The Kaua'i Economic Development Board (KEDB) strongly supports SB 2852, relating to economic development diversification.

For the past several years, KEDB, through its private/public partnerships, have been very active and successful in leveraging resources from federal, state, county and the private sector to create economic opportunities for Kaua'i. We continue to work collaboratively on various innovative projects to foster and nurture technology growth and other diversified industries in renewable energy and food and fuel sustainability, including recruiting and building an appropriately trained workforce to support that growth.

We thank the 2007 Legislature for appropriating funds for the 3Ts Program (Act 271) and despite the delay in the Economic Development Alliance of Hawaii (EDAH) receiving such funds, KEDB, through its Aloha 'Ike Grant Program and Women in Technology Program (administered by Maui Economic Development Board statewide), has been able to start a Project EAST Program at Kaua'i High School on a limited basis while still lending support to the existing program at Chiefess Kamakahelei Middle School.

The funds appropriated last year through Act 271 and funding for SB 2852 this year, together with our local public/private resources, will serve to broaden and expand our existing efforts and augment the ability for more organizations, as appropriate, to work together on economic development diversification activities.
