## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO DETERMINE THE FEASIBILITY OF REDUCING OR ELIMINATING THE USE OF TRANS FATS IN FOOD PREPARATION AND FOOD SERVICE BY HAWAII'S RESTAURANT INDUSTRY.

WHEREAS, although trans fats occur in small quantities in 1 meat and dairy products, most trans fats consumed today are 2 created as a side effect of partial hydrogenation of plant oils, 3 an industrial process developed in the early 1900s; and 4 5 WHEREAS, health authorities worldwide recognize that eating 6 trans fats that result from partial hydrogenation is neither 7 required nor beneficial for health, increases the risk of 8 coronary heart disease, and creates more of a health risk than 9 consumption of fats that occur naturally; and 10 11 WHEREAS, trans fats, which are tightly regulated in a few 12 countries and must be disclosed on product labels in many other 13 countries such as the United States, are being voluntarily 14 removed from food products by many companies that are 15 establishing trans fat-free product lines; and 16 17 WHEREAS, in May 2005, Tiburon, California, became the first 18 American city where all restaurants voluntarily cook with trans-19 fat-free oils; and 20 21 WHEREAS, in December 2006, the city of New York became the 22 first large United States city to strictly limit the use of 23 trans fats in restaurants; and 24 25 WHEREAS, similar legislation banning the use of trans fats 26 was approved in Philadelphia; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, other cities throughout the country including Chicago and Seattle are also considering a ban on oils 30 containing trans fats for large chain restaurants; and 31 32



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1 WHEREAS, the state of Massachusetts is considering 2 legislation to ban restaurants statewide from preparing food with trans fats; and 3 4 WHEREAS, major food chains such as Kraft, Kentucky Fried 5 Chicken, McDonalds, Wendy's, Taco Bell, and the Walt Disney 6 Company have chosen to reduce or remove trans fats from their 7 products by a specified date; now, therefore, 8 0 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 10 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 11 Session of 2008, that the Department of Health is requested to 12 determine the feasibility of reducing or eliminating the use of 13 trans fats in food preparation and food service by Hawaii's 14 restaurant industry; and 15 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is 17 requested to work with the Hawaii Restaurant Association and the 18 Hawaii Food Industry Association by surveying its members 19 concerning reducing or eliminating trans fats in their food 20 preparation or food service activities; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests that 23 the survey address issues such as consumer trends, costs and 24 availability of trans fat-free cooking oils, and economic, 25 health, education, and other concerns related to trans fat-free 26 food; and 27 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is 29 requested to submit a report of its findings and 30 recommendations, including proposed legislation, if necessary, 31 to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the 32 convening of the Regular Session of 2009; and 33 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the 36



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Director of Health, the Hawaii Restaurant Association, and the
Hawaii Food Industry Association.
