SENATE RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING THE BREASTFEEDING MOTHERS' BILL OF RIGHTS OFFERED AS SENATE BILL NO. 1674 AND ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3782 IN THE NEW YORK STATE LEGISLATURE.

WHEREAS, the Surgeon General and the American Academy of 1 Pediatrics recommend that most babies be exclusively fed with 2 breast milk for the first six months of life, and continue on 3 with breast milk through the first year of life; and 4 5 WHEREAS, research in developed countries provides strong 6 7 evidence that breastfeeding decreases the incidence and severity 8 of diarrhea, lower respiratory infection, otitis media, and urinary tract infection; and 9 10 WHEREAS, breastfeeding also has economic benefits, as 11 mothers can expect to spend as much \$700 or more for the first 12 year of formula feeding; and 13 14 WHEREAS, a United States Department of Agriculture analysis 15 estimates that at least \$3,600,000,000 could be saved nationally 16 if only fifty per cent of mothers breastfed their infants until 17 they were at least six months old; and 18 19 WHEREAS, women who receive appropriate, culturally 20 sensitive information and support about breastfeeding during and 21 immediately following their childbirth delivery are eight times 22 more likely to continue breastfeeding for at least six weeks 23 24 compared to women who received little or no post delivery support about breastfeeding; and 25 26 WHEREAS, Senate Bill No. 1674 and Assembly Bill No. 3782 of 27 the New York State Legislature propose to codify every woman's 28 right to be informed about the benefits of breastfeeding and to 29 have an environment that is conducive to what all pediatricians 30 agree to be the safest and healthiest choice for newborn and 31 infant feeding; and 32 33 WHEREAS, the bills propose adoption of a statement of 34 rights, known as the breastfeeding mothers' bill of rights, to: 35

provide mothers with basic breastfeeding-related rights before, during and after the birth of their baby; require that the statement of rights be conspicuously posted in a public place in maternal health care facilities, nurseries, maternity floors, and post-delivery recovery rooms; and require assistance from lactation specialists in the hospital and after discharge; now, therefore,
