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## SENATE RESOLUTION

OPPOSING THE CREATION OF A NATIONAL IDENTIFICATION CARD AND THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE REAL ID ACT OF 2005.

WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii recognizes the Constitution of the United States as our charter of liberty and the bill of rights as affirming the fundamental and inalienable rights of all Americans, including the freedom of privacy and the freedom from unlawful searches and seizures; and

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7 WHEREAS, Hawaii has a diverse population whose 8 contributions are vital to the State's economy, culture, and 9 civic character; and

11 WHEREAS, Hawaii is proud of its long tradition of 12 protecting civil rights and liberties of all of its residents, 13 affirming the fundamental rights of all people and, in some 14 circumstances, providing more expansive protections than are 15 granted by the United States Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii denounces terrorism in all its forms and condemns all acts of terrorism by any entity, wherever the acts may occur; and

21 WHEREAS, any new security measures to provide protection 22 from terrorist attacks should be carefully designed to enhance 23 public safety without infringing on the civil liberties and 24 rights of citizens; and

26 WHEREAS, the federal Real ID Act of 2005, Public Law 27 109-13, creates a national identification card by mandating 28 federal standards for state drivers' licenses and identification 29 cards and requiring states to share their motor vehicle 30 databases; and

32 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 mandates the documents 33 that states must require to issue drivers' licenses and requires 34 states to place uniform information on every driver's license in 35 a standard, machine-readable format; and 36



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WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 prohibits federal agencies 1 and federally-regulated commercial aircrafts from accepting a 2 driver's license or identification card issued by a state that 3 4 has not fully complied with the Act; and 5 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 creates a costly unfunded 6 mandate for the states, currently estimated to cost in excess of 7 \$11,000,000,000 to implement; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act requires the creation of a massive 10 public sector database containing information on every American 11 that is accessible to motor vehicle employees and law 12 enforcement officers nationwide and that can be used to gather 13 and manage information on citizens, which is not the 14 responsibility or business of the government; and 15 16 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 enables the creation of 17 additional massive private sector databases, combining both 18 transactional information and driver's license information 19 gained from scanning the machine-readable information to be 20 contained on every driver's license; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, it is likely that these public and private databases will contain numerous errors and false information, 24 creating significant hardships on Americans attempting to verify 25 their identities in order to fly, open bank accounts, or perform 26 many other functions required to live in the United States 27 28 today; and 29 30 WHEREAS, the Federal Trade Commission estimates that ten million Americans are victims of identity theft each year, and, 31 because identity thieves are increasingly targeting motor 32 vehicle departments, the Real ID Act of 2005 will further enable 33 34 the crime of identity theft by making personal information of all Americans more accessible from more locations; and 35 36 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 requires a driver's 37 license to contain a person's actual home address and makes no 38 39 exception for individuals in potential danger, such as undercover law enforcement officers or victims of stalking, 40 domestic violence, or criminal harassment; and 41 42 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 contains onerous record 43 44 verification and retention provisions that place unreasonable



1 burdens on the motor vehicle divisions and on third parties 2 required to verify records; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 will place enormous 5 burdens on consumers seeking new drivers' licenses, including waiting in longer lines, higher costs, increased document 6 7 requests, and longer waiting periods; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 will place motor vehicle 10 division staff on the front lines of immigration enforcement by 11 forcing public employees to determine federal citizenship and 12 immigration status; and 13 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 was passed as a rider to 14 15 an emergency appropriations measure for military operations in Iraq and Afghanistan, which did not receive a hearing by any 16 Congressional Committee or a vote solely on its own merits, 17 despite widespread opposition; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, the Real ID Act of 2005 eliminated a process of negotiated rulemaking initiated under the Intelligence Reform 21 and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004, which had convened 22 federal, state, and local policymakers and privacy and industry 23 24 experts to solve the problem of misuse of identity documents; 25 and 26 27 WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii expresses its support of the 28 United States government's campaign against terrorism, as well as the belief that such campaign should not be waged at the 29 expense of the civil rights and liberties of the citizens of 30 31 this country; now, therefore, 32 33 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, 34 35 that the Legislature of the State of Hawaii opposes the institution of a national identification card and the 36 37 implementation of the Real ID Act of 2005, particularly those 38 provisions that: 39 40 (1) Violate the rights and liberties guaranteed under the 41 Hawaii State Constitution or the United States 42 Constitution, including the bill of rights; and



(2) Create unfunded mandates for the State without any plan for financial subsidization for implementation; and

5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature of the State of 6 Hawaii supports the repeal of the Real ID Act of 2005 and urges 7 the Hawaii congressional delegation to support any legislation 8 that calls for the repeal, amendment, or, at a minimum, the 9 provision of proper funding for the implementation of the Real 10 ID Act of 2005; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States through the Secretary of State, the Majority Leader of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and the members of Hawaii's congressional delegation.

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
