"A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH,"

begs leave to report as follows:

The purpose of this bill is to establish the Hawaii Health Authority (Authority) to develop a comprehensive plan to provide universal health care in Hawaii.

Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies, Hawaii Government Employees Association, ILWU Local 142, Hawaii Primary Care Association, Hawaii Family Forum, Roman Catholic Church in the State of Hawaii, Americans for Democratic Action Hawaii, Kokua Kalihi Valley, and several concerned individuals supported this bill. The Department of Budget and Finance opposed this bill. The Hawaii Medical Service Association submitted comments.

Your Committee notes that the purpose of the Authority is to comprehensively reform Hawaii's health care system, and is not limited merely to health insurance.

Your Committee has amended this measure by:

(1) Changing its effective date to July 1, 2020, to encourage further discussion; and

(2) Making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for style, clarity, and consistency.

As affirmed by the record of votes of the members of your Committee on Finance that is attached to this report, your Committee is in accord with the intent and purpose of H.B. No. 1504, as amended herein, and recommends that it pass Second Reading in the form attached hereto as H.B. No. 1504, H.D. 1, and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The cost of health care in Hawaii and the

2 nation is escalating exponentially, and medicaid reimbursements

3 are frequently less than the actual cost of care. Additionally,

4 health insurance premium costs and prescription drug costs are

5 rising rapidly.

6 In recent years, some of the largest hospitals in the state

7 reported that consumers and employers will likely pay more for

8 labor costs due to increased hospital fees and higher insurance

9 premiums, yet receive fewer services in return.

10 The increase in premium costs translates into increased

11 costs for employers. Under the state's Prepaid Health Care Act,

12 private-sector employers are required to pay the bulk of health

13 insurance premiums for their regular employees who work twenty

14 hours or more per week. Because the Act does not require

15 employers to provide health insurance coverage for employees

16 working fewer than twenty hours a week, increased health

17 insurance costs may lead to employers hiring individuals to work

18 fewer than twenty hours per week to avoid higher costs.

- 1 Increased health care costs can also be traced to the
- 2 demand for access to the newest technology for treatment of
- 3 illnesses. It is estimated that new technology is responsible
- 4 for almost fifty per cent of the total increase in health care
- 5 over the last thirty years. While greatly improving the quality
- 6 of life for patients, the costs involved in providing these
- 7 services place a heavy burden on the state's already struggling
- 8 health care system.
- 9 Health agencies are also concerned about the growing number
- 10 of uninsured individuals in the state. Hawaii was once known
- 11 for its low number of uninsured people, between two and five per
- 12 cent in 1994. The Healthcare Association of Hawaii estimates
- 13 that the current rate of uninsured individuals is more than ten
- 14 per cent of the state's population.
- 15 While the Prepaid Health Care Act has served its purpose
- 16 well for many years, it is now time to consider other options to
- 17 address these increased health care costs. There is a need for
- 18 new and innovative legislation that will provide affordable
- 19 health care for all of Hawaii's residents.
- The legislature recognizes the accomplishments of Ah Quon
- 21 McElrath (1915-2008) toward improving the welfare of the people
- 22 of the state. As a lifelong champion of the underdog and an

RELATING TO HEALTH

House Bill No. 1504, H.D. 1, proposes to establish a Hawaii Health Authority administratively attached to the Department of Budget and Finance. The Hawaii Health Authority would be responsible for developing a health plan to provide health care coverage for all individuals in Hawaii.

We are opposed to this bill.

We have concerns on the feasibility of establishing a universal health care insurance system. It is uncertain how the system will be financed and if it will be able to accommodate the additional costs of providing health care for those who are not currently insured. It is also unclear how the healthcare plans of the Employer-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund and the plans of private employers will be combined into a single entity.

Further, the bill makes the proposed Hawaii Health Authority responsible for overall health planning for the State and for determining future capacity needs of health providers, facilities, equipment, and support services providers. This responsibility duplicates the functions of the State Health Planning and Development Agency.

The Hawaii Medical Service Association (HMSA) appreciates the opportunity to testify on HB 1504 HD1.

The language contained in HB 1504 HD1 would create an entity to examine how health care could be reformed in the State of Hawaii. During the 2005 legislative session, Act 223 was passed to create the Health Care Task Force made up of individuals representing all aspects of health care in the community including legislators, hospitals, physicians and the Insurance Commissioner. The Legislature appropriated \$200,000 to the Task Force which was used to contract with The Lewin Group to conduct a study of health care in the state utilizing information contained in the Vision 2000 Healthcare Congress and the Governor's Blue Ribbon Panel on Cancer Care in Hawaii among other resources.

Based on the Task Force meetings, the Lewin Group produced a lengthy 85 page report. Since this report examined many of the issues raised in HB 1504 HD1, we believe that the efforts outlined in HB 1504 HD1 may end up being duplicative.

Additionally, with President Obama's Administration keenly interested in changing the way the health care system operates today, the Legislature may wish to postpone any changes for now since there may be an opportunity to work collaboratively with federal initiatives in the future.

I am writing to testify in strong support for HB 1504, the bill that would create the Hawaii Health Authority and develop a comprehensive plan to provide universal health care in Hawaii. I am a physician working at Kokua Kalihi Valley, Kalihi Palama Health Center, IHS HealthCare For the Homeless Project and the Aloha Medical Mission.

Health care is a right, not a privilege. The current health care system is broken, fragmented and inefficient, with little to show for its high costs. The health care system in the United States drastically needs reform, however politicians in Washington D.C. are offering the same tired ideas in response to the crisis. Attempting to achieve health care for all through complicated additions to an already broken system does not work, as the case of Massachusetts has demonstrated.

Hawaii needs to set an example for the nation by proving that it is possible to provide affordable and efficient health care to all its residents through a comprehensive state health plan. As costs for insurance, medications, long term, and other medical/dental/behavioral health services continue to rise, it is timely, and urgently necessary, that the State of Hawaii establish a central authority. The Hawaii Health Authority will develop a plan to pool the vast resources being committed to a very disparate health care delivery system and turn it into a rational efficient service delivery system. The Authority will propose a systematic way to combine the gathering of resources, the payment for services, the menu of services provided, and the planning and the evaluation under one umbrella.
