Aloha Chairs Takumi & Green, Vice-Chairs Berg & Mizuno, & Members of the Committee:

My name is George White, a second year-law student at the University of Hawaii, and creator of stopstyrofoamhawaii.org. I am writing in support of SCR134 SD2 but feel certain amendments should be suggested and additional information be provided to this Committee should this Resolution be adopted by this Legislature.

The intent behind this resolution, encouraging food waste and food ware recycling, is without question a step in the right direction towards a more sustainable Hawaii and is in line with the recommendations of the Hawaii 2050 Sustainability Report.

The recommendations of the Hawaii Food Industry Association, however, in their testimony before the Senate CPH Committee, concerning the recyclability of polystyrene is misguided at best, and the Resolution should be amended to redact some of their misleading assertions.

While it is correct that the Massachussetts public school system, at this time, is engaged in separating organic waste from styrofoam food ware, this is viewed strictly as an intermediate step. Massachusetts is actively pursuing and encouraging composting programs across the State, not polystyrene recycling. (See:

The recycling information sheets provided to the public schools emphasize a desire to eventually use compostable products as opposed to styrofoam products to reduce disposal costs and achieve greater sustainability. (See:

In fact, the State of Massachusetts' Solid Waste Master Plan (June 2006) doesn't even mention polystyrene once, whereas the word compost appears fifty-nine times. (See: http://www.mass.gov/dep/recycle/priorities/dswmpu01.htm#swmp).

This information was not provided to the members of Senate CPH Committee, who were misled to believe that polystyrene can be feasibly recycled here in Hawaii. The likelihood of this occurring is slim to none, and the efforts and resources of DOH & DOE would be better spent pursuing and encouraging alternative options to recycling polystyrene, such as composting and the use of styrofoam alternative products.

Styrofoam plays an adversarial role to sustainability and is inherently non-compostable. Similarly, styrofoam is not feasibly recycled anywhere in the Country. The plastics industry themselves acknowledge that recycling of polystyrene is a losing proposition, and has been for well over two decades. (See:

This Legislature should not be encouraging or promoting further dependence and use of polystyrene food ware products. In fact, one of the immediate recommendations of the 2050 Sustainability Report, encourages all government agencies to adopt sustainable practices, including buying biodegradable products.

I respectfully request that this Committee consider amending the Resolution to remove references to polystyrene food ware recycling in WHEREAS' 12, 13 & 14, and that the second BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED is amended to encourage the use of compostable products as opposed to urging DOE & DOH to waste time developing and implementing pointless and inefficient, non-sustainable polystyrene recycling programs.

Finally, I'd like to share with this Committee the voices of hundreds of individuals from across the State who recognize the threats posed by polystyrene food ware and the need to encourage and promote the use of alternative products. Over the last two weeks, over 950 people have signed an online petition and provided numerous comments, urging a reduction in the use of styrofoam food ware products in the State and encouraging this Legislature to support the use of compostable alternatives. SCR134 SD2 is a step in the right direction towards a more environmentally-conscious and sustainable Hawaii. Though gradual, with efforts such as those urged in SCR134, we can move our vision of sustainability forward and make a huge difference for our Hawaii, for today, and for all of our tomorrows. Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony and for your support of this important issue.
