SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A TASK FORCE TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF A NATIVE HAWAIIAN HEALING PROGRAM THAT EMPHASIZE THE PRACTICE OF HO'OPONOPONO AND THE CONCEPT OF PU'UHONUA FOR EX-OFFENDERS AND PAROLEES TO FACILITATE THEIR REHABILITATION AND REENTRY INTO SOCIETY AND TO REDUCE RECIDIVISM.

WHEREAS, according to Department of Public Safety
statistics published in 2005, approximately forty-four per cent
of female offenders and thirty-seven per cent of male offenders
are of Native Hawaiian ancestry; and

6 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiians cultural practices include the 7 principle of ho'oponopono, or the act of righting a wrong through 8 traditional means of conflict resolution; and

10 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiians cultural practices include the 11 concept of pu[']uhonua, or place of refuge, where one who breaks 12 the kapu, or rules, can go to avoid punishment, and after making 13 the required restitution, can return home; and

WHEREAS, healing programs based on Native Hawaiian 15 practices have already proven to be effective, such as the 16 Girls' Court Program, a gender-specific and strength-based 17 program targeting female juvenile offenders, which was granted 18 the unique opportunity to volunteer on Kaho'olawe, where they 19 lived together, shared and restored the land by planting native 20 species of vegetation, cleared trails and paths, and learned 21 about the island's history; and 22

24 WHEREAS, these young women benefited personally, 25 spiritually, and educationally from this unique experience 26 through learning about their culture, providing community 27 service, and self-discovery about their young womanhood; and 28



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WHEREAS, a healing program for ex-offenders and parolees 1 targeted at healing and teaching Native Hawaiian traditions and 2 3 cultural practices would greatly benefit these individuals who 4 could also develop self worth and pride in their culture by increasing their knowledge and providing a purpose for 5 themselves, their families, and for future generations of 6 7 Hawaii's people; and 8 9 WHEREAS, this program could teach participants life skills with an emphasis on Native Hawaiian cultural traditions, and 10 help them become acquainted or reacquainted with their rich 11 heritage; now, therefore, 12 13 14 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 15 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, the 16 House of Representatives concurring, that the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission, with the assistance of the Department of 17 Public Safety, convene a task force to study the feasibility of 18 a statewide healing program for ex-offenders and parolees that: 19 20 (1)Emphasizes Native Hawaiian practices; 21 22 23 (2) Includes the practice of ho'oponopono and the concept of pu'uhonua; 24 25 (3) Establishes a pu'uhonua on each island to facilitate 26 27 ho'oponopono; and 28 (4) 29 Considers the possibility of a reciprocal healing program on Kaho'olawe; and 30 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force be composed of representatives of the following entities: 33 34 (1) 35 Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission; 36 The Protect Kaho'olawe 'Ohana; 37 (2)38 (3) The Department of Public Safety; 39 40 (4) The Department of Human Services; 41 42 43 (5)The Office of Hawaiian Affairs; and

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1 (6) Any other vested stakeholder these entities see fit; 2 3 and 4 5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the program be open to ex-offender and parolees who exhibit interest in and ability to 6 benefit from what would be a physically, mentally, and 7 spiritually challenging experience; and 8 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force look at 10 expanding existing programs and establishing new programs to 11 meet the needs of ex-offender and parolee populations throughout 12 the State; and 13 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force consider the 15 possible use of a reciprocal healing program at Kaho'olawe that 16 would not require the construction of a correctional facility or 17 any other additional facilities and would fully comply with 18 chapter 6K, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and Title X of the 1993 19 Department of Defense and Appropriations Act; and 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Department of Public Safety is 22 requested to submit a report to the Legislature on the 23 establishment of the task force requested by this measure, 24 including but not limited to any recommendations of the task 25 force no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the 26 Regular Session of 2008; and 27 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 29 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Public 30 Safety, the Director of Human Resources, the Chairperson of the 31 Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the 32 Chairperson of the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission, and the 33 Chairperson of the Protect Kaho'olawe 'Ohana. 34

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
