## TESTIMONY ON HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 231 REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO STUDY THE COST OF CONVENING A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION IN 2010 Office of the Lieutenant Governor

Good Afternoon Chair Waters, Vice Chair Oshiro, and Members of the Committee on Judiciary. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

My name is Kevin A. Souza, and I am the Chief of Staff for the Office of the Lieutenant Governor.

The Office of the Lieutenant Governor respectfully opposes HCR 231 because we believe that the Legislative Reference Bureau ("LRB"), acting alone, does not possess the wherewithal to render an accurate opinion on the cost of a Constitutional Convention ("Con Con").

While we strongly support the concept of assessing the projected costs of a Con Con, we believe that any such study must involve other governmental agencies that possess the specific information necessary to render an accurate and educated opinion. Specifically, it is our position that a task force should be assembled to study this issue, with representatives from the Office of Elections, the Campaign Spending Commission, the Department of

Budget and Finance, the Department of Accounting and General Services, and the Attorney General's Office. The LRB could potentially be included as a member of the task force. Additionally, select public interest groups like the League of Women Voters should also be considered.

As an alternative to this proposal, we urge this Committee to hear and pass HCR 165, which proposes to create a similar task force to study this important issue.

Finally, the Office of the Lieutenant Governor would welcome the opportunity to work collaboratively with the Legislature on formulating a task force to study the potential cost of a Con Con.

Support of Intent of H.C.R. No. 231 Requesting the Legislative Reference Bureau to Study the Cost of Convening a Constitutional Convention in 2010 Written Testimony

I am Representative Della Au Belatti, representative of the 25th House District. I support the intent of House Concurrent Resolution 231, Requesting the Legislative Reference Bureau to Study the Cost of Convening a Constitutional Convention in 2010.

Determining the cost of a Constitutional Convention is important to voters in this general election. The People's Pulse survey has already polled a sampling of voters that demonstrate that the cost of a convention could sway voters significantly on whether to vote for or against the holding of a Constitutional Convention. Voters should have the best and most reliable information on as many aspects of a possible Constitutional Convention, including the possible

I applaud the intent of this resolution, but I think that the Legislature can craft an even better approach that can be used to determine the cost of a Constitutional Convention. HCR 231, the current resolution being considered by this Committee, considers using the highly capable Legislative Reference Bureau, but does not utilize the knowledge of other administrators and agencies who will be directly involved in the process of implementing a Constitutional Convention.

Another resolution, HCR 165 and HR 139, that has been introduced by a bi-partisan group of Representatives proposes an approach that would determine the cost of a Convention utilizing state administrators and agencies who have first-hand experience and insights into the election process and the costs of using state facilities, a bi-partisan group of legislators, and a citizen representative from a respected community group. The members that have been identified are all qualified to determine the actual costs and will play an integral role in the Constitutional Convention process from voter education to the election process and to the actual convening of a Convention.

The resolution before this Committee is an opportunity to craft a better process that incorporates both HCR 231 and HCR 165/HR 139. I humbly request that this Committee consider creating a Task Force as contemplated in HCR 165/HR 139 and add the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, or a representative of the Director, to this Task Force.

Knowing the cost of a Constitutional Convention will help voters make an informed decision. Having a reliable figure that has been determined by a bi-partisan group that has the type of information available to determine the costs will provide voters with the best and most reliable information when voters cast their vote in 2008 elections.
