SB 2423 Relating to Land Acquisition

Chair Hee and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to represent Governor Lingle on SB 2423, SD1, a measure that provides tools for the acquisition of lands at the area known as Turtle Bay on Oahu's North Shore. We appreciate this step the Senate has taken to provide a legislative vehicle, should it be needed, for this significant undertaking.

The Administration is recommending clarifying amendments to the bill.

Before discussing the specifics of SB 2423, I would like to provide some history behind the Governor's State of the State Address when she introduced the idea that the State, in collaboration with private, public, and non-profit partners, should purchase the 850-acre Turtle Bay property. For several years the Lingle-Aiona Administration has been monitoring activities on the North Shore. Governor Lingle has long been troubled by the proposed development of a major resort complex in this area and the impact this would have both on the public infrastructure and the quality of life for Oahu residents and visitors.

She was encouraged last year by two significant purchases of land supported by the North Shore community. A coalition of community, public, and non-profit organizations came together to preserve the Waimea Valley and to purchase Pupukea-Paumalu. During her State of the State Address the Governor recognized several of the community leaders who were instrumental in these efforts.

When it was announced that the Turtle Bay creditors filed a foreclosure lawsuit against the Turtle Bay owners, Governor Lingle recognized this was the opportune time for the State to publicly express its interest in preserving and protecting nearly five miles of pristine coastline and some of the last remaining open space along the North Shore.

The Legislature also has long recognized the significance of this area and in 2006 proposed House and Senate Resolutions calling for the rigorous reexamination of the expansion of the Turtle Bay resort. While neither of the 2006 resolutions passed, in 2007 the Legislature enacted HCR 194 that requested the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Labor and the House Committee on Labor to convene a joint hearing on the impacts of the Turtle Bay Resort expansion on the vibrant North Shore of Oahu. Unfortunately, this joint hearing never took place.

In 2008 we have the opportunity to join together, Legislative and Executive branches, private and non-profit, community-based and national, federal and local, to save this unique and special place.

SB 2423 SD 1 appears to be modeled along the lines of the successful Kukui Gardens legislation that allowed the preservation of affordable housing in downtown Honolulu. First, it provides unspecified sums for the Board of Land and Natural Resources or another State entity to negotiate with the current landowner, Oaktree Capital Management. Second, it further authorizes the issuance of an unspecified amount of general obligation bonds for the possible purchase of the property. And, it authorizes the use of eminent domain powers should an agreement not be reached.

While it may not be necessary to use all of the legislative remedies to acquire this property, this bill provides an avenue should non-legislative solutions not succeed. We believe the bill can be strengthened by amending several provisions.

First, we are concerned that the description of the properties in Section 2 of the bill limits the State's ability to acquire the resort and accompanying developed portions held by Kuilima Resorts LLC. Governor Lingle has made it clear that the State does not intend to operate a hotel or manage condominiums and golf courses. However, it is necessary and prudent for the State to have the ability to acquire the entire area, including the developed sections, to use the proceeds from the sale of the developed portions and possible additional developable sections to protect an agreed upon portion of undeveloped space. We recommend Section 2 and each reference in the bill to "undeveloped property" be revised to include the entire area shown on the map accompanying this testimony.

Second, we recommend Section 1 and Section 3 be revised to allow the Board of Land and Natural Resources, <u>or any appropriate entity of the State</u>, to serve as the negotiating entity for the preservation of this land. Similar to the successful Kukui Gardens negotiations, we believe a working group with technical experience in these types of complex financial transactions and that is knowledgeable in preservation and protection programs can best fulfill the requirements.

Third, we recommend amending Section 6 to allow Oaktree Management or its successor in interest, since it is not clear that Oaktree will remain the controlling entity we will need to work with in the final disposition of this property.

We also believe that the language in Section 6 should be amended to allow the use of private investment or donations, federal funds, special funds, public lands, and other assets both to carry out the negotiations as well as to acquire Turtle Bay. Governor Lingle has been encouraged by the outpouring of support she has received from a wide variety of organizations and entities who want to help in this endeavor. Governor Lingle has spoken to Secretary Dirk Kempthorne about assistance from the Department of the Interior and will be traveling to Washington, DC later this month to meet with the Secretary of the Interior. We have also been encouraged by support from charitable organizations, including the Trust for Public Lands. We ask that the legislation, if it is enacted, allow for the maximum flexibility in how resources are brought to this project.

Fourth, we recommend deletion of Section 7. One of the keys to a successful negotiation is the ability to genuinely work out a reasonable purchase price. If this bill were enacted with a stipulation of how much in general bonds would be issued to purchase Turtle Bay, the negotiating team will lose leverage in negotiating a fair and reasonable price. Real estate markets are dynamic and, thus, it is important that maximum leeway be given to the negotiating team without signaling to the sellers what the State might be willing to pay for this property. This was recognized in the Kukui Gardens legislation, which did not include any GO bond funding at the time the negotiations legislation was enacted.

Some have voiced concerns that Governor Lingle has not presented a specific plan to purchase the land or describe what will be done with the property. That is true because she recognizes it should not be her plan, but the community's plan. This proposal touches our entire State and requires discussion and input from all sectors. I also note that the Governor will not negotiate this transaction through the media. Additionally, the Governor has had a long-standing policy of preferring to negotiate land transfers rather than exercising eminent domain powers.

In summary, for too long and too often important pieces of rural Hawaii have been sold to the highest bidder and developed into something that forever changed the essence and character of the area. Governor Lingle has spoken often and eloquently about the need to transform our economy into one that no longer depends upon the sale of land, to one based on the brainpower of our residents. As we work on this transformation, it is crucial to preserve elements of Hawaii's lifestyle and identity. Preserving Turtle Bay is an important part of this effort. We look forward to working with the Legislature, members of the public, federal agencies, national organizations, and even international organizations to pursue the truly worthy goal of preserving Turtle Bay.

THE TRUST FOR PUBLIC LAND'S TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 2423, S.D. 1 WITH COMMENTS

Aloha Chairperson Hee and Vice-Chair Kokubon:

The Trust for Public Land (TPL) supports the intent of SB 2423, S.D. 1 Relating to Land Acquisition, which proposes to allocate funds towards the acquisition of undeveloped lands around the Turtle Bay Resort, but has the following concerns. While TPL is in support of section 7 of the bill, which gives the Director of Finance authority to issue general obligation bonds, it would oppose any use of the Legacy Lands Fund to finance the payments of those bonds. Finally, TPL's mission is to support voluntary land conservation, and cannot support efforts to condemn the property against the landowner's wishes. I apologize if a representative of TPL is not present for the hearing. I must attend a funeral at that same time, and our other staff person will be on a neighbor island.

TPL conserves land for people to enjoy as parks, gardens and other natural places, ensuring livable communities for generations to come. Nationwide, TPL has five program initiatives: (1) providing parks for people, (2) protecting working lands (farms, ranches, and forests), (3) conserving natural lands (wilderness, wildlife habitat), (4) safeguarding heritage lands (cultural and historical resources), and (5) preserving land to ensure clean drinking water and the natural beauty of our coasts and waterways. In Hawai'i, TPL has worked with public and private partners to conserve over 36,000 acres of land in the State, including Pūpūkea-Paumalū and Waimea Valley on O'ahu, Wao Kele o Puna on Hawai'i Island, Mū'olea Point on Maui, and Lumaha'i Beach on Kaua'i.

First, TPL was as surprised as the Legislature by the Governor's State of the State address and the announcement of an initiative to acquire the Turtle Bay Resort. Nonetheless, we support the bold initiative, and believe that by working in partnership with the Legislature, federal agencies, our Congressional delegation, the community, the business community, and private donors, we can together, achieve our vision of preserving the unique rural character of North Shore, and at the same time, enhancing much needed jobs provided at the existing resort and golf courses

Second, while TPL supports the State's ability to finance a purchase through a bond, it opposes using the Legacy Lands Fund to leverage the bond. TPL was actively involved in the passage of the Legacy Lands Act, which sets aside a small percentage of the conveyance tax for conservation acquisition projects (currently, roughly \$4.7 million per year). Grant applications are competitively reviewed by the Legacy Lands Commission, which consists of experts in agriculture, land conservation, Hawaiian culture, biology, and other disciplines. These representatives also are geographically dispersed among all four counties. In the past two years, the number

of worthy projects has far exceeded the available funds, and every project funded has leveraged matching federal, county or private funds, making the dollars in the fund go farther. These projects are having willing landowners/sellers, engaged communities calling for the acquisition of these lands, plans to manage the land, and substantial matching funding, and range across all the islands. Using the Legacy Lands Fund to finance a bond for the purchase of Turtle Bay Resort would not be consistent with the goals of the Act, and the render the Legacy Lands Commission useless.

Third, SB 2423's focus on the undeveloped portions of land surrounding the Turtle Bay Resort is a good initial step forward. As it has done with other undeveloped conservation lands (e.g., Moanalua Valley, Pūpūkea-Paumalū), the Legislature can appropriate seed money that can be leveraged against other federal, county and private sources of funding for conservation acquisitions. To the extent that any of the undeveloped lands qualified for Legacy Lands Funds, those parcels would compete with other parcels for the limited Legacy Lands Funds (about \$4.7 million per year) among other projects.

TPL supports SB 2423 with comments/concerns, and is ready to assist the State and other conservation partners in collaborative efforts to acquire the undeveloped lands surrounding the Turtle Bay Resort.

I strongly and unreservedly support the Governor's announced initiative to buy out approximately 850 acres of land in Kahuku that incorporates Turtle Bay Resort subject to the condition that the State so structures the purchase that it has a buyer in the wings ready to repurchase the hotel under some arrangement that makes it viable if its viability is properly determined by an independent third party.

The State ought also include in the buy out all that ocean front land that abuts the Turtle Bay property and extends south towards Malaekahana--ocean front land that used to be owned by Campbell Estate, recently purchased by Continental Pacific. This strip of ocean front land is that last remaining wild, pristine ocean front property left to residents and tourists alike. Unfettered access to the ocean ought also to be ensured so that both Native Hawaiians and others can exercise their PASH and other rights.

I have no opposition in principle to the contemplated purchase of the lands which are the subject of SB 2421, SB 2248 and SB 3221--provided such purchases do not overload the circuits and make if difficult to purchase the Turtle Bay property and ocean strip land identified in para 2 above.

The Turtle Bay property and adjoining ocean front lands could be easily financed if the Legislature were to be brave by levying a \$20 per person departure tax from Honolulu International Airport for the next ten years.

The Governor is to be commended for her daring and her vision for advocating the Turtle Bay property acquisition. There are well known precedents for such initiatives: Kahana Valley, Waiahole-Waikane lands, Waimea Valley and Pupukea.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on SB 2423, SD1. My name is Nicola Jones and I am the CEO of Kuilima Resort Company (KRC), the owner of the Turtle Bay Resort.

KRC is currently involved in a mortgage foreclosure action filed by KRC's first mortgagee. In light of this pending litigation, KRC is somewhat restrained in the statements that it can publicly make about Bill 2423 at this time. That being said, we ask that you keep the following in mind:

- 1. KRC cannot support any proposed legislation which suggests that the State of Hawaii acquire the Turtle Bay Resort by exercising the power of eminent domain, as such action would clearly interfere with KRC's vested legal rights.
- 2. In order for KRC to engage in any meaningful discussion concerning the possible sale of the resort, there are a number of significant obligations which we must bear in mind, including:
- a. The obligations which KRC has to its first tier and second tier lenders (currently in excess of \$400 million with significant interest accruing each month);
- b. The obligations which KRC has to over 700 employees at the resort, the vast majority of whom reside in the North Shore from Hauula to Waialua; and
- c. The obligations which KRC has (and which any future owner of the resort would have) to fulfill the significant community commitments under the resort's Unilateral Agreement and Declaration for Conditional Zoning. These commitments were carefully considered by the Honolulu City Council to directly address many of the same issues which people raise today: creating new employment opportunities, developing affordable housing, improving public beach access and facilities, developing significant public parks with free parking, and the like.
- 3. While discussions concerning the State's acquisition of the resort continue, in light of the above commitments, it is imperative that KRC be allowed to continue to process permits and governmental approvals and to take any other steps that are necessary to preserve its entitlements.

Aloha Senator Hee and Members of the Water and Land Committee:

As a resident of the North Shore for the last 47 years and having grown up on Waialua Plantation, I fully support SB 2423 to acquire the Turtle Bay Resort property owned by Oaktree. In recent articles in national publications, Oahu is being described as an overbuilt, traffic-congested island. This kind of reputation is a direct threat to our number one industry of tourism. If it continues and worsens, visitors will go elsewhere and are already choosing to do so. In a recent New York Times editorial Hawaii was described thus: "The other thing Hawaii has a lot of is talk. The state gets more than 90 percent of its energy from imported fossil fuels and has some of the country's worst highway congestion. It is the worst oil addict in the nation, but has wasted decades complaining about it and doing next to nothing." See link.

The North Shore is the last place on the island to which both visitors and residents can escape from the urban part of the island for recreation and to connect with nature and be spiritually revived. One can still see beautiful panoramic views of open space and, as yet, unspoiled beaches, unlike other parts of the island. It is referred to as "The Country" and has a slower pace, close-knit communities where people know their neighbors and people still show up at community meetings because they think they can make a difference. This way of life is under attack by the developers and must be stopped. Urban sprawl is threatening to take over agriculture lands such as the Galbraith Estate.
