There are a total of 64 making up the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate. Twenty-three American Universities have women Presidents, of which four of eight Ivy League Universities are women Presidents. Women have flown in the space shuttles and recently a woman commanded the Space Shuttle. The President of Harvard University is a woman.

In Hawaii we have a woman Governor, a President of the State Senate, a Rear Admiral Next of the U.S. Coast Guard and the Federal

Bureau of Investigation and countless heads of business and women organizations, Doctors & Nurses, TV anchors, Department Head of Education, woman head department heads and Supervisors and the list goes on and on.

A woman is the Director of the Hawaii National Guard's State Program for Veterans and their families. Hawaii's homegrown and educated, Major Tammy Duckworth, a double amputee of the Iraq War, is Director of the State of Illinois Veterans Affairs. Recently, Maui now has its first Police Captain. The Chief of Police in Washington D.C. is a woman, as they assume this position in other municipalities. A woman is President of the Episcopal Church in the U.S. A woman is in second command at the U.S. Naval Academy.



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# SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO AUTHORIZE THE  
ESTABLISHMENT OF A NATIONAL MONUMENT FOR WOMEN IN  
WASHINGTON, D.C., TO RECOGNIZE AND HONOR THE CONTRIBUTIONS  
TO LEADERSHIP BY AMERICA'S WOMEN.

1           WHEREAS, the 2007 International Women's Leadership  
2 Conference, hosted by the State of Hawaii, inspired and  
3 empowered women to enhance the understanding of what it means to  
4 be a woman leader; and

6           WHEREAS, the presenters (all women) at the International  
7 Women's Leadership Conference were chosen for their exemplary  
8 leadership role models, including business and government  
9 executives, community organization directors, and scientific  
10 experts from all over the world; and

12           WHEREAS, the International Women's Leadership Conference  
13 lifted the vision of women in business, government service, and  
14 all professions to higher sights, higher standards, and exciting  
15 and attainable futures; and

17           WHEREAS, particularly for women in Hawaii, the  
18 International Women's Leadership Conference helped them realize  
19 their potential and collective strength for contribution of

Dear Senator Clinton:

It is time. It is long, long overdue. From the Revolutionary War to the current Iraq War, the American Woman has been consumed with the hardship of life. The stalwart and steadfast American woman continues to endure for family and now for country, as they are being militarily deployed.

Between 1990 and 2000, the women veteran population increased 33.3 percent from 1.2 million to 1.6 million, and women now represent approximately 7 percent of veteran population. By the year 2010, it is projected that women veterans will comprise well over 10 percent of the veteran population. Currently women make up 15 percent of the active duty force and approximately 23 percent of the reserve force. (Statistics from Volume 10, Number 1 State of Hawaii Office of Veterans Services, January – March 2006 – Newsletter to Veterans).

The impetus to my formulating thinking to pay tribute, honor and recognize America's women, by building a monument to them in Washington, D.C. began by my writing to Hawaii's 29<sup>th</sup> Brigade Army National Guard. Major General Lee, Adjutant General of the State of Hawaii and Commander of its National Guard, put out a call to the community, in our Honolulu Advertiser newspaper, to write, send cards, email and send packages to Hawaii's citizen soldiers deployed in Iraq, Afghanistan and Kuwait to show them they are not forgotten and remembered back home. The project was called "Operation Uplift".

Being a post Korean war veteran stationed overseas, I know and appreciated any form of mail.

In contacting the Adjutant General's Office of the Hawaii Army National Guard, I was sent the names and addresses of 25 points of contact to write to. The twenty five points of contact were each responsible for 130 men and women soldiers. I had written 5 letters to each of the 25 points of contact in Iraq and Kuwait. The two detachments in Afghanistan received 9 letters each. Their deployment was four months longer.

As a retiree, I had written during a period of 16 months. It was done peace meal at different times of the day. When the 29<sup>th</sup> Brigade's deployment was completed, my wife and I attended the many welcoming home arrivals. My wife and I also attended the Hawaii Army National

Guard Freedom Salute ceremonies, where they were handed and received service and recognition medals and awards.

During all the ceremonies I keenly observed the many wives with their children who were left at home while their husbands were deployed. Also, the wives who were deployed leaving their husbands home to take care of the children. A female SFC Sergeant returned home from Afghanistan noticing her husband was also a National Guardsman with their three children in attendance. I asked him were you and your wife deployed at the same time. His response was "Not this time." At this same ceremony my wife and I were sitting next to a West Pointer, Lieutenant Colonel Cheshire. He was deployed for one year in Iraq as a National Guardsman leaving his wife at home with 6 children, ages 1 to 11.

Further, in a rare happenstance my wife and I met Lieutenant General John A. Goodman, the Commandant of the U.S. Marine Corps in the Pacific and Far East, at a Waikiki hotel. In conversing with the General I asked for some Marines I could write to. He had his Lieutenant Colonel call me at home furnishing names and addresses. Lieutenant Colonel James Bierman Battalion had been in the Battle of Fallujah, in Iraq but were now in Afghanistan. I had written to him and his 5 Company Commanders and Marines 5 times each. We met Lieutenant Colonel Bierman on his return home at the Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station. We also met his lovely wife and 5 children. Can you imagine? Soldiers and Marines leaving their wives with 5 and 6 children while being deployed. Their burden exemplifies why they and other women be recognized with a monument in their honor in Washington, D.C.

One Company Commander, a Michael Miller Marine (Major) will be deployed for the sixth time in the Spring of 2007 (Iraq). He will be leaving his wife at home for the sixth time with one child. I am writing to Norm Cooling (Lieutenant Marine Colonel) who will be returning home in September from Iraq. After giving a blood (at Tripler Army Hospital) donation for the troops, I met by coincidence, Marine Lieutenant Colonel Donnelly who will be replacing Lt. Col. Cooling. After Lt. Col. Donnelly returns home it will be back to Iraq for Lt. Col. Bierman.

No other time in history of the United States has it become more fitting than the present to honor and pay tribute to the American woman. They have been the stalwart and the power in supporting her marriage, family and country. Nothing surpasses a woman's unconditional love.

I would be remiss if I didn't individually mention and pay homage to all of you for your work in the U.S. Senate and your service to our country and on the homefront of family and that your names be listed on the monument who spearheaded the movement to fruition with National Women's organizations.

All the monuments in Washington, D.C. honor men and none for women, with the exception of the nurses. The American Woman, you give of yourself to others all day long. You help, you comfort, you encourage, and you support your family and friends, your marriage, your life and all its many details. And now it is time for you. A monument should be built in your honor.

It is time!





## The Women's Memorial In Virginia

Dear Pamela,  
I just finished reading the "Applause" letter in *MidWeek* from Michael Augusta regarding a memorial honoring American military women over the years.
