Dear Committee Chair Ige, Vice-Chair Fukunaga and distinguished Members of the Health Committee:

As the Director of the Clint Spencer Clinic, our clinic provides clinical care and education to a large number of Hawaii's HIV infected adult and pediatric population. We treat all individuals infected with HIV the same, regardless if they have insurance or not. Antiretroviral medications have dramatically improved the lives of our patients. However, for these life saving medications to be effective, these medications need to be taken regularly in the day. These medications need to be stored appropriately, often requiring refrigeration. In addition, many of these medications need to be taken with food. These expensive medications and therapy will not mean much if these patients are not able to take them appropriately. It is therefore essential that housing and food be supplemented for these infected individuals to achieve productive and healthy lives. The danger is that without food and housing assistance, many of these infected individuals may have worsening of their disease. The cost savings from removing the current food and housing assistance may be offset by the raising health related

costs of worsening disease. There will be no savings and the health of our patients will be worse off.

I strongly support HB 1890, which proposes state funding to supplement the federal funds received from the Ryan White CARE Act Reauthorization Bill (HR 6143). This bill would assist in supporting the care of our patients.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify and your thoughtful consideration of this bill which is important to HIV infected individuals living in Hawaii.

Hawaii can be proud of its early and effective response to the AIDS epidemic. The AIDS system here is a model of how the branches of government, working in close collaboration with the private sector, can successfully confront something as terrifying and stigmatized as AIDS.

As a result, we have a statewide system of HIV counseling/testing, HIV prevention and case management, in addition to programs that provide needed housing and nutritional assistance. Dear Chair Ige, Vice-Chair Fukunaga and Committee Members:

My Name is Jon Berliner, and I serve as executive director of Gregory House Programs, Hawaii's only statewide HIV/AIDS housing program. I strongly support passage of HB 1890, HD 1.

Over the years, particularly from 1995 – 2002, state funding for HIV care services was continually reduced through budget restrictions, while at the same time case loads continued to increase pacing more demands on services. Hawaii will see a reduction in Federal Ryan White CARE Act (now called the Ryan White Modernization Act of 2006) funding due to newly established formulas that penalize smaller states with lower incidence rates. However, the need here is still tremendous. Additionally, due to the federal budget for FY '09, just released by the president, funding for housing services under the HUD HOPWA program, for persons with HIV/AIDS, is proposed to be level funded while at the same time three new jurisdictions will be eligible meaning that all other jurisdictions will experience funding reductions — under the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's HOPWA — Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS program. The State of Hawaii will experience, once again, a reduction in funding.

HB 1890, HD1 is of particular importance and has some current urgency because the federal Department of Health & Human Services - HRSA HIV/AIDS Bureau (HAB) issued on February 26, 2008 Policy Notice 99-02 Amendment I, entitled "The Use of Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Funds for Housing Referral Services and Short-term or Emergency Housing Needs, provides grantees with guidance on the use of Title XXVI of the Public Health Service Act (Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program) funds for short-term and emergency housing assistance for persons living with HIV/AIDS that significantly restricts the use of Ryan White funds for housing services, and this amendment will significantly limit and negatively impact housing services for persons with HIV/AIDS here in Hawaii as well as elsewhere.

Maintenance of funding is needed for the areas addressed in HB 1890, HD 1. Without adequate funding for housing, case management, and support services, it will be more challenging for persons / families living with HIV/AIDS to gain access to primary medical care and other support services. The services funded under HB 1890, HD 1 are critical and essential in providing stability in the lives of persons challenged with living with HIV/AIDS. I urge the committee to pass HB 1890, HD 1. Thank you for this opportunity to offer testimony.

Aloha Senator Ige, Senator Fukunaga, and Committee Members,

My name is Joseph Rattner and on March 15th, 2008, I will be diagnosed HIV Positive for 17 years. I consider that date an Anniversary because of the life I was Blessed with despite the new ways of life I had to learn how to lead. Retiring early from my lively hood of Opticianry' and having to give up a lovely home is not what I had in mind, but HIV had different ideas for me.

My Disability from a life with HIV came to fruition when I moved to Hawaii from New Jersey 6 years ago. All of a sudden it was hard to obtain my medications, even more difficult to fulfill the Dentistry I so desperately needed, and with the obvious sense that the HIV Community in Hawaii was suffering dramatically, I was a tremendously concerned.

In 2004 I was blessed with Founding West Oahu Hope For A Cure Foundation, a newly

blossoming AIDS Service Organization (ASO) located in Ewa Beach, serving the Leeward and West Side Communities of Oahu or elsewhere Island or State wide in need of Care or Prevention services. I am presently the organization's President and acting Executive Director.

I was wait listed by Gregory House Programs, the only Housing program in Hawaii for people living with HIV/AIDS. When I learned there was a gathering place that not only distributes Healthy food but as well as maintained a Vitamin Program, was music to my ears. Problem is that the Vitamin program has been slowly cut, year by year, as they delete many important Vitamins(now offering 3 basic kinds) with home delivery's reduced to once a month. Worse off, does the program cover the full ADAP formulary of Medications. There is already discussion about removing and/or changing important drugs to an HIVers life. There have been years that I needed to ask you all to pay for medications to keep me alive.

Your heard my plight and three years ago SB 1227 was passed unanimously with just enough funding to allow an abnormally expensive medication to be dispensed through ADAP because the drug fell into the Protease Inhibitor category. The Governor signed off on \$50,000 which was to be split into: Half for the ADAP program and half for the HSPAMM program which pays for bi-annual examinations at Leahi Hospital. The only Wellnes Center on all of the Islands for people living with HIV was shut down this year leaving the Community lost in outer space when it came to working out or maintaining a balanced diet with a Nutritionist who was at the Center 75% of the time for exams, tests and advice.

Patients now live longer, but many are unable to return to work due to their health and debilitating side effects of the treatments for HIV/AIDS. These patients continue to need housing, nutrition services, and case management as well as life-saving medications, often for many years. While we hope that better treatments will offer a cure, or at least a better recovery, right now, that is not the reality for most people with HIV/AIDS.

We have had some very important legislation pending since last year at the Hawaii State legislature for funding of HIV Programs. Many requests were sent to have a hearing, so that this Bill HB 1890 could be considered by the House to then be passed out by the House Finance Committee. HB 1890 was finally scheduled for a hearing shortly before the cross over, passing with AMENDMENTS and sent to the Senate. Mahalo to Rep. Marcus Oshiro and his Staff for believing in the necessity of this Bill. I am most grateful for the House Health Committee hearing this measure and passing it unanimously!

The HIV Community had put their hopes in SB 2890. Senate Bill SB 2890, introduced by Senator Will Espero, a similar measure for additional HIV funding was passed UNAMENDED by the Senate Health Committee, but the Bill will not be heard by (WAM) Ways and Means. Senator Baker is working very hard to find additional funding to add to the budget for HIV programs, but all she can do now is promise to try and *find* some funding.

Our hope for additional funding and support from the Hawaii Legislature is tentative at best this year. We had hoped to get extra funding for people living with HIV for Housing, Dental, Food, and other HIV programs. We are currently under funded in general for our AIDS Service Organizations, (ASOs), in Hawaii to operate efficiently. Our ASOs are hard pressed to even meet current demand by HIV positive clients. More clients are expected in next few years as new HIV rapid tests are implemented and the known HIV population here expands.

It is imperative that we meet the needs of the HIV Community. Hawaii needs to maintain strong HIV programs for both prevention and care. These programs are essential in keeping people healthy who are living with HIV, and in preventing the spread of the virus. Hawaii will

pay more in health care costs in the long run if it continues to accept AIDS funding cuts with no additional support. What is needed is the support of the <u>ENTIRE</u> Hawaii Legislature <u>NOW</u>, and ensure the quality of life for people living with HIV/AIDS.

For these and so many other reasons I am strongly supporting HB 1890 HD1!

Thank you for your present support, and your help in creating a brighter future for people in Hawaii living with HIV or AIDS.

Are we being penny wise but pound foolish with HIV funding? Hawaii's HB 1890 HD1 is meant to supplement the federal funds received from the Ryan White CARE Act Reauthorization Bill (HR 6143). This past year, there have been problems in housing, food and dental programs due to lack of funding. So much more could be done, but because of tight budget constraints good programs are now underfunded. Our hope, for a better economic time, won't wait with HIV/AIDS. Waiting on funding will only fuel the spread of HIV, every time that we turn away or put wait lists on important programs.

HIV numbers are about to skyrocket as all persons with HIV, not just AIDS, under care, will be reported to the State. Names reporting for HIV will take effect as soon as Gov. Linda Lingle signs on to

the administrative rules change. It will take several years before we start getting close approximate counts of the number of people living with HIV here in the islands.

I am currently conducting an needs assessment on HIV medical care state-wide for the University of Hawaii John A. Burns School of Medicine, in collaboration with the Department of Health. Part of this assessment involves a survey of over 350 HIV-infected people living in our state. About 43% of them were living on a combined household income of less than \$12,000 a year and an additional 30% were living on a combined household income of less that \$25,000 a year. Without programs to help with food and housing, these incomes do not allow them to maintain a stable living situation necessary to adhere to their medication and an adequate diet to maintain their health.

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony in strong support of HB 1890, (MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR HEALTH CARE SERVICES).

My name is Debra Ogata-Arakaki. I was born and raised in Hawaii, and have spent the past 21 years working as an HIV research nurse and coordinator. I began my research career in 1986 at the National Institutes of Health, at a time when AIDS was at its infancy. There were no anti-HIV drugs available at that time. A diagnosis of AIDS was a death sentence. It was only through the tireless efforts of many researchers and nurses, dedicated and willing research participants that new drugs to treat HIV and its many infections were developed. Today, a diagnosis of HIV is no longer an ominous sentence and with proper care and treatment, people living with HIV can maintain healthy, productive lives.

I support this bill because it will help to support programs that have done, and can continue to do, valuable work for the people in Hawaii living with HIV. Programs such as HIV counseling and testing, HIV drug assistance programs, housing and food assistance, AIDS surveillance, and dental assistance are already under-funded. Federal funding for many HIV-related programs has decreased sizably over the past few years. Many programs will be unable to provide the level of services they have been able to provide in the past due to the continued cuts in funding. This bill will help to supplement the federal funds received through the Ryan White CARE Act Reauthorization Bill and help to maintain these valuable programs.

The state can chose to financially assist the programs that support the health and welfare of HIV-infected individuals so they may be contributing, productive citizens, or they can turn away and pay for it on the backend, supporting them financially in the hospital once they are ill.

In summary, I would like to restate my strong support for passage of **HB 1890**. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony for the committee.
