## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND THE HAWAII BUSINESS  
COMMUNITY TO SUPPORT THE ESTABLISHMENT OF PAID FAMILY LEAVE  
IN HAWAII.

1           WHEREAS, the increasing number of working adults in the  
2 United States has created a greater need for employees to have  
3 paid time off when their parents are seriously ill; and  
4

5           WHEREAS, more than sixty per cent of men and women under  
6 the age of fifty-nine think it is likely that in the next ten  
7 years they will need to take leave to care for an elderly parent  
8 or relative; and  
9

10           WHEREAS, only fifty-five per cent of employees in the  
11 United States are eligible under the federal Family Medical  
12 Leave Act for unpaid family leave for certain medical  
13 situations; and  
14

15           WHEREAS, more than seventy-five per cent of employees who  
16 needed family leave but did not take it, reported that they  
17 could not afford to take the unpaid leave; and  
18

19           WHEREAS, nine per cent of people who took leave under the  
20 federal Family Medical Leave Act used public assistance to help  
21 cover the wages lost while on unpaid family leave; and  
22

23           WHEREAS, paid family leave could reduce the amount of  
24 taxpayer money spent on welfare, unemployment compensation, food  
25 stamps, and other public programs, by reducing the number of  
26 people who must rely on public assistance when taking unpaid  
27 leave under the federal Family Medical Leave Act; and

29           WHEREAS, the estimated cost of paid family leave is  
30 relatively low; and

1 WHEREAS, paid family leave helps employers retain valued  
 2 employees; ninety-four per cent of employees who took paid leave  
 3 returned to their same employer after taking leave, compared  
 4 with approximately seventy-four per cent of those who were  
 5 partially paid, and seventy-seven per cent of those who were not  
 6 paid at all; and

7  
 8 WHEREAS, a large number of people support using disability  
 9 insurance to provide partial wages when people need to take  
 10 leave from work to care for a seriously ill parent; and

11  
 12 WHEREAS, seventy per cent of Republicans, eighty-seven per  
 13 cent of Democrats, and seventy-nine per cent of Independents  
 14 support expanding the federal Family Medical Leave Act; now,  
 15 therefore,

16  
 17 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the  
 18 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session  
 19 of 2009, the Senate concurring, that members of the Legislature  
 20 and the business community in Hawaii are urged to support the  
 21 establishment of paid family leave in Hawaii; and

22  
 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this  
 24 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the President of the  
 25 Senate; the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and the  
 26 Director of Labor and Industrial Relations, who in turn is  
 27 requested to transmit copies to the Executive Director of the  
 28 Hawaii Business Roundtable; the President of the Chamber of  
 29 Commerce of Hawaii; the State Director of NFIB Hawaii; the  
 30 Chairperson of the Board of Directors of Small Business Hawaii;  
 31 the President of the International Longshore and Warehouse  
 32 Union, Local 142; the Presidents of the International  
 33 Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Locals 1186, 1260, and 1357;  
 34 the President of the Teamsters, Local 996; the Presidents of the  
 35 Iron Workers Union, Locals 625, 742, and 803; and the President  
 36 of Unite Here, Local 5.
