HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE ATTORNEY GENERAL TO INITIATE AN INVESTIGATION AND CORPORATE AUDIT OF THE HAWAII MEDICAL SERVICES ASSOCIATION'S PRACTICE OF MAINTAINING AN EXCESSIVE SURPLUS, PROVIDING LARGE BONUSES TO STAFF, AND REIMBURSEMENT PATTERNS OVER THE PAST TEN YEARS TO DETERMINE IF THE CHARITABLE RETURN TO THE COMMUNITY JUSTIFIES ITS NONPROFIT STATUS.

1 2	WHEREAS, Hawaii Medical Services Association (HMSA) covers 60 percent of the health insurance in the state; and			
3 4 5 6 7	WHEREAS, in 2007, \$1.8 million in bonuses was paid to HMSA executives at the same time that the company was proclaiming that doctors are leaving the state because they cannot afford to work here; and			
8 9 10	WHEREAS, HMSA is exempt from state premium taxes because it was set up in 1938 as a mutual benefit society; and			
11 12 13	WHEREAS, this exemption allowed HMSA to withhold \$560 million in state taxes over the past ten years;			
14 15 16	WHEREAS, the State's safety net hospitals, organized under the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC), reported a deficit			
17 18 19	of \$30.8 million, which prompted them to approach the Legislature with a request this session for an emergency appropriation to ensure continuous services; and			
20 21 22 23	WHEREAS, a recent study showed that Hawaii hospitals receive 92 cents on the dollar of its costs from commercial insurers; and			
23 24 25 26 27	WHEREAS, contrary to the study, HMSA has stated that reimbursements to doctors average 120 percent of the Medicare rate; and			



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2	WHEE	REAS, the national average for medical reimbursements is		
3	close to 135 percent of the Medicare fee schedule; and

5	WHEREAS, HMSA's actions in:			
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7	(1)	Providing minimal reimbursements to health care
