## SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO FACILITATE PROVISION OF SOCIAL SERVICES TO NON-CITIZEN VICTIMS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING.

WHEREAS, terrified and alone, many non-citizen victims of 1 human trafficking escape to safety with only the clothes on 2 their backs; and 3 4 WHEREAS, without resources to secure housing, food, medical 5 care, or other basic necessities, non-citizen victims of human 6 trafficking struggle to survive in our communities; and 7 8 WHEREAS, victim assistance and services for trafficked 9 persons are constrained by factors such as legal provisions 10 barring undocumented migrants from benefits and victim-related 11 12 services; and 13 WHEREAS, individuals that are trafficked but are not 14 identified or recognized by law enforcement as victims of a 15 severe form of trafficking may be expeditiously removed or 16 detained in criminal detention facilities across the country; 17 18 and 19 WHEREAS, trafficking victims' fear of removal is exploited 20 by traffickers to keep individuals isolated and under their 21 control; and 22 23 WHEREAS, federal law may protect trafficked persons by 24 providing immigration status, permission to work, and possible 25 United States permanent residence once the victim is certified 26 as a severe victim of trafficking; and 27 28 WHEREAS, once trafficked persons are identified, 29 "certification" is a process by which trafficked persons are 30 deemed eligible for benefits and services to the same extent as 31 a refugee, namely federal and state benefits (including medical 32 services), housing, legal services, protection, victim 33



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1 2	compensation and assistance, immigration benefits and programs, restitution, and translation and interpretation services; and
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4	WHEREAS, because certification often requires a
5	considerable length of time to process, typically six months,
6	there is the need for pre-certification victim services, from
7	the time that individuals are identified as trafficked persons
8	until they are certified by federal law enforcement, during
9	which time trafficked persons may experience the greatest need
10	for services; and
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12	WHEREAS, trafficking victims are eligible for certain
13	federally funded services, namely emergency medicaid,
14	immunizations, and access to domestic violence shelters and
15	other exempt services but they are ineligible for other
16	federally funded services such as cash assistance programs or
17	state funded comprehensive health care services; now, therefore,
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19	BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth
20	Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007,
21	that the Department of Human Services is requested to:
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23	(1) Identify existing obstacles, in statute, rule, or
24	policy, that limit or deny benefits to victims of
25 26	trafficking; and
26 27	(2) Conduct a needs assessment to identify appropriate
27 28	social and financial services for victims of
29 29	trafficking, by public and private agencies, until
30	such time as the person secures a visa, certification,
31	or a work authorization card from the Department of
32	Homeland Security or other federal agency or is able
33	to return to their country of origin, if they wish to
34	do so; and
