
HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE TO ISSUE POSTAL STAMPS
HONORING THE WORLD WAR II JAPANESE-AMERICAN NISEI SOLDIERS,
OTHER DISTINGUISHED MILITARY UNITS IN UNITED STATES
HISTORY, AND AMERICANS WHO FOUGHT AGAINST DISCRIMINATION
BASED ON RACE OR NATIONAL ORIGIN.

1 WHEREAS, Over 20,000 Nisei (Second-generation Japanese-
2 American) enlisted in the United States Army in World War II,
3 many from internment camps, despite the prejudice generated
4 after the attack of Pearl Harbor by Japan in 1941; and
5

6 WHEREAS, on February 1, 1943, the 442nd Regimental Combat
7 Team was activated by President Roosevelt, stating that
8 "Americanism is not and never was, a matter of race and
9 ancestry"; and
10

11 WHEREAS, among their many battles, Nisei soldiers in Europe
12 fought at Monte Cassino, and were critical in breaking the
13 German "Gothic Lines," and liberating towns such as Bruyeres,
14 Biffontaine, and Belvedere, as well as freeing and aiding
15 Holocaust victims from the Dachau concentration camps; and
16

17 WHEREAS, the most famous Nisei unit, the 100th/442nd
18 Regimental Combat Team also known as the "Go For Broke"
19 regiment, was the most decorated unit for its size and length of
20 service in American history; and

22 WHEREAS, the 100th/442nd Regimental Combat Team's rescue of
23 the "Lost Battalion" was acknowledged to be one of the prominent
24 battles in Army history in which they led a heroic drive through
25 German lines in the Vosges Mountains in October 1944 freeing
26 over 200 fellow American soldiers of the 36th Texas Division; and



1 WHEREAS, the Nisei soldiers of World War II earned 21
2 Medals of Honor, nine Presidential Unit citations, and more than
3 9,000 Purple Hearts; and
4

5 WHEREAS, Japanese-American soldiers of World War II proved
6 their loyalty through the sacrifices they made in service to the
7 United States and the decorations and awards they earned are a
8 permanent and indisputable record of their bravery and
9 patriotism; and
10

11 WHEREAS, in 2006 a nationwide campaign started in
12 California to urge the United States Postal Service to issue a
13 commemorative postage stamp to honor the contributions of the
14 Japanese-American soldiers of World War II; and
15

16 WHEREAS, the Postal Service has issued stamps honoring
17 other brave and distinguished minority veterans groups, such as
18 Hispanic-American soldiers recognized in 1984 and African-
19 American Buffalo Soldiers in 1994; and
20

21 WHEREAS, the service of these minority soldiers throughout
22 our country's history helped to dispel many of the myths that
23 were so prevalent about the abilities and loyalties of these
24 individuals, and worked towards enhancing race relations and
25 ending discrimination based on race; and
26

27 WHEREAS, numerous other military units have served with
28 distinction throughout the history of this great nation,
29 including units such as the 54th Massachusetts during the
30 American Civil War, and the 101st and 82nd Airborne Divisions
31 during World War II; now, therefore,

33 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
34 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session
35 of 2009, the Senate concurring, that the Legislature urges the
36 Postmaster General to approve the issuance of a United States
37 commemorative stamp honoring the significant contributions of
38 the Nisei Soldiers in the United States Army during World War II
39 and honoring their shining example of patriotic sacrifice in our
40 nation's history, for their service with outstanding valor
41 despite the many obstacles against them; and

1 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Postmaster General is also
2 urged to consider and approve the issuance of United States
3 commemorative stamps honoring other distinguished military units
4 from throughout the history of this great nation; and

6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Postmaster General is also
7 urged to consider and approve the issuance of United States
8 commemorative stamps honoring individuals and organizations who
9 were instrumental in enhancing race relations in the United
10 States and who worked towards ending discrimination based on
11 race or national origin; and

13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
14 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to United States Postmaster
15 General and Chief Executive Officer John Potter and Hawaii's
16 Congressional Delegation.
