Subject: H.B. 2336 – Relating To Retirement Allowance

The City & County of Honolulu opposes H.B. 2336 that proposes to increase the retirement allowance for public safety employees from 2-1/2 percent to 3 percent for each year of credited service. In developing the City's operating budget for fiscal year 2009, we were faced with the fact that the City's employer contribution for police officers to the retirement system was increasing from 15.75 percent in fiscal year 2008 to 19.70 percent in fiscal year 2009. This change will increase the retirement system contribution amount in the City's budget for police officers alone by \$22 million.

We would like to have time to study the effects of this measure and to work with the Employees' Retirement System to determine the effects on employer contributions that could result from this change in the retirement allowance rate. The counties are responsible for the majority of the public safety employees in the state and the counties should be given the opportunity to analyze the long-term effects of such a major change.

We respectfully ask that H.B. 2336 be held.

RELATING TO RETIREMENT ALLOWANCE

Chair Sonson and Members of the Committee:

H.B. 2336 increases the retirement allowance from 2-1/2% to 3% for each year of credited service for firefighters, police officers, correction officers, investigators of the department of the prosecuting attorney, investigators of the department of the attorney general, narcotics enforcement investigators, water safety officers, and public safety investigations staff investigators in the contributory plan.

This Bill will afford members with an enhanced retirement benefit and will increase the State and county governments' contributions to the ERS and increase the ERS' \$5.1 billion unfunded liability. This is contrary to the provisions of Act 256, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007, which placed a moratorium on benefit enhancements until January 2, 2011.

The ERS Board of Trustees has not yet taken a position on this Bill.

RELATING TO RETIREMENT ALLOWANCE

House Bill No. 2336 increases the retirement allowance for certain public safety oriented positions from 2½ percent to 3 percent of the average final compensation for each year of credited service. Currently, firefighters, police officers, corrections officers, investigators for the Departments of the Prosecuting Attorney, the Attorney General, and Public Safety Narcotics Enforcement and Investigations staff, and water safety officers, may retire with 25 years of service and the retirement benefit is 2½ percent of their average monthly compensation. The maximum retirement allowance is not to exceed 80 percent.

We are opposed to this bill. The Employees' Retirement System's unfunded liability remains at \$5.1 billion. Any enhancement in retirement benefits will increase costs to employers and increase Employees' Retirement Systems' unfunded liability. Act 256, SLH 2007, prohibits benefit enhancements for any group of members for the period January 2, 2008 until January 2, 2011.

TESTIMONY ON HOUSE BILL 2336 RELATING TO RETIREMENT ALLOWANCE

Chairman and Members of the House Labor & Public Employment Committee:

My name is Tenari Ma'afala I am the SHOPO President representing over 2700 police officer across the State of Hawaii. SHOPO SUPPORTS House Bill 2336 relating to Retirement Allowance. This bill allows Increases the retirement allowance for certain public safety oriented positions under the state employees' retirement system from 2-1/2 to 3% for each year of credited service.

House Bill 2336 **directly** addresses the retention and recruitment of police officers. A key component to recruitment and retention is pay and **benefits**. This bill increases our retirement benefit by ½ a percent.

Currently, there are approximately 200 vacancies in the Honolulu Police Department.

Honolulu is one of 14 major municipalities in the nation with a fully accredited police department. Our officers are proud to be a part of one of the finest police departments in the Nation. Our officers are highly trained and qualified. Our officers can easily obtain jobs in other jurisdictions. Therefore, our officers are recruited by other states.

What does this mean? We have less officers protecting our highways, streets and most of all our communities. We have less recruiting power and retention of police officers becomes an issue. And foremost, the safety and security of our communities are compromised. A shortage of police officers is a dangerous situation for everyone.

Police Officers have a direct impact on all aspects of our community including, but not limited to: the state's economy (ie tourism) traffic safety, protection of property,

protection of people's rights, domestic disputes, illegal drugs, NOT TO MENTION THE ADDED RESPONSIBILITIES OF HOMELAND SECURITY.

We respectfully ask you to provide us the benefits to recruit and retain officers to keep our community safe.

SHOPO urges this Honorable Committee to pass HB 2336.
