Hawaii Family Forum is a non-profit, pro-family education organization committed to preserving and strengthening families in Hawaii, representing a network of over 250 Christian churches. The Roman Catholic Church in Hawaii, under the leadership of Bishop Larry Silva, represents over 220,000 Catholics in Hawaii.

Mister Chair, Mr. Vice Chair and members of the committee, I speak in strong support of HCR 304 and urge its adoption.

We know you will agree that children are the most precious investment that a society can make for its future, whether here in Hawaii, United States or in Uganda in Africa. We cannot ignore the plight of children who are too often the helpless pawns and victims of a society and its leaders. We cannot ignore them even though they are a world away and people may think it is not the business of this legislature.

In Northern Uganda the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) has engaged in a devastating twenty-three year long civil war, abducting over 30,000 children to serve as soldiers, murdering thousands and forcing nearly two million people to live in displacement camps.

Representative Neil Abercrombie and the State House of Representatives have joined with high school and college students of "Invisible Children Hawaii," Catholic Sisters, the Hawaii Family Forum, Hawaii Catholic Conference and other concerned citizens, to condemn the human rights atrocities and violence against children, to bring Joseph Kony and the Lord's Resistance Army to justice and provide needed funds for reconstruction efforts.

We strongly urge the State Senate to concur and adopt this resolution and urge the U.S. Senators to co-sponsor similar resolutions in Congress.

First I want to sincerely thank you for giving us the time to bring these issues to your attention. By allowing my students to voice their concern about an issue so close to their heart, you are empowering a new generation of activists. I can't stress enough that these are children standing up for other children; and it doesn't matter that Uganda is 10816.3 miles away, all that matters is that these children have been suffering for 23 years and it is our duty as a part of mankind to stand up and demand justice.

So this is our plea to you; help us make history, by passing Resolution 304 to let the world know, we stand together, to condemn the use of child soldiers. The future of Uganda is in our hands, and peace is achievable with your help.

Background on my student's involvement:

In 2007 I was teaching a unit on WWII and the holocaust. During the unit a student asked me why we were learning this, I replied saying we can learn from our mistakes and make sure it never happens again. If History cannot be evaluated and applied to the world today, then it is nothing more than a story. As a teacher I make it a PRIORITY to tie my curriculum into what's happening today. After our study of the Holocaust I presented my students with 2 current day genocides; in Darfur and in Uganda. Students had to research these humanitarian crises and tell five people about them. The assignment struck a chord with many of my students, and they came to me asking if they could do more for the children in Africa.

It became their goal to bring justice to these children, and awareness to the atrocities happening in their world, during their lifetime. They did not want the history of Africa, to end up in the history books with the same devastating outcome as the Holocaust.

Invisible Children, the organization we work with, has inspired my students and I to be the voice for the 3,000 child soldiers still abducted by the rebel group Lord's Resistance Army, and the 1.2 million people still living in Displacement Camps. Since 2007 we have




The purpose of HCR 304 "CONDEMNING THE HUMAN RIGHTS ATROCITIES AND VIOLENCE AGAINST CHILDREN IN NORTHERN UGANDA AND THE DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF THE CONGO AND URGING CONGRESS TO LEAD THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY IN EFFORTS TO PROTECT CHILDREN OF UGANDA AND THE DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF THE CONGO AND BRING JOSEPH KONY AND THE LORD'S RESISTANCE ARMY TO JUSTICE" is to voice Hawaii's opposition to the humanitarian crisis presently occurring in Uganda, the Democratic Republic Congo, Sudan and other countries by urging Congress to lead the international community in efforts to protect the children of these nations.

The citizens of Northern Uganda have faced atrocities for more than twenty-three years due to the armed conflict between the Government of Uganda and the Lord's Resistance Army, an armed rebel paramilitary group trying to topple the Ugandan government. The United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs, Jan Egeland, has described the guerilla war in northern Uganda as "the world's greatest neglected humanitarian crisis."

Of the 300,000 child soldiers in the world today, 30,000 of these are in Uganda and they make up 90% of the Lord's Resistance Army. Statistics show that 77% of child abductees have seen someone murdered, 39% have been forced to kill someone with their own hands, and 35% of female soldiers have been sexually abused. Most other children have also been beaten brutally and forced to burn down towns and houses and abduct other children.

Currently an estimated 1.7 million people still remain internally displaced in northern Uganda as a result of the conflict between the government and the Lord's Resistance Army. The conditions in these displacement camps are deplorable: each week 1,000 people die while living in these IDP camps. A growing number of people are being displaced, murdered and abused in the Democratic Republic of Congo as the Lord's Resistance Army terrorizes the area. The effects of the war are seen most prevalently in the lives of the children of these nations. These children face issues of malnutrition, lack of food and water supplies, and other physiological as well as psychological problems from living and fighting in such a long-lasting conflict.

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
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The citizens of Northern Uganda have faced atrocities for more than twenty-three years due to the armed conflict between the Government of Uganda and the Lord's Resistance Army, an armed rebel paramilitary group trying to topple the Ugandan government. The United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs, Jan Egeland, has described the guerilla war in northern Uganda as "the world's greatest neglected humanitarian crisis."

Of the 300,000 child soldiers in the world today, 30,000 of these are in Uganda and they make up 90% of the Lord's Resistance Army. Statistics show that 77% of child abductees have seen someone murdered, 39% have been forced to kill someone with their own hands, and 35% of female soldiers have been sexually abused. Most other children have also been beaten brutally and forced to burn down towns and houses and abduct other children.

Currently an estimated 1.7 million people still remain internally displaced in northern Uganda as a result of the conflict between the government and the Lord's Resistance Army. The conditions in these displacement camps are deplorable: each week 1,000 people die while living in these IDP camps. A growing number of people are being displaced, murdered and abused in the Democratic Republic of Congo as the Lord's Resistance Army terrorizes the area. The effects of the war are seen most prevalently in the lives of the children of these nations. These children face issues of malnutrition, lack of food and water supplies, and other physiological as well as psychological problems from living and fighting in such a long-lasting conflict.
