Testimony in support of HCR 131 / HR 113.

I am Coral Andrews, Vice President of the Healthcare Association of Hawaii, which represents the entire spectrum of health care, including acute care hospitals, two-thirds of the long term care beds in Hawaii, as well as home care and hospice providers. Thank you for this opportunity to testify in support of HCR 131 / HR 113, which requests the Director of Health to convene a blue ribbon panel to inventory Hawaii's acute care and long term care facilities and to make recommendations for any necessary expansion of these facilities.

In recent months the media have featured a number of articles highlighting the complex and multi-faceted crisis that is plaguing Hawaii's health care system. Payments for health care from Medicare, Medicaid, and private insurance are too low. Medical malpractice insurance premiums are too high. Some physicians have already left Hawaii to practice on the mainland where financial conditions are more reasonable. Kahuku Hospital was on the verge of bankruptcy a year ago and about to close its doors before it was acquired by the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC). Meanwhile, HHSC itself is requesting emergency funding during the current session in order to pay its suppliers.

To further complicate matters, the need for health care is expected to grow. For example, a sizeable proportion of Hawaii's population is already over the age of 85 years, and many of them have chronic conditions requiring continuing medical care. The elderly population is expected to increase, as the leading edge of the baby boom generation is now reaching retirement age.

We must ensure that adequate numbers of physicians, nurses, and other health care professionals, as well as health care facilities, are available so that all Hawaii residents continue to have access to quality health care. Ensuring that Hawaii's health care system will continue to have the capacity to serve residents requires advance planning.

These resolutions address a critical aspect of Hawaii's health care system, specifically the adequacy of the inventory of acute care and long term care facilities. We would like to thank the Legislature for bringing attention to this most important topic. The Healthcare Association is named as a panel member. We would be willing to participate in the activities of the panel and provide any information that would add to the collective understanding of the panel.

For the foregoing reasons, the Healthcare Association supports HCR 131 / HR 113.

PURPOSE: Requests the Director of Health to convene a blue ribbon panel to

inventory the acute care and long-term care facilities in Hawaii and make

recommendations for needed expansion between now and 2020.

POSITION: PABEA SUPPORTS THE RESOLUTION REQUESTING AN INVENTORY OF ACUTE AND LTC FACILITIES.

RATIONALE:

I am offering testimony on behalf of PABEA, the Policy Advisory Board for Elder Affairs, which is an appointed board tasked with advising the Executive Office on Aging (EOA). My testimony does not represent the views of the EOA but of the Board. I am also a professor of medical sociology at UH-Manoa who has worked with elderly services in Hawaii for more than 20 years.

The rapid expansion of the elderly in Hawaii, and especially elderly in the 85 year and older group, will likely mean a significant increase in the need for long-term care services and facilities. The proposed inventory is an important step in understanding where we currently stand and what planning we must undertake to meet the future needs.

RE: HCR 131, Requesting the Director of Health to convene and facilitate a blue ribbon panel to perform a comprehensive inventory of all of Hawaii's acute care and long term care facilities and to make recommendations for necessary expansion of such facilities for the State between now and the year 2020.

The Hawaii Long Term Care Association (HLTCA) strongly supports HCR 131, except that we would ask that we be added to the list of panel members. The HLTCA's membership comprises twenty-seven (27) facilities, with a total of nearly 3,000 beds (including 1,668 ICF/SNF/subacute). This represents more than half of all non-hospital-based ICF/SNF beds (over one-third of *ALL* ICF/SNF beds) in the State. Our membership also includes all affiliated Type II adult residential care homes and assisted living facilities and all continuing care retirement communities.

As such, we believe we are unquestionably a major stakeholder with respect to all the issues to be undertaken by the blue ribbon panel. Most significant among those issues is, of course, the hospital waitlist situation. Considering both the significant bed capacity the HLTCA already represents and the willingness of a number of our members to consider targeted expansion and/or development specifically aimed toward caring for medically complex patients, it would seem not just logical but critical that we be contributing partners in this initiative.

With that inclusion, we support this measure and urge its passage. Thank you.
