TESTIMONY OF THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE BOARD OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES

On Senate Bill 2817 Senate Draft 1- Relating To Honolua Bay

BEFORE THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

February 25, 2008

Senate Bill 2817 Senate Draft 1 proposes to establish a temporary Honolua Bay Advisory Committee (Advisory Committee), to be administratively placed within the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department), to develop a Honolua Bay acquisition and management plan for the purchase, development and maintenance of Lipoa Point as a public open space. The bill also requires the Advisory Committee to submit a progress report to the 2009 Legislature. Lastly, the bill appropriates an unspecified sum. While the Department acknowledges the intent of the bill, it nonetheless has concerns with any fiscal impacts the bill will have on the Executive Supplemental Budget request. In as much, the Department offers the following comments:

Rather than establishing a separate advisory committee, the Department recommends pursuing the acquisition of those lands under the State's existing Legacy Lands Program. The Legacy Land Conservation Commission was created in 2006 for the specific purpose of advising the Board of Land and Natural Resources (Board) on acquisition of lands having a value to the State. The acquisition of Honolua Bay and Lipoa Point for use as a public open space is precisely the type of acquisition that is contemplated under the Program.

Additionally, the Department urges the Legislature instead to consider and pass Senate Bill 3102 or its companion measure House Bill 3180, which are administration bills that seek to allow moneys from the Land Conservation Fund to be used for the operation, maintenance, and management of acquired lands. That measure would provide the proper vehicle to perform management and maintenance responsibilities proposed in Senate Bill 2817.

Notwithstanding the above, should this bill be enacted, the proposed Honolua Bay acquisition and management plan must comply with the provisions of Section 171-30, Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS"), which provides the Board the exclusive responsibility to acquire private land for the State for public purposes. Section 171-30(e), HRS, further provides that no land shall be purchased for a sum greater than the highest value fixed by an independent appraiser contracted for by the State.

Dear Honorable Chair Baker, Honorable Vice Chair Tsutsui and Committee Members:

Maui Land & Pincapple Company, Inc. ("ML&P") does not feel that creation of the temporary Honolua Bay advisory committee to develop a plan for the acquisition and management of Lipoa Point is necessary at this time. ML&P requests that the task of the advisory committee be amended to concentrate their efforts on developing a management plan to protect the marine resources in the Honolua Bay Marine Life Conservation District.

The County of Maui has already initiated a process where they are facilitating discussions with individuals and community groups interested in the future of the Lipoa Point-Honolua Bay area. These efforts have shown early signs of progress and ML&P remains hopeful that the participants will be able to build consensus through this process. ML&P believes that the creation of another advisory entity at this stage could prove to be potentially disruptive to a promising course of action that is currently underway. While we appreciate the positive intent of this bill, we believe it is unnecessary at this time because of the collaborative efforts between the community, the County of Maui and ML&P.

The Honolua Bay Marine Life Conservation District is an area that is very popular with visitors that come to Maui. Most recently, there have been concerns raised relative to the volume of use and how it may be adversely impacting the fauna and flora in the bay. The creation of a temporary Honolua Bay Advisory Committee that will be tasked to develop a management plan to protect the marine resources in the bay will insure that the bay will be there for all to enjoy in the future.

Chair Baker, Vice Chair Tsutsui and committee members, thank you for the opportunity to testify on SB 2817, SD 1. The State Procurement Office's (SPO) testimony is limited to Section 3 that provides for a "non-bid" contract with a consultant.

The SPO does not support the language to exempt from HRS chapter 103D, the contract for a consultant to develop a management plan for the Honolua bay marine life conservation district.

Statutory exemptions are contrary to the Hawaii Public Procurement Code (Code), section 103D-102, HRS, on the applicability of the chapter that states in part ". . . shall apply to all procurement contracts made by governmental bodies whether the consideration for the contract is cash, revenues, realizations, receipts, or earnings, . . ." Any governmental agency with the authority to expend funds should be in compliance with chapter 103D, which promotes the policy of fair and equitable treatment of all persons who deal with the procurement system; fosters effective broad-based competition; and increases public confidence in public procurement.

The SPO is against statutorily exempting specific purchases from the Code, as it is not in the best interest of government, the business community, and the general public. The Code establishes a time-tested, fair, and reliable set of rules and processes for award of contracts. The competitive procurement processes of the Code are to insure that all potential providers are afforded the opportunity to compete for the required services. To the extent agencies may need specific purchases to be exempted from Code requirements, the Code provides an exemption process.

The Code should not be viewed as an obstacle to a purchasing agency's mission, but rather as the single source of public procurement policy to be applied equally and uniformly to obtain its requirements. It was the legislature's intent for the Code to be a single source of public procurement policy. If individual agencies are exempted and allowed to develop their own individual processes, it becomes problematic for the administration and vendors/contractors that must comply with a variety of processes. Fairness, open competition, a level playing field, and government disclosure and transparency in the procurement and contracting process are vital to good government. For this to be accomplished, we must participate in the process with one set of statutes and rules.

In conclusion, there is no compelling reason to statutorily exempt the contract for a consultant to develop a management plan for the Honolua bay marine life conservation district. The SPO recommends amending Page 4, lines 21 and 22, as follows:

SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for development of the Honolua Bay management plan under section 2 of this Act, including the hiring of a consultant without regard to chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to develop the plan.

Dear Honorable Chair Baker, Honorable Vice Chair Tsutsui and Committee Members,

The Save Honolua Coalition, as a voice for the community, recognizes and is grateful for your intent to benefit Honolua through your proposed legislation. While we appreciate the efforts of the state government to take positive action for Honolua, we respectfully request that the bill be modified to more faithfully reflect the desires of the community.

We feel that the formation of another committee as suggested in Bill 2817 is not necessary at this time as there is already a coalition of community members and stakeholders that are close to the situation and issues.

Save Honolua Coalition is currently working with the land owner, our local community, Kupuna, stakeholders and environmental experts to develop a community-based management plan for the area. We are utilizing a DLNR published resource that was created with several partners, including the Community Conservation Network to guide our process. We feel confident that the community working together will create a solution with broad support.

Our vision is to revitalize the health of the Honolua Ahupua'a through community-based management utilizing Hawaiian practices and values.

We therefore support the acquisition of land around Honolua Bay and Lipoa Point – and additionally Punalau and lands mauka. The preservation of the land upslope is critical to restoring health to this area, is in line with the West Maui Community Plan and has been passionately supported by thousands within our community.

Instead of funding the formation of another committee, we respectfully request that this bill be revised to earmark state funds for the acquisition of land in the Honolua Ahupua'a.

SHC has launched a coordinated effort to gather land acquisition funds from county, state, federal and private sources with the goal of establishing a community land trust. We also recognize the possibility that the land owner can donate land as well.

Maui County has already earmarked \$1,000,000 for the purchase of Honolua lands. If the state does not make a financial commitment in this session, we cannot further our effort and request funds from the federal government. We need your help now to save this cherished area.

Save Honolua Coalition has held more than 30 public meetings with speakers from County and State government, including the Mayor of Maui County, Hawaiian Practitioners and Kupuna, and environmental experts. Our volunteers have collected more than 15,000 signatures on our petition supporting land acquisition and we are in the process of filing for 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status.

We pray you will help save Honolua with a financial commitment!

However, if this Bill goes forward with the formation of a temporary committee, we suggest the following:

1. The hired consultant will be a professional with experience in community management planning. We recommend a facilitator from the Community Conservation Network.

2. Consideration of additional committee members:

One member representing Aha Moku Council

One cultural representative from the immediate community

One member with conservation land use planning expertise

3. Funding for an independent archaeological study.

4. Funding for soil and water testing.
