The Office of Housing and Community Development (OHCD) opposes House Bill 1739 HD1.

The repeal of state Low Income Housing Tax Credits would preclude recipients of resources, such as federal Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC) and Community Development Block Grants, from receiving state LIHTC. The combination of federal and state LIHTC (and even other sources of funding) is often needed to successfully finance the development of low-income rental housing projects that would otherwise not be financially feasible.

The financing of affordable, low-income rental housing has been severely hampered due to the current credit crisis in the private financing markets. HB 1739 HD1 would further challenge the capacity of developers in providing affordable housing during an anticipated time of great need.

The OHCD respectfully requests the Committee to oppose HB 1739 HD1. Thank you for your careful consideration of the negative impacts of this bill.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in strong opposition to HB1739 HD1 and Section 8 of SD1 Proposed.

Federal grants play a critical role in a variety of Hawaii companies from science and technology companies to low-income housing developers. In the science and technology sector grants come from a range of Federal sources including the Department of Defense, NIH, NSF, Department of Energy, Homeland Security, and the Department of Agriculture. However, science and technology federal grants are restricted to only research and development activities and may not be used for commercialization which is critical to long term success. Through leveraging federal grants the state receives a greater return on investment, and companies are able to accelerate commercialization through the use of complementary and unrestricted Act 221/215 funds. In addition, these technologies and companies have been vetted by the federal agencies and are therefore more likely to develop successful products. Finally, the language of the bill is vague and confusing and may have unintended consequences which negatively impact the growth of Hawaii's tech companies. Therefore, we strongly oppose this bill.

Hyperspective Studios produces media, specializing in 3D animation, video, Internet applications, interactive materials and games. The company currently has four employees, but intends to greatly expand its employee base this year in development of an animated children's show with an educational focus. Hyperspective intends to be a strong part of a growing animation industry and is focused on developing new jobs and a strong, sustainable business in the State of Hawaii. Our company will not have a chance at success without Act 221 incentives in place, and would therefore not have the ability to offer jobs to Hawaii graduates. Furthermore, the majority of our current client-base are companies that only exist due to the Act 221 incentives. The current discussions have slowed and stopped investors from giving money to companies, and has already made a major negative impact on our business, as we have lost two people this year already. If Act 221 is gone or has major limits, the high tech industry in Hawaii will not survive.

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii supports any and all legislation that will enable us to retain and enlarge the stock of affordable shelter in Hawaii. This bill seriously impairs that mission by prohibiting recipients of federal grants from qualifying for state tax credits. Since tax credits are a major source of funding for affordable housing in Hawaii, we respectfully request that State Low-Income Housing Tax Credits be exempted from this bill.

The Mutual Housing Association of Hawai'i, Inc. ("Mutual Housing") opposes House Bill No. 1739 SD1 as drafted because it will adversely impact the development of affordable rental housing by prohibiting recipients of federal grants from utilizing Hawaii State tax credits which include the State Low-Income Housing Tax Credit ("LIHTC") program. We respectfully request that Section 8 to the bill be excluded from the Proposed SD1.

As an owner and developer of affordable rental housing, we can attest to the critical need for a permanent and dedicated source of funding to build new rental housing. The equity funding provided by the State's LIHTC program allows developers to <u>leverage</u> federal funding programs such as the HOME and the Community Development Block ("CDBG") programs. Without the ability to leverage multiple programs, the effectiveness of the State LIHTC is greatly diminished.

It will take years to develop the projects to meet all of the need in the state. The State LIHTC program is a critical tool in helping organizations like Mutual Housing address our affordable rental shortage.

Aloha Chair Kim and Members of the Committee,

This bill attempts to bring Hawaii law into conformity with the Internal Revenue Code and would require the imposition of penalties on tax preparers for understatements due to unrealistic positions. It also includes other tax provisions. I urge you to oppose this bill for the following reasons.

Penalties would be assessed for understatement of a taxpayer's liability. Under section 231-A(c), this occurs when part of the return is based on a position that does not have substantial authority, the preparer knew or should have known about the unreasonable position and the position was not disclosed on the return. While "substantial authority" is defined in this bill, there are a number of areas in which little or no guidance has been issued by the Department of Tax. This may lead to confusion on the part of tax preparers as to what is required to be disclosed as well as create an unfair situation for both the taxpayer and preparer.

In addition, taxpayers and preparers have additional resources, e.g., Appeals Office, to settle disputes at the federal level. Hawaii does not have an equivalent process.

I respectfully ask that you vote in opposition to this bill.

Hawaii Leeward Planning Conference (HLPC) respectfully submits this testimony in opposition to HB1739 HD1 and Section 8 of SD1 Proposed.

In its thirty-five year history, HLPC has consistently advocated for sound planning decisions to promote long-term benefits for Hawai`i Island. Through these efforts, we recognize the critical role that federal grants have in supporting companies committed to a variety of areas ranging from low-income housing to science and technology. These companies all contribute to diversifying and strengthening Hawaii's economy, workforce, education fields while simultaneously helping to ensure that Hawaii maintains pace with the increasingly competitive global market.

The science and technology sector receives grants from a wide range of federal sources including and not limited to, the National Institute of Health, National Science Foundation, and Departments of Defense, Energy, Homeland Security, and Agriculture. Such federal grants are restricted to research and development activities exclusively and may not be used for commercialization which is critical to a company's long-term success. By leveraging federal grants, the State of Hawaii receives a greater return on its investment and companies are able to accelerate commercialization through the use of unrestricted Act 221/215 funds.

Additionally since these technologies and companies are both vetted by the federal agencies, the likelihood of success is improved.

Finally, we are very concerned about the potential to intensify the negative impact on Hawaii's science and technology businesses and efforts through unintended consequences that may result from the vague and confusing language of the bill.

Chair Sen. Donna Mercado Kim, V. C. Sen. Shan S. Tsutsui and Committee Members:

Good Morning. My name is Dante Carpenter, Director of Public Affairs for Carbon Diversion, Inc. (CDI). CDI strongly opposes HB 1739, HD 1, SD1, which while ostensibly reining in perceived excesses of Act 221/215, in fact, effectively helps to emasculate it! We still believe the economic stimulus afforded by Act221/215 is needed now more than ever! Unexpurgated, please! Consider it a "hand up" versus "hand out!"

What possible good does a limitation on the number of qualifying business serve by either capping investment credits, diminishing or eliminating federal funding supports or scrapping the very incentives that invite or encourage businesses to come into existence in the first place?? Has Hawaii reached that enviable stage that we have already attained self-sufficiency in economic development? Do we have too many jobs? Is there too much money already invested in Hawaii?

Please don't let short-term thinking compromise long-term objectives. ACT 221/215 Tax incentives provided responsive and responsible legislation in 2001 and 2003, respectively. And, they were created for Hawaii to expand business opportunities in activities other than Tourism, (at all time low) the Military, (beyond Hawaii control) and local and state governments.

Carbon Diversion Inc. is a local Hawaiian company that has not yet used its allowed credits under Act 221/215 and is on the "cusp" of success, and should be allowed to succeed or not on its own merits without risk of loss of investor confidence by the changes proposed!

Let the entrepreneurs do their thing, and everyone will benefit. Meanwhile, we strongly urge you to scrap section 8 of HB 1739 in its entirety, OR, File bill HB1739, HD1, SD1 and pursue HB1451, HD1 (SD1) version that recommended a public-private-partnership review panel to focus on the small number of activities counter-productive to tax incentives specifically for High Technology purposes!
