HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO ONLY PURCHASE OR LEASE LARGE SCHOOL BUSES THAT HAVE AN OPERABLE SEAT BELT ASSEMBLY AT ALL DESIGNATED SEATING POSITIONS AND SEAT BACKS THAT ARE AT LEAST TWENTY-FOUR INCHES IN HEIGHT.

WHEREAS, federal and state laws require certain motor 1 2 vehicle drivers and passengers to use seat belts because seat belts provide a measure of protection during accidents; and 3 4 WHEREAS, passenger cars, light trucks, and vans are 5 6 required under federal law to have seat belts at all designated seating positions; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, neither federal nor Hawaii law requires seat belts on school buses that have a gross vehicle weight rating of more 10 than ten thousand pounds, which is the standard weight of a 11 large school bus; and 12 13 WHEREAS, despite increased federal standards for school bus 14 15 passenger safety and crash protection, there are still thousands of injuries to children throughout the country each year due to 16 school bus accidents; and 17 18 WHEREAS, children suffer both minor and serious injuries to 19 their head, neck, back, and stomach when striking the roof, 20 windows, seat backs, and other school bus passengers during 21 crashes; and 22 23 WHEREAS, opponents of seat belts on large school buses 24 argue that strong, well-padded, energy absorbing seats and 25 higher seat backs compartmentalize passengers during a crash, 26 thereby providing adequate safety; and 27 28 WHEREAS, a comprehensive, in-depth study in 1989 by the 29 Transportation Research Board found that seat belts provide 30



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1 additional crash protection on compartmentalized school buses; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, in addition, a National Highway Traffic Safety 5 Administration study found that approximately one-third of the fatal crashes between 1977 and 1992 were non-frontal crashes 6 from which compartmentalization is not designed to protect; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, most school bus fatalities occur in rollovers; and 10 WHEREAS, crash test and case study data indicate that seat 11 belts provide improved crash protection and are especially 12 13 beneficial in side-impact and rollover school bus accidents; and 14 WHEREAS, seat belts also reduce other types of injuries by 15 restraining children who may otherwise be out of their seats, 16 thereby improving passenger behavior and reducing distractions 17 18 to school bus drivers; and 19 20 WHEREAS, California, Florida, Louisiana, New Jersey, and New York require school buses to meet a higher safety standard 21 than established under federal law; now, therefore, 22 23 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 24 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 25 Session of 2008, the Senate concurring, that the Board of 26 Education is urged to only purchase or lease large school buses 27 that have an operable seat belt assembly at all designated 28 seating positions and seat backs that are at least twenty-four 29 inches in height; and 30 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education is urged 32 to adopt rules requiring the use of seat belt assemblies, when 33 available, by pupils and appropriate school discipline for any 34 pupil in violation; and 35 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 37 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the 38 Board of Education and the Superintendent of Education. 39 40 41 42
