
HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT MANOA, COLLEGE OF SOCIAL SCIENCES, PUBLIC POLICY CENTER AND SPARK M. MATSUNAGA INSTITUTE FOR PEACE AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION TO CONVENE A WORKING GROUP TO EXPLORE THE SAFE USE OF HUNTING DOGS ON PUBLIC HIKING TRAILS.

1 WHEREAS, certain public hiking trails in the State of
2 Hawaii traverse across areas designated by the Department of
3 Land and Natural Resources (DNLR) as hunting areas, where
4 hunters, hikers, and outdoor enthusiasts come into contact with
5 one another; and

6
7 WHEREAS, contact between these users increase on weekends
8 and state holidays, which are designated by DLNR as hunting
9 days; and

10
11 WHEREAS, both hikers and hunters may be accompanied by dogs
12 on these hiking trails; and

13
14 WHEREAS, the placement of public hiking trails in hunting
15 areas makes it easier for hunting dogs to move without restraint
16 on trails that are also used by hikers with pet dogs; and

17
18 WHEREAS, non-hunters are required by DLNR to keep their pet
19 dogs on leashes at all times while on public trails; and

20
21 WHEREAS, hunters are required by DLNR to keep their dogs
22 "under restrictive control during transportation while in
23 transit at all times, to and from hunting areas within the
24 forest reserve"; and

25
26 WHEREAS, hunting dogs are trained to aggressively pursue
27 all animals, without distinction between wild animals and pet
28 dogs; and



1 WHEREAS, while there are trailheads that require hunter
2 check-in forms, they are not always properly filled out or
3 verified, making it impossible for hikers or other outdoor
4 enthusiasts with pet dogs to know whether hunters or hunting
5 dogs are in the vicinity; and

7 WHEREAS, it is not uncommon for hunting dogs to become
8 separated from the hunters they accompany and in some cases are
9 left behind; and

10
11 WHEREAS, hikers and outdoor enthusiasts who take their pet
12 dogs on public trails in these areas are concerned that
13 aggressive hunting dogs are roaming freely and may harm their
14 pet dogs; and

15
16 WHEREAS, the officers of DLNR's Division of Conservation
17 and Resources Enforcement that are responsible for enforcing
18 rules regarding hunting dogs lack the resources for enforcement
19 across vast areas of state lands and are unable to respond to
20 the legitimate concerns of non-hunters; and

21
22 WHEREAS, lost, injured, and neglected hunting dogs at times
23 end up at local animal shelters without any permanent
24 identification, making it difficult to reunite them with their
25 owners and generating additional expenses for taxpayers; and

26
27 WHEREAS, a dialogue among the various groups that are
28 affected by the presence of hunting dogs on public hiking trails
29 would be constructive in making concerns known and addressing
30 those concerns in a way that is amenable to all parties; and

31
32 WHEREAS, failure to address the issues posed by allowing
33 hunting dogs to accompany hunters may negatively impact
34 residents' and tourists' perceptions of safety on public hiking
35 trails that travel across hunting areas; now, therefore,

37 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
38 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session
39 of 2009, the Senate concurring, that the University of Hawaii at
40 Manoa, College of Social Sciences, Public Policy Center and
41 Spark M. Matsunaga Institute for Peace and Conflict Resolution
42 are requested to convene a working group to explore the safe use
43 of hunting dogs on public hiking trails; and
