## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

## CONDEMNING THE UNITED STATES CITIZENSHIP AND IMMIGRATION SERVICES' FEE INCREASE.

WHEREAS, our Nation's and State's newcomers are making 1 valuable contributions to the social, cultural, and economic 2 life of the United States of America and the State of Hawaii; 3 4 and 5 WHEREAS, Hawaii is home to many hardworking, taxpaying, 6 legal permanent residents who are eager to become full Americans 7 by pursuing the dream of U.S. citizenship; and 8 9 WHEREAS, on January 31, 2007, the United States Citizenship 10 and Immigration Services (USCIS) announced a proposal that would 11 raise the fees for starting the naturalization process from \$400 12 to \$675, an increase of sixty-nine per cent; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the USCIS anticipates that the fee hike will go 15 into effect in June 2007; and 16 17 WHEREAS, naturalization fees have been soaring since 1991, 18 when legal permanent residents paid \$90 to apply for U.S. 19 citizenship; and 20 21 WHEREAS, naturalization fee increases result from our 22 Nation's fundamentally flawed system of financing immigration 23 services, which requires the USCIS to rely almost exclusively on 24 application fees to fund the delivery of services to immigrants; 25 and 26 27 WHEREAS, the USCIS believes that it needs this massive fee 28 hike to pay for major infrastructure investments and process 29 enhancements, such as improvements in the timeliness of 30 background checks, modernization of its outdated business 31

32 systems through technology upgrades, facilities improvements and



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enhancements in its personnel training and recruitment programs; 1 and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, there are at least 100,000, legal permanent 5 residents in Hawaii who are eligible to apply for U.S. 6 citizenship; and 7 WHEREAS, according to data from the 2000 Census, 38.4 per 8 cent of Hawaii's non-citizen households have annual incomes that 9 are less than \$25,000; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the proposed fee increase would place a nearly 12 insurmountable barrier in the path of legal permanent residents 13 who seek to naturalize, many of whom have limited financial 14 resources; and 15 16 WHEREAS, this body believes that the system for funding 17 immigration services should be a partnership between newcomers 18 and the federal government where applicants pay a reasonable fee 19 20 for quality service; and 21 WHEREAS, the USCIS' proposed fee increase is contrary to 22 the spirit of our Nation's and State's tradition of welcoming 23 24 and integrating immigrants, and sends legal permanent residents the wrong message at a time when they are seeking to embrace 25 U.S. citizenship; and 26 27 WHEREAS, naturalization benefits Hawaii by helping to 28 29 ensure that newcomers become full participants in our Nation's civic life; and 30 31 32 WHEREAS, the full participation of newcomers enriches and 33 maintains the vitality of our democracy; now, therefore, 34 35 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, the 36 House of Representatives concurring, that the Legislature 37 condemns the proposed fee increase by USCIS and requests a halt 38 on the fee increase for all naturalization applications; and 39 40 41 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature calls on the Director of the USCIS to immediately provide President George W. 42 Bush and the U.S. Congress with accurate information to 43 44 ascertain the amount of federal appropriations that would be 2007-1919 SCR SMA.doc



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needed to enable the USCIS to modernize its operations, and 1 enhance its naturalization services, without raising the 2 naturalization fee; and 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature calls on 5 President George W. Bush and the United States Congress to 6 address the fundamental problems in our Nation's system for 7 financing immigration services by providing appropriations to 8 supplement fee revenue to cover costs of major USCIS expenses 9 such as infrastructure investments, process enhancements and 10 capital improvements; and 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 13 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of the 14 USCIS, the President of the United States, the Speaker of the 15 United States House of Representatives, the President Pro 16 Tempore of the United States Senate for inclusion in the 17 Congressional Record, and each member of Hawaii's Congressional 18
