensation fee in all eligible cases; 3 4 and 5 WHEREAS, the failure to order and collect the mandatory 6 compensation fee in all eligible cases jeopardizes the 7 legislative intent of Act 206, Session Laws of Hawaii 1998, to 8 eliminate the need for general fund appropriations to fund 9 compensation for crime victims; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the Judiciary is in the best position to monitor 12 whether judges are ordering the mandatory compensation fee; now, 13 therefore, 14 15 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 16 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, the 17 House of Representatives concurring, that the Judiciary is 18 requested to provide the Legislature with a report detailing the 19 progress of the Judiciary in meeting the requirements of Act 20 206, Session Laws of Hawaii 1998, including specific information 21 regarding: 22 23 (1) Actual versus estimated compensation fee collections; 24 25 The number of eligible cases in which the fee was (2) 26 ordered; 27 28 (3) The number of eligible cases in which the fee was 29 collected; 30 31 (4) The number of eligible cases in which the fee was 32 waived; and 33 34 In eligible cases in which the fee was waived, the (5) 35 criteria used for waiving the fee; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Judiciary is requested to 38 report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no 39 later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular 40 Session of 2008; and 41 42 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 43 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chief Justice of the 44 2007-2277 SCR SMA.doc
