## SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE ON CERTAIN AQUATIC SURF RESOURCES IN THE STATE INCLUDING THE COST OF FUNDING A STUDY ON THE FEASIBILITY OF CONSTRUCTING ARTIFICIAL REEFS.

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 187A-2(3), Hawaii Revised 1 2 Statutes, the Department of Land and Natural Resources is responsible for the establishment, management, and regulation of 3 4 artificial reefs in the waters of the State; and 5 WHEREAS, pursuant to section 187A-2(6), Hawaii Revised 6 7 Statutes, the Department of Land and Natural Resources is also 8 responsible for the gathering and compiling of information and statistics concerning the habitat and character of, and increase 9 10 and decrease in, aquatic resources in the State; and 11 WHEREAS, surfing is the official sport of Hawaii and Hawaii 12 is known worldwide for its excellent surfing conditions; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the sport of surfing has increased in popularity 15 extensively over the last century with studies suggesting that 16 over one hundred thousand surfers live on Oahu alone, and future 17 growth of the sport is expected; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, most surf that is formed near shore is caused by waves breaking over coral reefs; and 21 22 WHEREAS, surfing areas, particularly on Oahu, are becoming 23 increasingly crowded and unsafe due to the large number of 24 people in a small area of the water; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, technology has increased in recent years to the 28 point where creating an artificial reef for surfing may no longer be cost-prohibitive; and 29 30 WHEREAS, studies of benefits associated with the 31 construction of artificial reefs for surfing at various 32

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locations around the world have all shown significant benefits 1 compared to the costs; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, artificial reefs also provide an ideal habitat for marine life, such as fish and coral to propagate and 5 proliferate, thus enhancing fish populations, marine ecosystems, 6 and recreational opportunities in the surrounding ocean area; 7 8 and 9 WHEREAS, artificial reefs also reduce the harmful erosive 10 effects of storm waves on the beach, thereby protecting the 11 12 coastline; and 13 WHEREAS, these artificial reefs enhance the health and 14 wellness of the community by providing the local population with 15 greater access to the sport of surfing while also reducing 16 17 congestion at popular surf spots; and 18 WHEREAS, artificial reefs for surfing are usually composed 19 20 of submarine rock structures or highly durable mega-geobags filled with sand; and 21 22 WHEREAS, an area that could benefit from the installation 23 of additional artificial reefs for surfing is the Waianae 24 coastline on the island of Oahu; and 25 26 WHEREAS, an area that is frequented by many recreational 27 and commercial fishing boats as well as surfers. Waianae is in 28 29 need of establishing additional means of maintaining and 30 hopefully increasing its fish and marine life population as well as increasing its surfing opportunities; now, therefore, 31 32 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 33 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2007, 34 that the Department of Land and Natural Resources is requested 35 36 to report to the Legislature, not later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008, on the 37 38 following: 39 (1) Information and statistics concerning the character of 40 aquatic surf resources in the State; and 41 42

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1 2 3	(2) The estimated cost of a study to identify potential locations for artificial reefs designed for surfing and the cost of constructing such reefs; and
5 4	the cost of constructing such reers; and
5	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Land and
6	Natural Resources is requested to designate the Waianae coast on
7	the island of Oahu as its initial location for an artificial
8	reef study; and
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10	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
11	Resolution be transmitted to the Governor and the Chairperson of
12	the Board of Land and Natural Resources.
