Chair Morita, Vice Chair Carroll, and Members of the Committee.

House Bill No. 2506, Relating to Reorganization of State Agencies, directs the Legislative Reference Bureau to conduct a study to determine the most effective and efficient options for reorganizing the state agencies responsible for issues relating to energy and environmental protection, including commissions, boards, councils, offices, and task forces, such as: the Department of Agriculture, DBEDT, the Department of Health, the Department of Land and Natural Resources, the Public Utilities Commission, the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii, the Hawaii Invasive Species Council, the Office of Environmental Quality Control, and the Hawaii Energy Policy Forum.

The Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism supports the concept behind HB 2506. However, we oppose this bill because of the cost implications of such a study, knowing that such funds will of necessity be diverted from the programs and mission areas around which the aforementioned agencies are together driving our State toward a significant reduction of its dependence on fossil fuels for electricity generation and for transportation in a manner that makes the maximum, appropriate use of the state's diverse natural resources with the minimum negative impact upon the state's unique environment. Further, the responsibility for energy and environmental protection is already within the scope of the departments, commissions, boards, councils, offices, and task forces mentioned above. Experience has proven that reorganization and consolidation within agencies is always an option, but realigning these agencies simply recreates new requirements for collaborating beyond the immediate organizational structure.

Governor Lingle supports the transformation of Hawaii's economy away from one based on fossil fuels towards an economy that is based on the talents and values of Hawaii's people.

Moveover, as the Governor committed in her State of the State address, to further speed our progress toward energy security and a clean energy future, DBEDT is being reorganized to re-establish an Energy Division. Finally, the Governor has directed all her department heads to implement her vision of preservation of Hawaii's cultural and natural resources.

Therefore, the Legislature's goal of finding a systematic approach to transforming Hawaii's economy, from one that is fossil fuel-based to one that is not, can be accomplished by working together within our existing organizational structures.

on House Bill 2506 - Relating To Reorganization Of State Agencies

House Bill 2506 directs the Legislative Reference Bureau to conducts a study of agencies relating to environmental protection and energy self-sufficiency and to identify the most effective and efficient options of reorganizing state agencies tasked with issues related to energy and environmental protection appropriately. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) understands the intent of this measure, but is nonetheless concerned that there are other initiatives that might accomplish what the measure intends, that have not yet come to fruition.

The Department recognizes that there are ongoing actions that are addressing planning and sustainability on multiple fronts. One example is that the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) is currently developing a comprehensive renewable biofuels framework, pursuant to Act 253, Session Laws of Hawaii, 2007. Additionally, an agreement was signed January 28, 2008 for a partnership between Hawaii & United States Department of Energy to make Hawaii a world model for a clean energy economy. It is unclear how the establishment of a new department would affect such ongoing initiatives.

HOUSE BILL NO. 2506 RELATING TO REORGANIZATION OF STATE AGENCIES

Chairperson Morita and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 2506 that directs the Legislative Reference Bureau to conduct a study on Hawaii's options to reorganize state agencies tasked with issues relating to energy self-sufficiency and security and environmental protection. The Department of Agriculture believes that the bill is premature and recommends that Act 253 be allowed to proceed to completion before a reorganization study is commissioned.

The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) is currently developing a comprehensive renewable biofuels framework, pursuant to Act 253 that was passed by the 2007 legislature. Upon completion, the master plan will include a Hawaii renewable biofuels program to manage the State's transition to energy self-sufficiency based in part on biofuels for power generation and transportation. The components of the plan include establishing strategic partnerships for the research, development, testing, and deployment of renewable biofuels technologies and production of biomass crops; evaluation of Hawaii's potential to rely on biofuels as a significant renewable energy resource; supporting biofuels demonstration projects, including infrastructure for production, storage, and transportation of biofuels; promoting

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Hawaii's renewable biofuels resources to potential partners and investors for development in Hawaii as well as for export purposes; and developing a plan or roadmap to implement commercially viable biofuels development. Completion of the plan will identify many of the key issues that need to be addressed and should be the basis for changes in government operations to support energy self-sufficiency and environmental protection.

Chair Morita and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify on H.B. No. 2506. The Bureau takes no position for or against the measure but submits the following concerns and comments.

This bill calls for the Legislative Reference Bureau (Bureau) to conduct a study "to determine the most effective and efficient options for reorganizing the state agencies responsible for issues relating to energy and environmental protection, so that government will be prepared for the future." The elements of the study are listed over approximately three and one-half pages. The bill also appropriates funds to enable the Bureau to hire a contractor for the study. Findings and recommendations are required to be submitted prior to the convening of the 2009 regular session of the Legislature.

As always, if the Legislature really wants us to do this study, we will do it to the best of our abilities with the resources that we have and are otherwise provided us.

To say the least, this appears to be a very broad, ambitious, and time consuming study, particularly in light of the deadline. We understand, however, that the primary area of interest in this study is the functions and duties of state agencies as they apply to energy, and to look into the feasibility of implementing in Hawaii some general work done in the past by the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL).

Accordingly, we request modifying the bill in the following two ways to make the scope of the study more manageable and increase the likelihood of a timely response:

- (1) Focus the study on its apparent original intent—i.e., namely the functions and duties of state agencies as they apply to energy; and
- (2) Exempt the contract for the study from chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

While both of the foregoing proposed amendments to the bill will be extremely helpful, we are under no illusion that they constitute any sort of "magic button" that will make the difficulties disappear. Both the scope and deadline of the required study will likely require greater amounts of time and effort by Bureau staff than may meet the eye.
