Aloha Chair Manahan and Committee Members:

I support the adoption of HCR305/HR277. The four nations with the largest Muslim populations, Indonesia (194 million), India (150 million), Pakistan (145 million), and Bangladesh (130 million), are in South and Southeast Asia. At UHM we teach five Southeast Asian languages, two South Asian languages (Hindi and Urdu), Chinese, and Arabic. All countries where these languages are spoken either have a Muslim majority --Indonesia, Pakistan, Malaysia, Brunei and the Arabic countries where 15% of all Muslims live-- or strong Muslim minorities (India, Thailand, the Philippines, China, and Singapore).
