## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ESTABLISHING A SPECIAL MENTAL HEALTH TASK FORCE TO STUDY WHETHER HAWAII SHOULD PROVIDE A CONTINUUM OF MENTAL HEALTH CARE FOR INCARCERATED PERSONS.

1 WHEREAS, chapter 334, part VIII, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 2 relating to involuntary outpatient mental health treatment, 3 provides procedures and criteria for the involuntary outpatient 4 treatment for persons in need of mental health services; and 5

6 WHEREAS, the existing law on involuntary outpatient mental 7 health treatment was originally enacted by Act 251, Session Laws 8 of Hawaii 1984, and remains today in substantially the same 9 language; and

11 WHEREAS, the involuntary outpatient treatment law provides 12 for a maximum outpatient treatment period of not more than one 13 hundred eighty days or six months; and

15 WHEREAS, existing law does not provide for follow-up mental 16 health treatment after the expiration of six months, which in 17 many instances is sorely needed for the benefit of the patient 18 and the safety of society; and

WHEREAS, in Hawaii, a white paper submitted to the 2002 National Conference on Mental Health Statistics, by a professor at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, Department of Psychology, and the Adult Mental Health Division of the Hawaii Department of Health, estimates that the population with severe and persistent mental illness is 2.6 per cent of adults, or approximately 24,000 people; and

28 WHEREAS, the white paper found that 4,500 adults were 29 served by the Adult Mental Health Division, leaving a 30 discrepancy of nearly 20,000 adults who may not have received 31 needed mental health services, correcting for such variables as 32 insurance coverage and Medicaid; and

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2 WHEREAS, persons who have been discharged from further treatment after a maximum period of six months have a high 3 probability of needing continuous mental health care, but in all 4 5 likelihood do not receive such care because of a lack of further professional attention and care; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, discharged persons may go on to become involved in the criminal justice system; and 9 10 WHEREAS, The Honolulu Advertiser, on January 14, 2007, 11 reported on its investigation that found that the care of 12 13 mentally ill inmates in Hawaii's prison system is so deficient that many fail to get treatment and are subjected to conditions 14 considered harmful and likely to worsen their symptoms; and 15 16 WHEREAS, the prison mental health services are one 17 component of the total mental health care system in Hawaii in 18 which the entry point for mental health services is assisted 19 outpatient treatment; and 20 21 WHEREAS, a special mental health task force would be able 22 to expertly assess whether Hawaii should provide some form of 23 24 post-involuntary outpatient mental health care, and assess the quality and effectiveness of mental health services provided to 25 incarcerated persons; now, therefore, 26 27 28 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, the 29 30 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of Health is requested to establish a special mental health task 31 force and provide administrative support thereto; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the special mental health task 34 force be chaired by the Director of Health, or designee; the 35 Chief of the Adult Mental Health Division, or designee, of the 36 37 Department of Health; the Chief of the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division, or designee, of the Department of Health; the Chief 38 Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, or designee; the Director 39 of Public Safety, or representative; a representative of the 40 Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation, selected by 41 the corporation; the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County 42 43 of Honolulu, or designee; the Public Defender or designee; a representative of the Mental Health Association in Hawaii, to be 44



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selected by that organization; a representative of the Hawaii 1 Medical Psychiatric Association, to be selected by that 2 organization; a representative of the Hawaii Psychological 3 Association, to be selected by that organization; a 4 5 representative of the Community Alliance on Prisons, to be selected by that organization; a representative of the American 6 Civil Liberties Union, to be selected by that organization; and 7 the Legal Aid Society, to be selected by that organization; and 8 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the special mental health task force select a chair: and 11 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the special mental health task force is requested to conduct a study to assess whether Hawaii 14 should provide some form of post-involuntary outpatient mental 15 health care, and assess the quality and effectiveness of mental 16 health services provided to incarcerated persons; and 17 18 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the special mental health task 20 force is requested to report its findings and recommendations, including proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than 21 thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 22 2008; and 23 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 25 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health 26 the Chief of the Adult Mental Health Division, the Chief of the 27 28 Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division, the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, the Director of Public Safety, the Executive 29 30 Director of the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation, the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of 31 Honolulu, the Public Defender, the Mental Health Association in 32 Hawaii, the Hawaii Medical Psychiatric Association, the Hawaii 33 Psychological Association, the Community Alliance on Prisons, 34 35 the American Civil Liberties Union, and the Legal Aid Society. 36 37 38 OFFERED BY:
