As SCR 220 pointed out, there are no longer deaths and serious injuries of graduates on graduation night – thanks to the work of the Project Graduation coordinator and the many parents and community members who make events in 50 high schools truly life-saving and memorable experiences.

Training is an absolute essential part of Project Graduation and MADD Hawaii favors using some of the Drivers Education funds to support the training component since the Federal grant is ending. Project Graduation has become a wonderful way for the community and parents to come together to ensure that graduates reach their future. We urge the committee to pass this resolution.

My name is Gary Taketa and I have served as a committee member of Roosevelt PG and am currently Co Chair for Roosevelt Project Graduation 2008. I am currently the chairperson for the Ma'ema'e Elementary School Community Council. I have also served as member of the Ma'ema'e SCBM, a board member and president of the Ma'ema'e PTSA. I have also served as a Den Leader with Cub Scout Pack 201 and Leader and Committee Chair for Boy Scout Troop 201. I also served as a board member and president of the Kawanankoa PTSA. I have also been a member of the Kawanankoa and currently Roosevelt Band Booster Club.

It has been my experience that parent participation in school activities is generally very good at the elementary level and begins to taper off at middle and intermediate school and very difficult or almost non-existent at the high school level. Project Graduation is one of the few high school activities that the parents can get involved.

Roosevelt High School has the distinction of being the first public high school in the State of Hawaii to have a Project Graduation in June 1990. It was with the foresight of the Advisor of the Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD) Chapter, school administration, PTSA and parent volunteers that this movement started to give the "gift of life" to their children. Project Grad is an alcohol free and drug free celebration with classmates after commencement. But it is more than that, embedded in this activity are positive benefits like involvement of parents, school and community partnerships with businesses and corporations; it is a once in a lifetime, memorable celebration, first class reunion, last celebration with all the classmates; worry free evening for the parents, knowing that the children are in a safe environment and the event normally requires a minimal fee to attend. It is my understanding that there are close to 50 high schools in Hawaii that have a Project Grad.

It is a known fact that traffic crashes are still the leading cause of death for youth between 15 and 24 years of age. Nationally, on the average, every two to three weeks, a whole senior class is wiped out due to alcohol-related crashes caused by underage drinking and driving!! Think about this! I was just approached by a parent at Roosevelt and he reflected on his graduation night and how he lost a classmate and very close friend in an alcohol related auto accident, not even 8 hours after graduating!!!

I believe this is what PG is about, if we are able to save just one life, isn't worth all the time and effort? Think of all the tomorrows the graduating class will have. Think of all the anguish that the friends, families, relatives will be spared. But also, think about the losses, not only in property and in human value that will not occur.

Hawaii has the unique distinction of being the only state in the nation with the policy that all students who participate in PG celebrations CANNOT drive after the event and must be picked up by a designated driver who is 21 years of age or older. This policy evolved because PG events were viewed as an alcohol countermeasure program for the community.

Most of the information I am conveying to you was presented at the orientation and training for PG parents, like myself, over the past couple of years. These sessions minimize "reinventing the wheel" if I may and help with our learning curve as we move on with the planning for our PG. I strongly support the passage of this Resolution encouraging the DOE to continue Project Graduation training for parents through driver education funds. Thank you for your time.

Unfortunately, each year there is a new group of parents organizing Project Graduation events for the graduating class. As stated in the S.C.R. No. 220, Project Graduation is recognized as a community prevention program to reduce injuries and fatalities during graduation season and has been a successful traffic safety education activity conducted statewide. In order to keep Project Graduation a success, it is essential that training be offered for parents each year. The current federal grant supporting Project Graduation training will end in September, 2008. I have volunteered in the past at Castle's and Kailua's Project Graduation Events and am now deeply involved in Kailua's Project Grad. My daughter is a senior at Kailua High, my older daughter graduated in 2006, and I am so glad that they have this event to celebrate their graduation. As a parent, it gives me piece of mind to know that my child will be safe and not out driving around with drunk drivers on the road. If Project Grad was not available for the graduates, they would be out celebrating with friends, going from one party to the next. I remember when I graduated, that's exactly what we did, although the drinking age was 18 at the time. With Project Grad in place, police do not have to worry about graduates being on the road. The training events for the parents in the Project Graduation committee are crucial because it helps them to understand the reason why it was formed, and it also gives them the tools and knowledge to carryout the event successfully.

As noted in the Resolution, Project Graduation is one of the three high school activities in which parents get involved. Though parent participation in school activities is generally good at the elementary level, it tapers off at middle school, and is almost non-existent at the high school level, despite efforts of school staff, with the exception of band, athletics, and Project Graduation.
