Honorable Gentlemen:

My name is Benny Maile Perry. I am a life long resident of the State of thusau currently residing in Kahului, Maui, I am a retired Senior crizen in the process of relocating back to the land of my birth, Hana, Maui.

Along with other family members, I-

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share ownership in property located in Hara, execifically down on Ulaino Road.

Ulaino Road has become embroiled in Controvery lately. It is my hope thatthe 341st will address our concerns regarding this road along with many other Similar circumstances regarding roadway issues throughout our state.

The controversy is over the issue of whether or not Ulamo Road is a private road or public road. Some, like myself and others in my immediate family, believe this roadway belongs to the public. A large constituency in the Hara area, on Mavi, and on Dahu, believe otherwise. Vigilantees have blocked access on this roadway claiming it to be a private roadway.

There are numerous resources, available as public records and general knowlege which support our claim that this is

a public access road.

Ulaino load is a roadway which runs from its junction intersecting the Hana Highway in Kaeleky to the seashore

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where it neets the Mulwai in Ulaino, a distance of appropriately 41/2 miles.

Ulaino Road, in my earliest recollections, was a trail used by the residents of Ulaino Village to access the plantation work centers located in Kaeleku and Hana.

My grand father and his siblings were cell raised there. My Great grand parents lived their lives there and are buried down there.

From a simple trail, a roadway evolved over the last half a century making it possible for some of us to move back to the land of our ancestors, and enjoy other opportunities which have become available with automobile access.

As the vigilantees have taken over, access has been denied to visitors to the area. Visitors, and this includes Mau, residents as well as family Members, have been subjected to offensive verbal abuses, physical confrontations, harassment, intimidation in varying degrees whenever are attempts to access the shore from this road.

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as mentioned earlier, this road began as a trail and evolved into what it is today. It was maintained by the country for a long, long time in the name of safety and public access. Because organo proclaining this to be a private road continue to be put up, the country recently chose to abandon its efforts in maintaining the road, citing conflict with the private ownership claims.

Us an aside, a senior resident of Hana recently shared that a relative of his used to deliver the mail along this Same trail (road) from the Nahikiy side,

While my concern lies specifically with the Ulaino Road issue and its status. Neither the State of Hawau or the County of Man has been unwilling to step ! forward and claim jurisdiction over these former public trails and rodd ways. I can only guess how many other similar circumstances exist in our state. If is my belief that the legislature

15 a proper venue to address this

issue. It is my hope that HB 3415 will provide the venue for clarity and relief in this issue concerning public road ways.

While I have not had an opportunity to review the proposed HE3415, I am informed that this is a step in the right direction for us regarding our concern over Ulaino Road and the name other road ways with similar circum stances.
