## HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE GOVERNOR TO DESIGNATE THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER AS "BRAIN ANEURYSM AWARENESS MONTH.".

WHEREAS, a brain aneurysm is a weak bulging spot on the 1 wall of a brain artery very much like a thin balloon or weak 2 spot on an inner tube; and 3 4 WHEREAS, aneurysms form silently from wear and tear on the 5 arteries, and sometimes can form from injury, infection, or 6 7 inherited tendency; and 8 9 WHEREAS, studies show that about two percent of the United States population has brain aneurysms, and approximately three 10 to six million people in the United States have unruptured brain 11 aneurysms; and 12 13 WHEREAS, brain aneurysms can occur in people of all ages, 14 but are most common in people, ages 35 to 60; and 15 16 WHEREAS, factors that doctors and researchers believe 17 contribute to the formation of brain aneurysms: 18 19 (1)Smoking; 20 21 (2)Traumatic head injury; 22 23 (3) Use of alcohol; 24 25 (4) Use of oral contraceptives; 26 27 (5) Family history of brain aneurysms; or 28 29 (6) Other inherited disorders; 30 31 32 and

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1 "S lowly I wake, no memories of hours past. **U** nbelievable circumstances, I did outlast. 2 **R** ecovering and healing both lie ahead. 3 **v** ictim, not I, but survivor, not dead. 4 5 I mpossible to grasp or want to know, **v** ery scared and hopeful, both high and low. 6 **O** ut of this illness, this tragedy, this pain, 7 R eal strength, real courage, and real love will remain." 8 9 -H. Karp, SAH Survivor; 10 11 and 12 WHEREAS, while only scanning technology such as magnetic 13 resonance imaging (MRI) or computed tomography (CAT Scan) can 14 detect a brain aneurysm, if detected before it ruptures, an 15 aneurysm can often be treated successfully with microsurgery; 16 17 and 18 WHEREAS, awareness and information are the greatest weapons 19 20 we have to battle the loss and debilitating effects a brain aneurysm can have on a family and an individual; now, therefore, 21 22 23 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 24 Session of 2008, that this body hereby urges the Governor to 25 26 designate the month of September as "Brain Aneurysm Awareness Month"; and 27 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is urged to develop and implement an awareness campaign for the 30 general public on the effects of brain aneurysms and steps that 31 can be taken to provide for detection and treatment; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 34 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor and the Director of 35 36 Health. 37 38 39
