A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to:	
2	(1) Create a new category of high schools within the	
3	department of education that will link the curricul	Lum
4	of a school to the mission of a particular agency o	or
5	University of Hawaii campus and the private sector	
6	work force;	
7	(2) Create a tax incentive for businesses providing	
8	experiential learning opportunities; and	
9	(3) Create a comprehensive agriculture and landscape	
10	education program in the public schools.	
11	SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
12	amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated a	ind
13	to read as follows:	
14	"PART . APPLIED LEARNING HIGH SCHOOL ACADEMIES	
15	§ -1 Definitions. Whenever used in this part, unless	3
16	the context otherwise requires:	



1 "Applied learning high school academy" means a department of education high school, or school within a school, with an 2 3 approved five-year plan to deliver an applied learning 4 curriculum, including project EAST (environmental and spatial 5 technology) programs and STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) programs, linked to the mission of a state 6 7 agency or University of Hawaii campus, college, program or department, which includes a significant contribution of land, 8 9 facilities, personnel, or other resources by that agency or 10 campus. "Department" means the department of education. 11 12 -2 Applied learning high school academies. S (a) The 13 department shall establish and administer an applied learning high school academy program. 14 The applied learning high school academy program shall 15 (b) 16 be administered by a director who shall: 17 (1)Collaborate with the director of business, economic development and tourism to assess the workforce needs 18 19 of the State and devise methods of meeting those needs within the applied learning high school academy 20 program; 21

4	(3)	Review school applications for approval of applied
5		learning high school academy programs;
6	(4)	Evaluate existing programs;
7	(5)	Incorporate programs within the model, including
8		project EAST (environmental and spatial technology)
9		and STEM (science, technology, engineering, and
10		mathematics) programs;
11	(6)	In collaboration with the University of Hawaii,
12		initiate research and studies for the improvement of
13		curriculum materials for specialty areas of applied
14		learning high school academies;
15	(7)	Ensure that the standards and criteria developed under
16		this section satisfy the mandates of federally
17		assisted vocational education;
18	(8)	Develop in-service programs for teachers and
19		administrators;
20	(9)	Assist in teacher recruitment and placement in applied
21		learning high school academy programs;



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1	(10)	Serve as a liaison with the representatives of
2		business, industry, appropriate public agencies, and
3		institutions of higher education to facilitate
4		dissemination of information;
5	(11)	Promote links with private sector employers in Hawaii;
6	(12)	Assist in the development of adult and continuing
7		education programs in private industry; and
8	(13)	Establish an advisory task force representing the
9		diverse areas of industry in the State, which shall
10		make annual recommendations on the development of
11		curriculum, staffing, and strategies to establish a
12		source of trained and qualified individuals and
13		strategies for developing the applied learning high
14		school academies program, including youth leadership
15		throughout the public schools.
16	(c)	The department may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
17	for the p	urposes of this part.

19	and appro-	val. (a) Any community, group of high school

20 teachers, group of teachers and administrators, state agency, or 21 nonprofit organization may submit a letter of intent to the

22 department to convert a department high school to a applied



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learning high school academy, and develop a detailed five-year
 plan that shall include in its plan significant support of the
 high school by the co-sponsoring state agency or University of
 Hawaii campus.

5 (b) Applied learning high school academies may be developed with a focus on agriculture, landscape education, 6 7 marine science, astronomy, high technology, public health, 8 visitor industries, human resource services, culture and 9 language, environmental sciences, visual arts, performing arts, project EAST (environmental and spatial technology) program 10 subjects, STEM (science, technology, engineering, and 11 12 mathematics) program subjects, or other thematic areas of interest to agencies and University of Hawaii campuses. 13 14 The plan shall be approved by the director, the high (c)

15 school's school community council, and the complex area 16 superintendent; provided that the evaluation of the application 17 plans shall incorporate the following criteria:

18 (1) The degree to which the plan strives to provide
19 students with experiences outside the school walls;
20 (2) Opportunities for juniors to complete a semester-long
21 academic internship in a local business or agency;



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
1	(3)	Opportunities for seniors to develop substantial
2		projects that enable the students to learn while
3		working on problems of interest and concern in the
4		community; and
5	(4)	Opportunities for ninth and tenth grade students to
6		"shadow" an adult through a workday, perform community
7		service in a group project, or engage in lunches with
8		outside adults on issues of interest.
9	(d)	Upon approval of the five-year plan, the school
10	community	council shall have the same independent authority over
11	curriculu	n of the applied learning high school academy for the
12	five-year	period as the charter school local school boards.
13	(e)	The applied learning high school academy's success
14	shall be e	evaluated by the board of education following each
15	five-year	period, and may be renewed."
16	SECTI	ION 3. Chapter 235, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended by	v adding a new section to be appropriately designated
18	and to rea	ad as follows:
19	" <u>§235</u>	Experiential learning opportunities tax credit.
20	(a) Each	taxpayer subject to the tax imposed by this chapter
21	who provid	les experiential learning opportunities to public
22	school stu	idents for a total of at least twenty-four hours of
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1	experient	ial learning opportunity time per year may claim a tax
2	<u>credit in</u>	an amount equal to \$, which shall be
3	<u>deductibl</u>	e from the taxpayer's net income tax liability, if any,
4	imposed b	y this chapter for the taxable year in which the credit
5	is proper	ly claimed.
6	<u>(b)</u>	Each taxpayer that provides experiential learning
7	opportuni	ties to public school students shall file documentation
8	with the	department of taxation that indicates:
9	(1)	The total number of experiential learning opportunity
10		hours provided to public school students;
11	(2)	The number of public school students involved in the
12		experiential learning opportunities;
13	(3)	The names of the public education institutions in
14		which the students are enrolled;
15	(4)	A description of each experiential learning
16		opportunity provided to public school students; and
17	(5)	The contact information of the taxpayer providing the
18		experiential learning opportunity and the public
19		education institution receiving the opportunities.
20	The infor	mation in paragraphs (1) to (5) shall be a public
21	document.	



1	(c) The director of taxation shall prepare any forms that
2	may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this section and
3	may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91, including any penalties
4	for failure to comply with this section.
5	(d) For purposes of this section, "experiential learning
6	opportunity" means any learning opportunity within school hours,
7	after school, on weekends, or during vacations, which allows the
8	learner to attain information and practical skills that are
9	necessary to perform in the work place and provides significant
10	experiences with real outcomes that create measurable learning
11	achievements through participation and reflection."
12	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
13	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so
14	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, for
15	the applied learning high school academies program established
16	pursuant to section 2 of this Act.
17	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
18	education for the purposes of this Act.
19	SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
20	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
