RE: S.B. NO. 2497; RELATING TO MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE LANDFILLLS

Dear Senator Kokubun and Senator Inouye:

The City and County of Honolulu, Department of Environmental Services strongly opposes S.B. No. 2497 based on the following:

The bill proposes to transfer regulatory responsibility for municipal solid waste landfills from the State Department of Health (DOH) to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC). The PUC has no background or expertise, or possibly even interest, in regulating landfills. The PUC is primarily a rate-making body, as opposed to a regulatory body, and in our view is not well suited to oversee the many public health and safety issues related to proper solid waste management in municipal landfills. Even though the bill would also transfer Department of Health (DOH) staff to the PUC, this does not make sense, given that all other solid waste regulatory functions (presumably performed by many of those same DOH employees) would remain at DOH. Note that the DOH is currently also the delegated authority to administer Federal Environmental Protection Agency programs in the State, including some related to municipal landfills. The bill would leave DOH incapable of meeting its responsibilities in that regard. Moreover, in Section 9, "all rights, powers, functions, and duties of the DOH are transferred to the PUC," and there is no limitation on this sentence, so as drafted, the bill would essentially divest the DOH of all authority. The measure would effectively abolish the DOH, even though no other DOH-related statute is being amended.

Also, the bill provides no basis for the determination that in counties with a population greater than 500,000, no new municipal solid waste landfill can be situated within 15 miles of an existing municipal landfill.

Although the City and County of Honolulu seems to be targeted, the bill would prohibit any extensions of landfill permits after June 30, 2008. This would impact other counties as well, and result in a public health and safety crisis not only on Oahu, but elsewhere in the State.

In conclusion, this bill would create significant problems while providing no benefits, and it should be filed.
