Chairs Fukunaga and Sakamoto, Vice Chairs Espero and Tokuda, and members of the Committees.

The Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism (DBEDT) provides the following comments on SB 3168 which seeks to establish a creative media program within the University of Hawaii's (UH) West Oahu campus, to provide some level of funding for the UH Academy for Creative Media (ACM) and amends Act 11, special session 2007 to delete all reference to a lease agreement with PBS Hawaii. There have been many good ideas introduced this legislative session that support the State's economic development goals. We note, however, that this appropriation was not included in the Executive's Supplemental Budget, and request that this appropriation not displace the priorities contained in that budget.

The UH ACM program has made great strides in developing a strong curriculum for our next generation of bright and talented Hawaii filmmakers, all with very limited

resources. An Academy for Creative Media program at UH's West Oahu Campus is a much needed step in expanding ACM's reach. By establishing a program at UH's West Oahu Campus, many students who would not otherwise have the opportunity to participate in the ACM will be able to enroll in a variety of classes and pursue careers that may not have been as accessible to them.

The department supports wholeheartedly the leadership and work of ACM and applauds the program's ability to excel to the degree it has with its students in just a few short years.

We appreciate the opportunity to testify.

Purpose:

Appropriate funds to establish an academy for creative media program to enhance and expand the scope of the Hawaii excellence through science and technology academies for the University of Hawaii community colleges and the Department of Education.

Department's Position:

The Department of Education supports S.B. 3168 and recommends that the creative media academy program be facilitated jointly by the University of Hawaii community college system and the Department of Education. The continuity and transition from elementary programs to middle school programs to high school programs to postsecondary programs must be aligned to ensure progressive skills and knowledge development and avoid duplication. This program should be included in the Dual Credit Articulated Programs of Study (DCAPS) options for high school students.

The Department requests the opportunity to work with the committee, the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism and the community colleges to draft the language in this Bill to ensure current Department initiatives are not duplicated by the actions proposed in this Bill.

SB 3168 - Relating to Creative Media

Chairs Fukunaga and Sakamoto; Vice Chairs Espero and Tokuda; and members of the Committees:

I am Linda K. Johnsrud, Vice President for Academic Planning and Policy, University of Hawai'i System. I am providing this testimony on behalf of the University of Hawai'i System on Senate Bill 3168 which establishes the Academy for Creative Media at the UH West Oʻahu campus, and amends Act 11, Special Session of 2007, to delete all references to a lease agreement with PBS Hawai'i.

Senate Bill 3168 acknowledges the vitality of the Academy for Creative Media program since it was created by the Board of Regents three years ago, its value to the state's economy, and its need for a central facility and permanent home. We concur. We also object to the intent of this bill to move a Board of Regent's approved program from one campus to another within the UH system.

Since August 2004, ACM Chair Tom Brislin has developed the ACM curriculum, hired and developed its faculty, created its major requirements and basic organizational structure, and drafted a proposal for a UH Mānoa Bachelor of Arts degree in Arts and Sciences which is under review by UH Mānoa Faculty Senate. ACM has been steadily growing for four years as a Mānoa Arts and Sciences major and has achieved high measures of academic respect on the campus and throughout the system. More than 100 Mānoa students have applied to become majors in ACM. An additional 80 students are enrolled in ACM pre-major courses. ACM engages in both system wide and lower education initiatives to create an educational pipeline from digital media programs in high schools and community colleges to Mānoa.

ACM students have benefited from being part of the Mānoa campus. They draw heavily from strong departments in English, History, Philosophy, Theatre, Computer Science, Political Science, Foreign Language Studies, Sociology, Hawaiian Studies, Asian Studies, and Ethnic Studies. Their skills as story-tellers are enriched by not only the breadth, but the depth of a liberal arts education available at the Mānoa campus.

There is a rich inter- and cross-disciplinary collaboration among ACM faculty as well as students. Video game design courses rely on the programmers and coders from Computer Science as much as they rely on ACM's own artists and creators. The Music

Department wants to partner with ACM to provide its students the opportunity to compose original soundtracks and music for film. Art students share their time with ACM animation courses. Scientists in Marine Science programs want to collaborate with ACM in producing science documentaries. The Richardson School of Law is interested in jointly exploring issues of indigenous intellectual property rights. These are the kinds of intellectual and creative collaborations available at the Mānoa campus.

ACM has a solid and respected academic home at UH Manoa with a budget of nearly \$1 million, 10 faculty, and 2 staff positions. Thirty-two courses have been approved through the Mānoa academic review system. The accomplishments of hundreds of interested and active students have brought the program national and international recognition. These are not hallmarks of a program in search of a home. They are the outcomes of an academic and creative collaboration of students, faculty, and administration.

I have discussed Senate Bill 3168 with Chancellors Virginia Hinshaw of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa and Gene Awakuni of the University of Hawai'i at West O'ahu. Chancellor Hinshaw expressed appreciation for the support shown for the Academy of Creative Media by Senate Bill 3168 and the intent to provide support for the program. She welcomes the financial support which as amended is consistent with Mānoa's priority for repairs and maintenance and campus refurbishment. Such support will enable Mānoa to secure enhanced facilities for ACM. The Chancellor does not support the movement of the Academy of Creative Media from the Mānoa to the West O'ahu campus. Chancellor Awakuni defers to UH Mānoa's position in this matter.

For these reasons, the University of Hawai'i, while expressing appreciation for the legislature's support, opposes the move of the Academy for Creative Media from one campus to another as proposed by Senate Bill 3168.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in SUPPORT of SB 3168.

As a member of the Honolulu City Council in the 1980's and a State Senator in the 1990's I have initiated or strongly supported efforts to create a permanent campus for the UH West Oahu. The effort has been a long one, but significant strides were made during my years in the Senate, particularly enacting legislation to secure land from Campbell Estate for a permanent campus in the "Second City" of Kapolei.

I have always believed that good land use planning for the island of Oahu involved the establishment of a "second city" on the Ewa plains. I further believed that a UH West Oahu campus was a critical component to the success of a second city – a campus teeming with students was an anchor institution to attract businesses and jobs to the second city so that it was a place where people not only lived, but worked.

I also believed that having an institution of higher learning on Oahu's Leeward Coast would inspire our young students to go to college and could provide much needed outreach activity to those in need on the Leeward Coast.

A functioning, vibrant, and meaningful UH West Oahu will not arise merely because land has been secured and buildings are built. What is critical are the programs which are offered to students at this "new" campus. For UH West Oahu, an academy for creative media is a perfect fit. As noted in sec. 1 of the bill "Waianae Searider Productions has demonstrated the transformational power of multi-media literacy to engage our most atrisk students." It is my understanding that creative media programs are the "happening" thing in West Oahu high schools. Waianae H.S. is the most notable but I'm told that high schools like Campbell and Kapolei have programs as well.

Obviously, the University of Hawaii's priority mission is to provide excellent post secondary education to our young adults. But I also believe that it has another mission as well - as a member of our community, to contribute to the proper planning and growth in this State. A permanent UH West Oahu campus in Kapolei, and establishing an academy for creative media at the campus fulfills both goals.
