SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF INTEGRATING PEACE EDUCATION INTO THE SCHOOL CURRICULUM.

WHEREAS, our country is currently involved in a war in Iraq 1 that has killed thousands of American and Iragi peoples, has 2 cost the United States over 365 billion dollars, and to which 3 there seems to be no end in sight; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the violence that exists within our country is 6 reflected in the behavior of our youth, as demonstrated by the 7 increase in bullying in schools and situations like the 8 Columbine High School massacre; and 9 10 WHEREAS, Hawaii is very culturally, ethnically, and 11 12 religiously diverse, making our state unique and beautiful, but such a mixture can also lead to misunderstandings that can 13 sometimes escalate into violence; and 14 15 WHEREAS, some of the aggression that has afflicted mainland 16 schools has also afflicted Hawaii's classrooms, with incidents 17 of guns in schools, and severe beatings and psychological abuse 18 among peers; and 19 20 WHEREAS, the level of violence within our country and 21 consequently, in our schools, is growing at an alarming rate, 22 and it is becoming increasingly necessary to find other ways of 23 resolving conflict besides fighting; and 24 25 WHEREAS, there are models of experiential learning that 26 stimulate critical thinking and teach students to work together 27 to solve some of Hawaii's complex social issues, thereby 28 fostering a life of compassion and an understanding of inter-29 dependence between peers; and 30 31 WHEREAS, students would benefit greatly from inter-32 dependent activities that would help them gain knowledge of and 33 practice the skills necessary to reduce conflicts and prevent 34
