Strong Opposition to HB 2867 - Relating to State Health Planning

Chairs Green & Shimabukuro, Vice Chairs Mizuno & Rhoads, and Members of the Committees:

My name is Mark Yamakawa, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of The Queen's Health Systems, parent company of The Queen's Medical Center and Molokai General Hospital. The Queen's Health Systems strongly opposes HB 2867, which repeals the Certificate of Need (CON) process and the law governing acquisition of hospitals in relation to state health planning.

The State Health Planning and Development Agency (SHPDA) has the responsibility for promoting accessibility for all the people of the State to quality health care services at reasonable cost. If HB 2867 is enacted, SHPDA's regulatory oversight of major health care capital expenditures and services changes will end.

Hawaii's residents and visitors need an effective CON program because of the state's geographic isolation and its population being distributed unevenly throughout multiple islands. The needs of the community, not free market pressures, should control the growth of health care facilities and services.

CON promotes access to healthcare for all Hawaii residents and visitors by promoting the efficient stewardship of health care resources. It prevents unnecessary capital expenditures and unnecessary duplication of health care facilities and services. It also prevents unchecked proliferation of health care services, particularly those who don't provide full spectrum of essential community services.

CON enables hospitals across the state to continue to provide essential safety net services to their communities. Among those are 24/7 emergency services, trauma care, behavioral

health, medical education and community outreach services. These are all examples of services that lose money because of the resources, both human and financial, that are required to support them. Yet, they are vitally important to the community.

The November 2007 report "Financial Trends of Hawaii's Hospitals, Nursing Facilities, Home Care and Hospice Providers" by the Healthcare Association of Hawaii found that Hawaii's hospitals are in serious financial trouble. Expenses have exceeded net patient revenues since 2000 resulting in cumulative losses for the last 7 years of \$80,000,000.

Hawaii's healthcare system is in a fragile balance. As illustrated by Kahuku Hospitai's bankruptcy in 2007, not all providers may be strong enough to survive. The elimination of CON will further strain the system with a potential for complete breakdown.

Rather than eliminating CON, several other bills have been introduced which seek to improve the CON process. We respectfully request your consideration and support for the language in HB 3123, and its companion SB 3045.

The Queen's Health Systems strongly opposes HB 2867. We respectfully request that your committees defer HB 2867.

Relating to State Health Planning (Certificate of Need)

Thank you for this opportunity to submit written testimony before your committees. My name is Jane Gibbons, and I am the Executive Vice President for Liberty Dialysis – Hawaii Region. I am testifying in opposition to House Bill 2867 relating to the repeal of the Certificate of Need program.

The purpose of HRS Chapter 323D was to establish the State health planning and resources development program to promote accessibility for all the people of the State to quality health care services at a reasonable cost. The state agency that has the principal function and responsibility for controlling increases in health care costs is the State Health Planning & Development Agency (SHPDA). Some of the key criteria that SHPDA must consider in making a decision on whether to approve or disapprove a Certificate of Need application are (a) whether sufficient safeguards are included to ensure that the affected community has continued access to affordable care; and (b) whether the purchaser and parties to an acquisition have made a commitment to provide health care to the disadvantaged, uninsured, and underinsured, and to provide benefits to the affected community to promote improved health care.

This is accomplished through the Certificate of Need process set out in Part V of HRS Chapter 323D. This very important process is regulated by the State to insure that access to health care is upheld, quality is assured, and reasonable costs are maintained. The Certificate of Need process prevents over investment in marginally needed facilities that can easily increase overall costs of health care in this State. The Certificate of Need program also contributes to the orderly expansion of health care facilities and health care services that, in turn, reduces the risks of ebbs and flows in accessibility to quality care. The Certificate of Need process permits a more orderly allocation of scarce resources, such as nursing staff, that are currently in short supply.

Liberty Dialysis develops, owns and operates dialysis clinics throughout the United States including in the State of Hawaii on the islands of Oahu, Kauai, Maui, Molokai, and the Big Island. Liberty Dialysis initially began its operations in Hawaii by acquiring the St. Francis Medical Center's dialysis operations. In keeping with the State's goal of ensuring and promoting accessibility to quality health care services at reasonable cost for all of the people of the State, Liberty Dialysis complied with the Certificate of Need requirements when it first entered the Hawaii market, and as it has expanded its operations over the years in providing much needed care for patients with kidney disease. Today, consistent with the assurances made to SHPDA in connection

with obtaining a Certificate of Need to acquire the dialysis centers from St. Francis Medical Center, Liberty Dialysis treats all patients requiring outpatient dialysis services without regard to whether the patients have insurance or other means of payment.

If House Bill 2867 is passed, it will effectively eliminate this very important review that ensures and promotes accessibility to quality health care services at reasonable cost for all of the people of the State. On behalf of Liberty Dialysis, I urge you not to repeal the Certificate of Need process as set forth in HRS Chapter 323D. Thank you for the opportunity to testify regarding this bill.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON H.B. 2867 RELATING TO STATE HEALTH PLANNING

The ILWU Local 142 opposes H.B. 2867, which repeals the Certificate of Need process and the law governing acquisition of hospitals in relation to state health planning.

This bill appears to be a reaction to last year's denial of Malulani's application for a Certificate of Need to build a new hospital in Kihei. While the SHPDA administrator was well within his authority to deny the application based on the abundance of information provided to him and the concern for the effect that approval would have had on existing health care facilities, H.B. 2867 seems to be designed to throw out the baby with the bathwater. Because the Malulani application was denied, the entire Certificate of Need process now is jeopardy. This is short-sighted policymaking.

The Certificate of Need process was implemented many years ago because of a need to control the proliferation of medical facilities, services and technology in Hawaii. Although some would advocate for letting the market dictate who survives and who does not. Hawaii's market is just too small for competition to have an impact on cost. Hawaii's limited population cannot support unlimited services and facilities because, inevitably, the costs will be passed on to the consumer.

The State Health Planning and Development Agency is charged with "the responsibility for promoting accessibility for all the people of the State to quality health care services at reasonable cost." The CON process helps the agency assess, among other things, whether or not new services and facilities will be detrimental to cost for consumers overall. The CON process provides an unbiased assessment and is vitally needed.

The ILWU urges that H.B. 2867 be shelved. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on this matter.



The Hawaii Long Term Care Association (HLTCA) opposes H.B. 2867.

According to the latest (November 2007) briefing paper on Certificates of Need (CONs) issued by the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL), 36 states and the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico have CON processes (a number that has remained nearly static for over two decades). Further, even those states that have repealed their CON laws still retain some kind of CON-like mechanism intended to regulate such factors as costs, duplication of services and excess capacity (in the form of facility over-building) that can result in health care price inflation and erosion of quality of care.

SHPDA does not stand for State Health Plenny Development Agency. It stands for State Health **Planning** and Development Agency.

In that regard, it should be noted that there presently exists a Plan Development Committee working on revising the Hawaii Health Performance Plan (H2P2), focusing specifically on State health planning and the CON process. It comprises a host of diverse stakeholder members, including the Departments of Health, Human Services and Business, Economic Development & Tourism, health plans, mental health advocates, hospitals, Hawaii Primary Care Association, Hawaii Health Information Corporation, Healthcare Association of Hawaii, Hawaii Long Term Care Association and many others.

We have been and are working on updating, streamlining and "common-sensifying" our health care planning parameters and processes, and we believe that an exemplary work product will result from these efforts.

For these reasons, we oppose this measure and ask that it be held. Thank you.

Please support this bill and abolish the CON.

Maui County has 141,320 (Includes Lana'i, Maui, Moloka'i)

Maui had 2,405,257 million tourists 2006 with an average daily visitor census of 48,854. Our total daily population is then **190,174.** This <u>doesn't</u> <u>include</u> <u>the 262,453 visitors</u> from Cruise ships that we had in 2006.

- Maui County was Hawaii's fastest growing county from 1990 to 2000 (27% of State growth) 92% of Maui County residents live on the Island of Maui.
 Residents 45 to 64 years of age to increase 34%; drive 47% of population increase.
 Residents 65+ will increase 55% and drive 35% of population increase.
- Statistics show that residents between the ages of 45 to 64 years of age constitute 47% of the population increase occurring on Maui. It is further projected that residents in the 65+ age category will increase 55% and will constitute 35% of total population by the year 2015. Our physician population is aging, too. As physicians leave because of the CON decision against Malulani Hospital, the remaining doctors are aging and many wish to retire. Replacement physicians cannot be persuaded to come here and practice under current conditions. We have many who want to come here if we build a private hospital for them.
- The one hospital on Maui is Maui Memorial Medical Center. It is located in Kahului and is a 231 bed facility which is operated and controlled by Hawaii Health Systems Corporation. At any one day, according to Wes Lo, ~41 of those beds are taken up by patients who have no where else to go. Maui Memorial Medical Center is old and decrepit, with a dangerous mold problem (selfreported), which can only be rectified by knocking it down and rebuilding. The governor has said she will not release funds to remodel MMMC.
- MMMC is borrowing large sums of money: \$130 million. By the very nature of a
 government hospital, they are also not able to run efficiently so they will not be
 able to pay it back. The people of the state of Maui will have to pay this loan
 back. We don't want to spend our tax dollars on government hospitals.

- The occupancy rate of Maui Memorial Hospital runs at 92.9% and often exceeds 100% (according to physicians at the Hawaiian Medical Association public forum meeting held at The Dunes at Maui Lani on August 16th, 2007). Industry standards dictate that expansion is called for once a hospital experiences an average annual occupancy rate of 80% (a standard established by the American Health Planning Association).
- Many vital and life-saving services are not available at MMMC:

Neonatal Intensive Care Unit

Level One ER (we do not even have a level 2 ER)

High Risk Obstetrics

Obstetric Anesthesia

Lactation Services

Pediatric Intensive Care Unit

Cardiac Intensive Care Unit

Cardiovascular Intensive Care Unit

Myocardial Infarction Care Unit

Cardiac Services - open heart surgery, coronary, and stenting.

Advanced Diagnostics

State of the art cancer treatment

Alternative Medicine

Decompression Chamber

Burn Unit

24 hour pharmacy unit at hospital

Food services around the clock for both patients, visitors & staff

Positron Emission Tomography

State of the art CT scanning

Acute dental and oral surgery treatments relating to trauma.

- 1. Maui is the only major Hawaiian Island without at least two acute care hospitals. This causes multiple problems, but it causes a glaring problem in terms of emergency transport of patients to ER services. The population of Maui is concentrated in three (3) widely distant geographic areas (Kahului, South Maui and West Maui), with scattered and much smaller residential hubs and clusters in up country Maui. In emergencies, patients cannot reach the one and only 16 bed ER at MMMC in a timely manner. Access by emergency transport is also very difficult and time consuming. Many lives are lost because the entire population must travel to Kahului for ER care. Emergency patients, who don't expire because of this logistics problem, seriously deteriorate before they ever reach the ER at MMMC. In addition, the crowded conditions at the island's one and only 16 bed ER means more waiting at a time when waiting can be the difference between life and death.
- 2. Even when emergency patients reach Maui Memorial Medical Center, they often discover that the lack of tertiary care services, trauma services, a burn center, and perinatal services requires that they be transported to more advanced patient care facilities on O'ahu. Unstable patients are difficult to transport and are more likely to have adverse outcomes, up to and including death. Many of these patients experience delayed transport which can last for days. Currently four (4) of every eight (8) trauma patients must be transported off island for care. If you are a serious trauma patient or a cardiac patient, you are going to a hospital on O'ahu.
- 3. The need for transport to Oahu is unhealthy for patients' families. The patient's family cannot travel with patients during transport and are left wondering how their loved one is doing. To join the patient, family members must make travel arrangements, pay for their own hotel rooms (if they can find one), and absorb many additional expenses associated with providing care to a sick or injured loved one. Often children get left behind on Maui, jobs are lost, and financial lives are ruined because of these circumstances.
- I. Maui's shortage of beds is even more acute if other factors are considered. The above estimates as to increased bed needs do NOT take into account the crises that would occur if there were a major health care disaster on Maui. Another major earthquake, an outbreak of an infectious disease like SARS, an airplane crash, or even a cruise ship disaster could quickly shut-down or overwhelm the one and only hospital currently available to Maui County residents. In addition we would not be able to fly the victims to Oahu.

85% of voting residents of Maui favored the new hospital.

Independent polls of Maui residents taken during the debate about the construction of the proposed Malulani Hospital showed **that 85% supported it.*** In spite of this, state lawmakers refused to support the wishes of their constituents.

WE NEED THE CON ABOLISHED SO WE CAN BRING IN PRIVATE COMPANIES SUCH AS QUEENS, KAISER AND KAPIOLANI SO WE CAN ALSO HAVE THE SAME GOOD HEALTHCARE ON MAUI THAT OAHU HAS.

THE CON IS BEING USED TO KEEP THE STATUS QUO IN HAWAII – WITH ALL OF OUR MAUI MEDICAL DOLLARS AND JOBS GOING TO OAHU WITH OUR MAUI PATIENTS.
